OBITUARIES

Dr. Robert F. Gentry, 71, of Alva, FL, died at his home on Wednesday, July 22, 1992. He earned a DVM from Kansas State, a master's in endocrinology from Missouri, and PhD in microbiology and public health from Michigan State. He was professor of Veterinary science at Penn State for 27 years. During that time he coordinated the Poultry Diagnostic Lab, taught and advised both undergraduate and graduate students, and did consulting work for U.S. Poultry Producers, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration, and companies in four foreign nations. In addition to his research findings which were published in scientific journals, he wrote extensively for trade journals throughout his career.

It has been a month now since the Boston meeting. For me personally it was a very interesting and challenging time. I want to take a moment to expand on some of my comments made during the annual business meeting. This is an exciting and important year in the history of the American Association of Avian Pathologists. The reasons I feel so much excitement are many.

1. AAAP is now investigating a change of our affiliation. We are actively looking at several options. This question of having our own separate meeting or holding one in conjunction with the Poultry Science Association is on the table. I have my own opinion, but why I'm so pleased is we are going to have an open and free discussion of all the possibilities. AAAP will come out of this a better organization. For years there has been back room "bitching" about the AVMA. Now we, as a full organization, are going to take a balanced look at the pros and cons of our annual scientific program being held with the AVMA. This is a fantastic chance for everyone to see firsthand all of the advantages and disadvantages of the various options available to us. Once this critical look has been taken, the full membership will make a choice on the best direction to proceed. This is a wonderful way to go. The board will not decide this matter, you as a AAAP member will.

2. The suggestion has been made that AAAP set up a new class of membership. I think we would call these people International Associate Members. The new IAM can be from any place on the planet. This change, if approved by the current membership, will have tremendous potential for AAAP. With scientists from Europe, Asia, Africa, and all of the old "East Block" then eligible for membership, AAAP could grow tremendously. Being just big is not the goal. The exchange of ideas and information with colleagues from around the world is

Unrestricted fund revenues were down from last year and totaled \$234,581

to the new volume. Interest income was down \$1,276 to \$5,843.

Unrestricted fund disbursements were \$212,469 resulting in a gain of \$12,112 for the year.

The financial status of the AAAP remains sound. Our year end fund balance was \$147,990. However, we must not only have income to cover our expenses but should increase the reserve to equal one years operating costs.

We already anticipate a net loss next year of about \$20,000. This situation should improve the following year.

The Preceptorship committee reviewed 6 applications this year.

The 1991-92 audit of the AAAP Foundation, Inc. was prepared by Joseph F Robinson, CPA of Elko, Fischer, McCabe and Rudman of Media, PA. A copy has been sent to the audit committee of AAAP and is included in the agenda materials given to the Board of Directors.

Restricted accounts include the C.A. Bottorff and Reed Rumsey Student Funds. The C.A. Bottorff fund now totals \$39,794. The Reed Rumsey Student Fund now totals \$41,732.

The preceptorship/unrestricted fund now totals \$61,435.

The total fund balance for AAAP foundation is \$142,961.

**THE AMERICAN ASSOCIATION OF AVIAN PATHOLOGISTS
THIRTY-FIFTH ANNUAL MEETING
AUGUST 4, 1992
BOSTON, MASSACHUSETTS**

The thirty-fifth annual meeting was called to order by Dr. John Barnes, President, at 10:40 am. The meeting was attended by approximately one hundred and seventy one members.

Dr. Barnes asked the membership to pause for a moment of silence to remember five of our members who passed away this year -Drs. John Dick, Lloyd Jones, Allyn Dietzel, George Faddoul and Bob Gentry.

A motion was carried to approve the minutes of the thirty-fourth annual meeting as printed.

RECOGNITION OF RETIRING BOARD MEMBERS

Dr. Barnes recognized and thanked three retiring board members, Dr. Waldrip, past president, Dr. Ghazikhanian, the western district director and Dr. Rosenstein, a director at large.

