Below we give our readers a letter written by Mr. Bundy the colored boy who made the highest percent in a competitive contest in a competitive contest for Cadetship at the Naval Academy at Annapolis, from Congressman Shattuck's district of Ohio, Col. Shattuck says he that he will stand by the colored boy and propose to have him enter the academy if possible. The Colonel was informed that no colored boy had ever went there and if he insisted on having Bundy enter, the students would resign. He replied by saying "Let them resign and be damn; let them go. I propose to see my boy enter." Most of the newspapers have expressed themselves very freely in favor of Mr. Bundy entering the Academy, and this is as it should be as he won the honor fair and square in an open competition.

In Mr. Bundy's letter to his father he says:

"The world is fast advancing to a place where the mind and capabilities of a man will supersede the color of his skin and the prejudice against him. Annapolis is educating and training America's best youths, and I don't think they are so far biased by a narrow mind and a defective conscience as to overstep the bounds of common decency and gentleness. This is a government of the people, by the people and for the people. Annapolis is a government school. Should she then close her doors on any of America's loyal sons who seek to educate themselves that they may defend the Constitution by which they are protected?"

"So far as social equality is concerned, I do not demand it, and do not expect to get it. Therefore, if they treat me a little cold on that score I will not be disappointed. All I ask that they give me what I earn by my own intellectual efforts. I expect to be hazed just as any other new-comer. That I will not object to as long as it is not brutal. I intend to go to the Academy in September, and if I am successful in getting in, my rule of action will be to treat them all as gentlemen, and I shall expect the same of them."

LEGISLATURE ADJOURN'D

Last Tuesday our law-makers took a recess until July, when they will be in session for probably 2 days to adopt the new code as revised. The session has been very long, the work hard and tedious, as it is always a great task to revise and codify the laws of a state. It is very particular work, as the least error would effect our great commonwealth and might prove a fatal impediment to its onward march to success. Our code had not been revised before for 20 years, should it remain that length time before again being revised, the members that assisted in the work, will nearly all have passed away. It remains for future results to tell whether or not their work this winter has been a success or a failure. The work of our pioneer law-makers has been praised and it is to be hoped that in future years we can point with pride to the work of the 26 General Assembly.

THE NEWS IN IOWA.

BRADLEY BANK ROBBERY.

The Mystery Cleared by the Confession of the City Marshal.

OTTUMWA, May 14.—Pinkerton detectives have succeeded in clearing the mystery in connection with the robbery of the Bradley Bank at Eldon on the morning of February 1, when the safe was blown open and \$6,200 taken. The instigator, the city marshal of Eldon, has confessed, and is under arrest, with Dick Dodd, a gambler of Ottumwa. Marshal Stevens also implicates three Chicago crooks. The confession of Stevens was made when he was confronted with some of the evidence by one of the Pinkertons. He first tried to tell a story of the three men forcing him to aid them in committing the robbery, but afterwards went before the grand jury and told the story without stint. He and Dodd were then arrested. Stevens conceived the idea of robbing the bank in 1895 and interested Dodd, who secured the cracksmen. The men made three trips to Eldon before they were successful. Stevens guarded the bank while the men robbed it, and then aided them in stealing a team and buggy to get away with their booty. The crooks went to Ottumwa, where they met on the outskirts of the town by Dodd, who took them to his home and kept them in hiding for several days, when they went on to Chicago. The money was divided at Dodd's house. Dodd received \$600, but the Chicago men skipped with the rest of the cash. Stevens came to Ottumwa, and when he found out that he had been flummoxed went to Chicago and tried to find his men, but was unable to do so. Stevens has always borne the very best of reputation. He has been an officer at Eldon for years, and the people of that town will hardly believe his own story of the crime. The cause is said to have been an expensive wife.

OTTUMWA, May 14.—Dick Dodd has confessed to complicity in the robbery of the Bradley Bank. In searching Dodd, the chief of police found a fancy pocket knife with the name of James L. Aylesworth on it. Aylesworth was a traveling man, who came to Ottumwa about April 16, got on a drunk and was slugged in an alley and robbed of a diamond valued at \$150 and a number of other valuables. He was badly slugged, and died at his home in Chicago a few days after, though his death is said to have been caused by typhoid pneumonia. Dodd told the officers that he got the knife from a well known young man, with two others, was seen with Aylesworth in several saloons, and the arrest of two of them followed. Those arrested were Fred Grube and Gerry Devol. Grube and the other one not yet arrested are from prominent families.

