A committee called on McKinley yesterday, led by Ex-governor P. P. Pinchback of La., and pledged the support of the colored race and said the loyalty of 9,000,000 of his race would assist.

WILL BE WAR.

Probably before another issue war will be declared; as McKinley sent his ultimatum to Cuba and demanded a reply not later than Saturday; already large armies of the National guards are concentrating their forces in Florida, near Key West. It is true that war is destructive, yet we are justifiable, and every true American will sanction the course that our government has taken. Young single men that are anxious to win military fame should tender their service and march toward the Torrid Zone.

ONLY ONE COLORED POLICEMAN.

Last Monday Mr. James Todd one of our efficient and well liked colored policeman was dropped from the force by mayor MacVicar for no stated cause. We wonder why was this, for Mr. Todd was considered one of the best and most punctual man on the force, was quite unassuming, and nearly every man in his district petition his retention. It was only Mr. Todd's first term and he was just as much entitled to his second term as the mayor was. Only a few months ago the mayor was very anxious to secure the nomination for his second term and did not hesitate to go around and ask the leading colored people for their support. Now we demand to know why was the colored representatives reduced to only one man on the force, and that one is Mr. Clay Lewis. It was a mistake to drop Mr. Todd, but we shall wait for further developments before speaking on this subject further.

TO CONTEST J. F. BLAGBURN'S ELECTION.

Mr. Stohlgren, the Swede democrat, who was a candidate against Mr. Blagburn, filed his bond of \$400 and petition last Saturday, to contest Blagburn's election as market master. It has been rumored that the democrats might contest, and we surmise that too quite a few republicans will be glad of the contest. It is not necessary to force Mr. Blagburn into extra expense to gratify a few democrats. The official returns ought to be sufficient; however Mr. Blagburn took charge of his office last Monday morning; as the rest of the city officers did. Congress of Representatives White and Colored Americans.

In as much as there exists in the United States two classes of citizens between whom there is much misunderstanding, frequent friction, happy antagonism, want of good-will, lack of sympathy and hearty co-operation detrimental to the truest fullest and highest development of our common country; and believing that this condition of affairs can not continue without serious and disastrous results to this nation and people, and that these conditions arise and are due mainly to ignorance upon the part of each class of the sentiments and aspiration which inspire and move the other, which ignorance can only be removed by a frank free and full expression and exchange of views upon topics of vital importance to the whole American people by representative of both classes from all sections, and especially those which have to do with a modus vivendi between the people designated and confident that all loyal Americans who have the best interests of the nation at heart will welcome and bend their hearty support to any movement which will tend to establish just and happy relations between all classes of American citizens and promote the prosperity and welfare of our country and make her a nation beloved at home and revered abroad, we, the undersigned, a committee selected for that purpose, hereby issue a call for a Congress of Representative White and Colored Americans to be held at Omaha, August 17, 1898. The aims and object of said Congress shall be:

First—To bring together representatives of both classes of American citizens, herein designated, for exchange of views on INDUSTRIAL, EDUCATIONAL, SOCIAL and MORAL questions of vital moment to the prosperity of our country; and Second—To crystallize such views into some organization, which will put into practice such principles as the Congress may agree upon for the accomplishment of the end desired. This organization will not be political, but ETHICAL.

The above Congress will meet in the Auditorium of the Exposition Building, August 17, 1898, at 10 A. M. The Governor of each State and Territory is requested to appoint five white

and five colored citizens, either men or women, who are in keeping with the spirit of the call, as delegates to said Congress, and to notify the Chairman of the Committee of said appointments.

The Committee reserves the right to invite other persons from the respective States and Territories in order to insure the success of the Congress.

SAGASTA ADVOCATES WAR.

Spanish Premier Makes an Official Explanation.

DIPLOMACY IS ABANDONED.

He Tells His Followers It Is Time to Strike for the Nation's Integrity—Hope of a Peaceful Solution of the Trouble May Be Put Away.

Madrid, April 21.—The supporters of the government in both houses of parliament met in the senate chamber at 5 o'clock Tuesday afternoon. Senor Sagasta, the premier, addressed them as follows:

"The times are so grave and the circumstances are so exceptional that acts and not words are necessary to face the present difficulty. Attempts are being made to sully the glorious history of Spain by an infamous calumny. The different Spanish governments have done their utmost to avert war, to which we are being provoked. We have now reached the limits of concession compatible with honor and territorial integrity."

"We consented to the last concession at the instance of the pope and the powers. We yielded, in fact, but now attempts are being made upon our honor and menaces directed against our territory. That is a thing to which Spaniards will never consent. This is not the moment to trace a parliamentary programme, but the moment to unite ourselves, as our fathers have done, in the face of an odious attempt against the integrity of our territory. The insult offered us to-day is the most infamous that has ever been offered."