WESTERN REGION ELECTION

Dr. Gregg Cutler has been elected to serve on the board as the Western District representative replacing Dr. Yan Ghazikhanian.

THIRTY-FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT

Dr. Eckroade gave the thirty-fifth annual report (please see report in this newsletter). He also encouraged members to pay their dues on time.

BOARD ACTIONS

The board of directors met Friday and Saturday and took official action on the following:

Carried a motion to give one, two or three year dues renewal options.

Discussed the possibility of moving our meeting to Poultry Science. It was decided that we have several options, stay with AVMA, meet with poultry Science or have our own meeting. This would be a major change and a committee was formed to look into the pros and cons of all options and circulate in a membership survey.

Dr. Anderson will resign as editor of AVIAN DISEASES by 1994. A motion was carried to recognize Dr. Anderson and the AVIAN DISEASES editorial board for all of their efforts. Dr. Anderson will write a "job description" which will be circulated in the membership survey being developed. We will ask for nominations or volunteers for editor.

The AVIAN DISEASES editorial board will be added to the committee interest survey.

There are still 2nd editions of ISOLATION AND IDENTIFICATION OF AVIAN PATHOGENS available for underdeveloped countries.

A motion was carried to put Drs. McDougald and Saif on the DISEASES OF POULTRY editorial board to replace Drs. Reid and Yoder.

A motion was carried to award an honoraria of \$2,500 to the senior editor, \$1,000 each to the junior editors and \$6 per page or a \$60 minimum to chapter authors of the ninth edition of DISEASES OF POULTRY.

A motion was carried to have the business office conduct a salary survey and have Dr. Fletcher analyze the results.

A motion was carried to propose a change in the Constitution and Bylaws to allow members from outside the designated regions and classify them as international associate members. They will have all rights as members except voting privileges. The proposed changes will be circulated to the membership before the annual meeting and then voted on at the annual meeting.

A motion was carried to award the Secretary-treasurer and the Editor of AVIAN DISEASES \$8,200 each.

A motion was carried not to approve the proposed changes to the Constitution and Bylaws to add an ACPV member to the AAAP board.

A motion was carried that the P.P. Levine award should be awarded to the best paper in AVIAN DISEASES irrespective of previous awards. Also to try to avoid giving two awards to the same individual in the same year, but to re-

nominate the candidate the following year for the award not given.

A motion was carried to sponsor the symposium proposed by the Toxic, Infectious and Miscellaneous Diseases committee on "Newly Emerging Diseases" and to provide up to \$3,000 financial support for the symposium.

Dr. Benton, the Incorporation's Delaware representative is retiring. A motion was carried to appoint Dr. Ed Odor as the new Delaware representative.

The board approved a request to have A MANUAL OF METHODS FOR THE ISOLATION AND IDENTIFICATION OF AVIAN PATHOGENS translated into Chinese. The manual will not be sold for profit.

A motion was carried to increase the regional meeting support from up to \$2,000 to up to \$3,000.

The board is also considering effort of long term planning, use of honoraria and relations with allied groups.

Dr. Barnes reaffirmed to the membership present the concern the Board has for the members and the organization's welfare and benefit. He also recognized Dr. Eckroade, Kim Sprout and Kim Bradley for their constant attention to detail.

NOMINATING COMMITTEE REPORT

The nominating committee (Drs. McMurray, Poss and van der Heide) submitted the following slate of nominees for 1992/93.

No further nominations were submitted from the floor. A motion was carried to close nominations from the floor and accept slate as presented by the committee.

Dr. Barnes welcomed the new officers.

AUDITING COMMITTEE REPORT

Dr. Eskelund reported that the auditing committee (Drs. Eskelund, Cover and Simmons) met with Dr. Eckroade and approved the financial reports as presented.

AVMA DELEGATE REPORT

Dr. Waldrip reported the following from the AVMA meeting:

Dr. Everett Macomber succeeds Dr. Gerald Johnson as the AVMA president. In his incoming speech he listed the issues of:

- Extra label drug usage - every veterinarian needs to petition his senator for passage of bill 2667 and his representative for bill 5297.
- Food Safety
- Animal Welfare
- Environmental Issues
- Women - now 26%, in 1975 they were 5%.