MURDEROUS ASSAULT.

OSKALOOSA, May 13.—Ed Turner, a blacksmith, made a murderous assault upon C. H. Hartgraves. He struck him upon the head with a blunt instrument, inflicting a deep cut two inches long on the left temple. He also cut him with a knife or razor on the chin. Hartgraves fell when struck. Turner then proceeded to kick him on top of the head and then jumped on him. The trouble grew out of a drunken dispute over an imaginary wrong. Turner is one of a gang that gives Oskaloosa much trouble. He bit off half the right ear of one of his victims and was released upon paying a fine of \$75.

LEAVES WIFE AND CHILDREN.

A. J. Bailey of Rock Rapids Ships With His Money and a Woman.

ROCK RAPIDS, May 13.—A. J. Bailey, one of the oldest settlers and a man of good reputation, drew his money from the banks, amounting to several thousand dollars, and flew the country with a woman by the name of Stoltenburg, better known as Laura D. Herkholz. Mr. and Mrs. Bailey have been living in Mrs. Stoltenburg's house and boarding her for the rent the past winter. A short time ago Mrs. Bailey went to Eureka Springs and arranged for the purchase of a house. Mr. Bailey was to come down as soon as he straightened up some business matters.

THE JURY SPLIT HAIRS.

verdict for One Man Returned in a Case at Sigourney.

OTTUMWA, May 12.—A jury at Sigourney returned the unprecedented verdict of one man. The case was one wherein Thomas Kelly, receiver of the Richland bank, sued C. J. Steele on a note for \$25 and attorney's fees. The defendant made a counter claim for \$24.75, which was allowed by the jury. This left the amount due the bank 25 cents, which, with interest, amounted to 70 cents and 9 mills. The jury returned a verdict with two counts: one of them gave the plaintiff 70 cents and 9 mills and the other allowed plaintiff 1 mill for attorney fees, making the amount of the verdict even 71 cents.

Ravages of Hog Cholera.

CRESTON, May 12.—Union county last year lost 26,000 head of hogs, mostly from cholera. This statement was a surprise even to the farmers themselves, as it was not thought that the loss had been so heavy until the township assessors made their report. It is estimated that this loss took from the farmers about \$300,000 in cash.

Child Killed by Street Car.

DUNTEG, May 13.—A street car on the Rhombeg line ran over the little 4-year-old daughter of Patrick Mullin and killed her instantly. The child was playing with other children and suddenly started to cross the track. The motorman did his best to stop his car.

Looted a Store.

MAISON CITY, May 12.—Thieves broke into J. B. Pierce's general merchandise store at Rockwell, stealing ninety pair of shoes. The safe was also broken into and \$800 in negotiable papers stolen. The county is alive with tramps.

OSKALOOSA SENSATION.

John Storm, a Wife Beater, Receives a Life Sentence.

OSKALOOSA, May 10.—A serious and what may yet prove a fatal affair took place here. John Storm was beating his wife unmercifully and complaint was made to the police. Chief Stoler and Officer Glass hastened to the scene and found the charges true. As Stoler stepped in the door of the house Storm knocked him senseless with a whip-stick loaded with lead. Glass thereupon drew his club and hit Storm, laying him down in a lifeless heap upon the floor. It was fourteen hours after the trouble when Storm regained consciousness. He is still in a bad way. He is a well known character and a hard man to handle. Stoler is on duty again, nursing a sore head.

Young Woman Suddenly Insane.

BURLINGTON, May 13.—Miss Ollie James, a respectable and handsome young woman living on Central avenue, while coming down to the city was apparently taken insane. She hurried down the street till she came to the C. & N. crossing. An engine was passing, and she ran ahead and leaped upon the pilot unhurt and clung there until the engine was stopped and the trainmen removed her by force, she clinging desperately to her position. She was removed to St. Francis hospital, where she now lies a pitiable wreck.

Silver Men's State Convention.

DES MOINES, May 12.—The state central committee of the democratic, populist and silver republican parties met at the Savory hotel and decided to hold their state convention in Des Moines June 23. Three conventions will be held on that day for the nomination of one ticket to be known as the "Democratic." Fred White, of Ottumwa will be temporary chairman of the democratic convention; C. O. Holly, of Des Moines, will be chairman of the populist convention; the free silver republicans will name their chairman later.

Marion Church Will Withdraw.