Continuing, Senor Sagasta counseled the rapid constitution of the chambers in order to accord to the government the means to defend the country's interests.

"Spain," he added, "will not allow a parcel of her territory to be taken from her with impunity, nor will she be a party to any trafficking for her possessions."

Seldom has there been witnessed a more impressive and significant scene. The large hall of the senate was densely crowded with liberal senators and deputies, who listened with breathless attention to the short speech of Senor Sagasta, only interrupting him with unanimous and loud applause when he indignantly alluded to the "unjustified and infamous aspersions cast upon Spain" with regard to the Maine disaster. Even more enthusiastic applause greeted his closing words, when he stoutly and proudly declared that the government hoped to receive the support of all Spaniards "in defense of their territory and ancient rights against more odious and unfair aggressions than any of their ancestors had repelled with the same energy and courage."

If the idea still existed in the mind of any one here that war could be avoided, Senor Sagasta's firm speech is regarded as finally settling all doubts.

Cabinet for Peace No Longer.

London, April 21.—The Madrid correspondent of the Daily Mail says: "A cabinet council was held very early this afternoon in order to consider the situation. The government adopted finally the resolutions respecting their relations with the United States. Ministers were unanimous in declaring that a conflict was now certain and quite at hand."

Woodford Remains in Madrid.

Madrid, April 21, midnight.—It was rumored in town that General Woodford would leave today, but he has authorized a formal denial of the report. Madrid is quiet.

Powers Will Take No Part.

London, April 21.—The great powers have definitely decided not to interfere in any way in event of war between Spain and the United States. The fact is that the European statesmen are not anxious to arouse the military and naval ambition of America. They realize that any offensive continental concert at this time would be certain to stir the American people profoundly, and result in a gigantic American navy which might upset the balance of military power of the world.

REJOICING IN PELLA.

Decision in Chicago Given Creditors of Cassatt Bank \$30,000.

PELLA, April 21.—Rejoicing was caused here by the decision by Judge Grosscup in Chicago holding brokers with whom E. R. Cassatt speculated on the board of trade with money of the defunct First National bank of Pella, for the amounts of the bank's money lost through them. The decision will bring at least \$30,000 to the creditors of the bank. It is far-reaching in that it sustained, it will compel brokers to secure accurate knowledge of the source of money which they handle for clients. E. R. Cassatt prior to 1894, was president of the First National bank of this city. He engaged in speculation on the board of trade and becoming involved used the bank's money. The money was sent to his brokers in the form of drafts issued by the First National bank of Pella on its Chicago correspondent and signed "E. R. Cassatt, president." The brokers contended that they had a right to regard the drafts as having been issued to Cassatt in the regular course of the bank's business, and further that the books of the bank showed credits to Cassatt sufficient to cover the drafts. Judge Grosscup held that due diligence had not been exercised by the brokers, that Cassatt's credits are merely nominal and would not have stood investigation had it been carefully made.

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GOV. SHAW ACTS.

Issues an Order to Guard Officers to Prepare for Active Service.

STATE OF IOWA, ATTORNEY GENERAL'S OFFICE, Des Moines, April 21, 1898.

GENERAL ORDERS, No. 15. Company commanders are hereby directed to at once require a physical examination of all officers and men of their companies, following carefully the instructions in General Orders No. 13 and 14, c. s. from this office. Des. All officers and men have been requested to make the examination and report the result to this office.

II. All members of companies who have family ties that would be detrimental to the service in the United States service in case Iowa should be called upon for troops, at the request of said soldiers should be accepted.

III. Men under the age of 21 years who cannot secure the written consent of parents or legally appointed guardian to volunteer in the United States service in case Iowa should be called upon for troops, at the request of said soldiers should be accepted.

IV. In enlistments for your company none but the members of the guard and those who have received military training shall be accepted.

V. Company commanders should keep the active strength of their companies up to not less than forty-five men, who, if they should be ordered into the field, will go. None other should be enlisted.

VI. Company commanders should take the name of all applicants who in their judgment will meet the requirements of general orders No. 14, and send them to the surgeons to be examined, and if they pass the examination take them as reserve members without enlistment to fill up the company to the required number. These men should drill and be disciplined ready to enter into active service.

BIG FIRE AT HOPKINTON.

Main Business Block Destroyed, With a Loss of Nearly \$20,000.

HOPKINTON, April 20.—The main business block of Hopkinton was destroyed by a disastrous fire, and before the flames were under control between twenty-five and thirty thousand dollars worth of property was destroyed.

The fire originated in a small shed in the rear of Reed & Petrie's grocery, its cause being a complete mystery, although rumors of incendiarism are afloat. From this small beginning the flames rapidly spread to the store building and then the wind spread the fire with alarming rapidity. In a short time the entire block was a blaze and the fire hopelessly beyond control.