Dr. Marion Szatalowicz to serve a 2nd term as vice president.

Dr. Leon Russell, a Texas A&M professor, won president elect.

The treasurer's budget was \$123,000 ahead of projected but \$250,000 of that was due to the sale of the old offices. The 1991 budget was \$383,000 in deficit and the projected budget for 1993 is \$445,000 "in the red".

Debbie Turner continues as the AVMA spokesperson.

AVMA approved resolution number eight which opposes APHIS policy of allowing their employees to also conduct a practice. Approved resolution ten which is a plan for AVMA to develop and support a policy against harassment on campuses and in the workplace and a grievance policy. Disapproved resolution thirteen which opposed the further capture of free-living cetaceans. Approved amendment to Bylaws article VIII, annual sessions, section 3, scientific program to form a new convention management and program committee.

The district I representative to the executive board Dr. Langdon Davis is being replaced by Dr. Harold Zweighaft from New York City.

Thank you Dr. Waldrip.

RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE REPORT

Dr. Dwight Schwartz reported that the committee had no resolutions to present. The board has adopted a new resolutions policy which will be published in a newsletter.

SCIENTIFIC PROGRAM COMMITTEE REPORT

Dr. Fletcher thanked all participants in the scientific program and Dr. Daral Jackwood for putting together the symposium.

One hundred twelve people requested oral papers and 98 are on the program. Forty-four requested posters and 50 are on the program. Of the one fifty six, 8 withdrew. Therefore, there were one hundred forty eight on program, thirty six moderators and twenty five symposium participants. \$30,861 was used for travel support.

Dr. Calnek's pseudo-resolution:

Whereas our rooms are large; whereas our projectors are dim and too far away; whereas some of us are getting older and weak in the eyes; whereas some people put too much on a slide; therefore go back to computer jockey and ask them not to put dark red letters on dark blue backgrounds.

Thank you Dr. Fletcher, Dr. Frazier and the program advisory committee.

REPORT OF THE EDITOR

Dr. Anderson reported that AVIAN DISEASES volume 35 was 1,030 pages consisting of 119 articles, 16 case reports, 14 research notes and 4 pet bird

medicine reports.

Dr. Anderson informed the membership that he would like to be replaced as editor of AVIAN DISEASES by 1994. He also asked for feedback as to whether there should be assistant or associate editors and whether we should consider publishing 6 times per year.

The journal is only as good as the authors and reviewers. The editorial board was asked to stand and be recognized.

AWARDS COMMITTEE REPORT

Dr. Sharma reported that the committee had a busy and fruitful year. Members took the time to nominate and it was appreciated.

Dr. Barnes asked all to plan on attending the awards luncheon next year and to **NOMINATE, NOMINATE, NOMINATE.**

PRECEPTORSHIP COMMITTEE REPORT

Dr. Rosenstein reported that six preceptorships were granted last year and six will be awarded again this year. We need more applicants. Please help us identify students who are interested.

SKELETAL DISEASES COMMITTEE

Dr. Ghazikhanian appeared before the membership with a proposal that the committee present a poster session of photographs on deformities and also nomenclature for feedback to standardize terminology.

DRUGS AND BIOLOGICS COMMITTEE

Dr. Stewart gave a short report for the drugs and biologics committee. He asked that everyone become familiar with house bills relating to drugs and their availability. Also, the FDA will regulate competitive exclusion products in the future.

LICENSING COMMITTEE

Dr. Howell reminded everyone that some states require continuing education credits to maintain a license. If you need credits for this meeting, please give a business card to Dr. Eckroade.

EDUCATION COMMITTEE

Dr. Reed recognized the members of the committee. They worked very hard this year. The Careers in Avian Medicine Brochure, which is aimed at veterinary and graduate students and those looking for career changes, will be completed in two to three months.