CEAR RAPIDS, May 12.—As a result of the preference of charges against Rev. John Wesley Geiger, pastor of the Congregational church at Marion, and the determination of the Davenport association to investigate these charges despite the wishes of the Marion church, the church by a vote of 25 to 28 has withdrawn its membership from the Davenport association of Congregational churches, and steps will be taken to reunite with the Dubuque association.

Mail Law Violated at Keokuk.

KEOKUK, May 12.—Information has been filed against three saloonkeepers, the charge being that they kept their places open on Sunday. Mayor Root recently gave orders that all saloons must be closed, front, side and rear, from Saturday night until Monday morning, and it is determined that the order shall be obeyed. Heretofore many saloonkeepers have openly violated the state law and city ordinances regarding Sunday closing.

A. O. U. W. Grand Lodge.

KEOKUK, May 12.—The Grand Lodge of Iowa of the Ancient Order of United Workmen met in this city. Grand Master Tilton presiding and 240 delegates present. The grand master's report showed the order's condition was most prosperous. The grand recorder's report showed there had been an increase of membership of 35 since January 1, 1906.

Fire at Tama City.

BOONE, May 12.—The Tama City paper mill and egg case factory was destroyed by fire. It was one of the largest industrial concerns in Iowa. For a time it looked as if the town was doomed and an appeal was sent to Boone for a fire engine and hose carts. The loss will be about \$20,000. Little insurance.

Convict Commits Suicide.

KEOKUK, May 14.—George Terwiler, a convict in the penitentiary at Fort Madison, hung himself. He used a leather strap, fastening it to a spike in the wall of the closet. Terwiler was sent up from Story county for five years for burglary, and had already served three of them.

IOWA CONDENSED.

Governor Drake has signed the manufacturing bill.

Gov. Drake has issued a pardon to Mrs. Amelia Evans, of Wapello county. The postoffice at Cushing, Woodbury county, was broken into by burglars a few nights since, and stamps to the value of \$150 were taken, together with a quantity of goods from the store of Sam McGinnis. The burglars left their tools, but made their escape.

The \$10,000 judgment held by Lucia B. Griffin, of Albia, against the Illinois Central railroad has been affirmed in the appellate court at Chicago. Miss Griffin was seriously injured in Madison, Wis., in 1894. While in the baggage room of the Illinois Central depot a heavy door fell upon her, burying her beneath it.

The second annual meeting and oratorical contest of the Interstate League of State Normal Schools was held at Emporia, Kansas, recently. The states comprising the league are Iowa, Illinois, Kansas, Missouri and Wisconsin. Iowa's representative, Percy Hunt, of Cedar Rapids, won first place, Missouri's representative, second, Illinois's third, Wisconsin's fourth, Kansas's fifth.

Oskaloosa dispatch: Rev. H. E. Colby, the young Methodist preacher from Lacey, who was recently exonerated by the Mahaska county grand jury from charges of seduction by his adopted sister, has been suspended from the conference. For several days an investigation committee, representing the Oskaloosa conference, has been at work on the case and has found sufficient evidence to convict him. He has been notified of his suspension until the quarterly conference in Peella in July. It is understood that when Colby was before the grand jury he broke down several times while giving his evidence, and especially so when a doctor who had visited on the girl entered the room. From this suspicious action the church felt it their duty to inquire further, and the later developments are said to be quite sensational.

BINDING OF GRAIN.

Why McCormick Changed from a Left to a Right Hand Binder.

When binding was done by hand the left hand cut harvester was a necessity. With the left hand machine the heads of the grain are at the left hand of the man doing the binding, so in taking out the bundle with the band around it, whether the man turned to the front table or to the back table he kept his position toward the bundle itself—that is, with the heads towards his left hand; hence, in making the tuck he shoved the ends under the band toward the heads. Grain is handled by the harvester by grasping into the heads, as shown in the illustration, and the tuck should therefore be toward the heads, so that it will not pull.

Window Glass Put Panned.

Pittsburg, Pa., Aug. 21.—Representatives of the Pittsburgh Window Glass Company and the Indiana combine met here Wednesday for the purpose of establishing a central sales agency to control the output of the country. To accomplish this it will be necessary not only for the Pittsburgh and the Western companies to unite, but the Eastern associations as well as the independent manufacturers must be brought into line. To this end the meeting appointed a committee to draft a plan of procedure which will be satisfactory to all concerned. When this committee completes its work another meeting will be called. There is now about \$15,000,000 capital invested in window-glass plants, which have in use 1,334 pots and give employment to about 10,000 men.