A committee objective is to complete new slide study sets and to improve the existing ones. One new slide study set, MARBLE SPLEEN DISEASE OF RING NECKED PHEASANTS, was completed this year.

RESPIRATORY DISEASES COMMITTEE

Dr Hoerr reported that the respiratory diseases committee meeting had a

low turnout this year but there were several guests present.

The U.S. presently remains free of TRT but that it is causing problems throughout the rest of the world. There is a growing concern about Mycoplasmosis. There is a new IBV serotype on Delmarva. Velogenic, neurotropic NDV is killing cormorants and is something to keep an eye on. A LT position statement was to be discussed at the meeting but because of the low turnout it did not happen. Please give feedback to the committee.

The committee is developing a proposal for a symposium to be presented to the board for consideration in the near future.

DISEASES OF PUBLIC HEALTH SIGNIFICANCE

Dr. Nagaraja gave a short report for the committee. He is encouraged by FSIS work being done in an attempt to reduce salmonella in the processing plant.

TUMOR VIRUS COMMITTEE

Dr. Schat gave a short report for the committee.

BIOTECHNOLOGY COMMITTEE

Dr. Jackwood thanked all committee members for the hard work they did this year.

Dr. Barnes thanked the committee for the hard work on the excellent symposium presented this year.

AAAP FOUNDATION

Dr. Eckroade reviewed the third annual report of the Foundation (see report in this newsletter).

The following actions were taken by the board:

A motion to have Secretary-treasurer check further into request for educational material to be sent to Ethiopia and to have an allowance of up to \$1,175 to honor request if necessary.

A motion was carried allowing the business manager up to \$100 to be spent for individual requests for educational material to be sent to underdeveloped countries.

Up to six preceptorships may be awarded again this year.

Foundation assets this year were \$142,961. Reed Rumsey, \$41,732; C.A. Bottorff (Hiram Lasher), \$39,794; Preceptorship (Ken Eskelund), \$61,435. Next year we will divide the preceptorship fund into what is actually for the preceptorship program and what is designated as unrestricted.

MEMORIAL FUND COMMITTEE

Dr. Pomeroy reported that the memorial fund committee had a very fruitful year. A brochure was circulated which only received nine responses. The committee also targeted the past presidents, life members and past secretary-treasurers which was very successful. \$17,450 was collected in pledges and contributions. Dr. Cover donated his \$1,000 award to the Foundation.

Dr. Pomeroy thanked the other three committee members, Drs. Hall, Chute and Zander.

ACPV

Dr. Saif reported that ACPV sees AAAP as the parent organization and will enhance and work with AAAP. Please discuss any questions or concerns with the diplomates. Things went well with the exam this year.

ENTERIC DISEASES COMMITTEE

Dr. Saif reported that the committee will propose a symposium on the management of enteric diseases in the future.

NEW BUSINESS

Dr. Kumar invited all members to the 43rd NCADC in Minneapolis on October 4-6, 1992. Pfizer is hosting a dinner boat trip.

Dr. Dhillon invited all to come to WPDC on Feb 28-Mar 2, 1993 at the Sacramento Holiday Inn.

Dr. Eckroade reminded everyone that the WPVA will meet in August 1993 in Australia.

Dr. Barnes passed the gavel to the incoming president, Dr. Chase.

Dr. Chase thanked Dr. Barnes. Dr. Barnes' cool head and ability to keep the meetings going and on track are really appreciated.

There was a round of applause and the past president plaque was presented to Dr. Barnes.

Dr. Chase has been a member for 22 years, attending his first meeting in Las Vegas. He is thrilled with the growth of the organization.

Dr. Chase mentioned that he has heard that the board is not always responsive to the needs of the members. The board is not in the position of running a railroad and if anyone has concerns or questions about the organization, please call him at 1-800-798-3818. He wants to be accessible for complaints, concerns and praises. He also realizes that it is tough to put together a good scientific program and that people get tired of looking at the same thing over and over. However, be patient, some day you will need it. ACPV is another concern that he has heard. There need not be any concern. The college will enhance AAAP.

AAAP is the best organization of poultry pathologists in the world. There is a great deal of bright, young talent and old, experienced wisdom which all melts together.

NEW RESOLUTIONS PROCESS FOR AAAP

AMERICAN ASSOCIATION OF AVIAN PATHOLOGISTS STANDING RULES: RESOLUTIONS

A resolutions committee shall be appointed by the President, who determines the number of members and designates the chairman. The immediate past president shall serve as a consultant without a vote.

General Information

Under the Bylaws and the Articles of Incorporation, the Board of Directors is charged with the responsibility of managing the affairs of the AAAP. Resolutions adopted by AAAP reflect the opinion of a majority of those present and voting at the annual business meeting. Resolutions adopted shall be considered by the Board of Directors and only those ratified by the Board shall constitute official positions of the AAAP. Resolutions may be amended, rescinded, or reaffirmed by the Board of Directors.

A resolution that presents a position similar to or in opposition to one previously adopted shall be presented as a substitute resolution. Members shall receive a copy of both the existing and substitute resolutions. If the AAAP adopts the substitute resolution and if the Board of Directors ratifies it, the Board of Directors shall then rescind the existing AAAP position.

Ratified resolutions are assembled in books, covering AAAP Resolutions and Positions, along with other statements of position adopted by the Board of Directors; these are distributed to every member of the Board of Directors, for use during his term of Board service. When Board service is concluded, the book shall be returned to the national office.

The resolutions committee shall review the resolutions each year and make recommendations to the Board of Directors regarding any change of status.

- Active resolutions are subject of current focus and appear in the current resolutions book.
- Historical resolutions are those which are to be retained but are not items of current focus.
- Active resolutions may be moved to the Historical Record. Resolutions in the Historical Record may be reactivated. Active resolutions and position statements may be reaffirmed. A resolution and position statement being reaffirmed or reactivated must retain its original language.

The Resolutions Committee shall be responsible for placement of newly ratified resolutions in the book.

The Board of Directors shall assign ratified resolutions to appropriate groups for implementation.

Procedures For Submitting Resolutions

To qualify for consideration by the Resolutions Committee, resolutions shall meet the following criteria:

- a. concern a field of interest of the AAAP;
- b. be in harmony with the basic policies of the AAAP;

- c. concern a matter that is national in scope and requires nationwide action of resolution;
- d. state a position not previously adopted by the AAAP;
- e. be written in language appropriate for national consideration;
- f. be accompanied by background material that is national in scope. The background must be sufficient to give a person with no knowledge of the subject enough information to make an intelligent decision;

Resolutions shall originate from a member, a committee, or the Board of Directors of the AAAP. In each case the resolution shall be signed by the member and/or chairman of the submitting group.

Resolutions must be received at the national office by April 1.

Committee Responsibilities

The Resolutions Committee shall meet in conjunction with the annual meeting and may hold conference call meetings prior to the annual meeting to consider the resolutions and prepare those approved for distribution. The committee:

- 1) shall reject all resolutions which do not meet all established criteria;
- 2) may combine two or more resolutions;
- 3) may edit or adapt resolutions if necessary to make them appropriate for consideration at the annual meeting;
- 4) may make substantive changes with the consent of the submitting member or group;
- 5) may refer resolutions to committees of the AAAP for additional information or recommendations for action by the Resolutions Committee;
- 6) shall, immediately after decisions are made, send letters or verbally inform to all submitting groups, informing them of the disposition of their resolutions and rationale for the action;
- 7) shall distribute in advance and present to the annual business meeting all resolutions that meet the criteria and qualifications established;
- 8) must include with each resolution a recommendation to approve, disapprove, or present without recommendation;
- 9) shall include the name of the submitting group or groups on all resolutions distributed;
- 10) shall report to the Board of Directors and to the annual business meeting the disposition of all resolutions;
- 11) shall meet with the secretary immediately after the business meeting session in which resolutions are considered to check final wording of adopted resolutions and to arrange for their dissemination to the Board of Directors for ratification.

Emergency Resolutions

The following provision is made for submitting an emergency resolution:

- 1) The urgency of the subject matter shall have arisen after the deadline for submission of resolutions.
- 2) Emergency resolutions shall conform to all established criteria for other resolutions.

- 3) The Resolutions committee shall meet prior to the business meeting, to consider emergency resolutions.
- 4) Copies of emergency resolutions approved for presentation to the annual business meeting shall be prepared for all members at the meeting.
- 5) A two-thirds affirmative vote of the delegate body is necessary before an emergency resolution shall be considered.
- 6) No resolutions other than those submitted for consideration as emergency resolutions shall be introduced from the floor at the annual meeting.

"His probing curiosity, ever-present enthusiasm, and unique approach to identifying and solving problems have proven to be of great value during our own young careers," wrote the two, "not only in the development of our individual interests and goals, but in the belief that we should all continue to ask questions, and then question answers."

Dr. Gross has conducted pioneering research in understanding the relationships between environment, genetics and social structure in poultry health.

1991/2 COMMITTEE REPORTS

AAAP RESPIRATORY DISEASES COMMITTEE REPORT

The AAAP committee on respiratory diseases met on August 4, 1992, 4:00 to 6:00 PM, at the Marriott Copley Hotel, Boston, MA. The following topics received attention.

Turkey Rhinotracheitis. The U.S. remains free of TRT but the causative virus is established in the western hemisphere. Antigenic variation has been documented for isolates from the United Kingdom, Spain, and Hungary. The National Veterinary Services Laboratory conducts ELISA serology for TRT. Contact Dennis Senne, NVSL, for further information.

Mycoplasmosis caused by *M. synoviae* is increasing in broiler breeders in certain areas, accompanied by a laxity in monitoring and biosecurity. Diagnostic developments were reviewed.

Infectious Bronchitis. Dr. Jack Rosenberger reported on new serotype emergence in the Delmarva poultry industry. Continuing concerns for support and coordination of rapid identification of IBV isolates will be expressed to USAHA committee on Transmissible Diseases of Poultry.

Infectious Laryngotracheitis. The USAHA Guidelines for the eradication of ILT were examined. No formal action was taken on a proposed position statement. Comments about the plan are solicited for conveyance to USAHA (contact Fred Hoerr).

Respiratory Disease Symposium. A proposal for a future symposium is in development.

REQUEST FOR NOMINATIONS FOR REED RUMSEY STUDENT AWARD

The American Association of Avian Pathologists annually selects an outstanding student (s) to be the recipient of the Reed Rumsey Student Award for Advancement of Avian Medicine.

Applications must be either students (graduate or professional) or residents pursuing an existing program in a college of veterinary medicine or appropriate department in an academic institution.

- a. Graduate students may be either post-DVM or post-baccalaureate.
- b. Professional students (enrolled in a college of veterinary medicine) may be considered if they also meet the criteria specified below.
- c. Residents must be participating in an avian medicine training program and meet the criteria below.

The award (s) shall be competitive and given in addition to any stipend given by the academic institution.

Initially the awards(s) shall be in the amount of \$1000.00 plus travel expenses to the American Veterinary Medical Association's meeting. The number of recipients will be determined by the AAAP Board each year.

Awards will be based on the following:

- a. Submission of a one-to-two page abstract of a report of original research conducted by the applicant. Those selected to receive the award will be expected to present their research paper at the Avian Medicine Section of the Annual Meeting of the American Veterinary Medical Association.

- b. Copy of current curriculum vitae.

- c. Transcript of grades (graduate work unless only a professional student). A progress report will suffice for those in a residency program.

- d. Narrative statement by the applicant (1-2 pages) outlining career goals, plans for the future, and the significance of their graduate or residency program and research project to these goals.

- e. A supporting letter from the major professor or someone else from the institution qualified to comment on the merits of the research program and the quality of the applicant.