Attention was given to saving buildings in adjoining blocks. Though these caught fire many times and all were badly scorched and damaged, the efforts of the firemen, aided by citizens and a hundred or more women clad in their best garments, as they came from church, proved successful.

CHARLES H. BRIGGS SUICIDES.

An Old Traveling Man of West Liberty Takes Landlady at Atlantic.

ATLANTIC, April 18.—Charles H. Briggs, a traveling man representing the August Steinn Dry Goods house of Davenport, bought an ounce of landlady and while in his room at the Park hotel drank it. He was beyond recovery when found. He was subject to periodical sprees, and while sober often remarked: "Man ought to be dead that drank liquor." He leaves a family at West Liberty. He was one of the oldest drummers on the road, and was over 50 years of age.

Great Western Shops at Oelwein.

OELWEIN, April 22.—The Chicago Great Western has awarded the contract for building its railway shops at this place for \$146,700. The contractors will erect ten single-story buildings with a combined floor space of 180,000 square feet, and put in complete sewer and water systems. The estimated cost of the completed shops is \$250,000, the equipment including the most improved iron and wood working machinery and electric traveling cranes, transfers and derricks.

Fell From a Pole.

DES MOINES, April 21.—Matthew Tracy, a lineman in the employ of the Mutual Telephone company, fell forty feet from a telephone pole and was seriously if not fatally injured. Tracy was at once taken to Cottage hospital but has been unconscious most of the time since the accident. His body was badly bruised, some of the small bones of the wrist broken and his shoulder dislocated. Attending physicians think that there is a chance of recovery.

Killed by a Train.

KEOKUK, April 21.—An unknown man, apparently 45 years old, was instantly killed while attempting to take a ride on the northbound Long Line stock train. His body was mutilated beyond recognition.

By Fatally Hurt.

OSKAHOOSA, April 21.—Arthur Broderrick, aged 10, was run over by an Iowa Central street engine and fatally injured. Both legs were cut off. He was stealing a ride and lost his hold.

IOWA CONDENSED.

At Dubuque recently the jury in the case of the Redman boys, on trial for the murder of their step-father, Jack Earle, brought in a verdict of not guilty. The boys pounded Earl to death with a club. Their defense was that he attacked them, also general inhuman treatment of them and their mother. Both are minors.

When brought before Justice Knapp at Cedar Falls a few days ago for preliminary hearing Col. W. H. McClure waived examination and was bound over to the grand jury on the charge of assault with intent to commit a felony. The aged attorney now admits he did wrong in trying to kill Conklin, but adds Conklin ought to have been killed, and under the same provocation he would doubtless try to kill him again.

Great excitement was caused at Cedar Falls recently by a shooting affray on Main street. Col. W. H. McClure, an attorney, aged 60 years, renewed a quarrel of some years' standing with Every Conklin. Later he purchased a revolver with the avowed intention of killing his enemy. Shortly afterward the men met in front of the Burr hotel, when McClure drew his revolver and opened fire, missing Conklin. The street was crowded at the time and everybody made for shelter. Officer Rehbeck, who was close at hand, took McClure in charge and afterward brought him before Justice Knapp. McClure confesses his intent to kill Conklin and says he will accomplish it yet. He has been a prominent member of the county bar for many years, but has been addicted to the use of intoxicants lately.

Sensational Suicide.

BURLINGTON, April 21.—A sensation was created in the Burlington College Institute by the suicide on the campus in full view of all the rooms, of Martin Sowden, a machinist, who discharged a shot gun into his breast. Instantly killing himself and setting fire to his clothing.

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ALL OVER THE WORLD

CORTES MEETS.

The Queen Regent Reads Her Speech From the Throne.

MADRID, April 21.—The cortes met yesterday afternoon. The queen regent read her speech from the throne, with the little king sitting at her right. She reviewed the situation and referred to the efforts of the pope for peace. The queen regent announced she had summoned the cortes to defend Spain's rights, appealed to the Spanish people to gather behind her son's throne. In conclusion the queen said: "Although a dark, gloomy future is before us, the difficulties are not beyond our powers. With our glorious army and navy and a united nation before the foreign aggression, we trust in God that we shall overcome without stain on our honor the baseless and unjust attacks made upon us."

JUNTA IS HAPPY.

Satisfied With the Resolutions Adopted by Congress.

NEW YORK, April 20.—The Cuban junta has given out a statement as to the attitude of the Cuban republic towards the United States in view of the resolutions passed by congress. It says the resolutions are tantamount to recognition of the Cuban republic because they recognize the independence of the Cuban people who acknowledge allegiance only to the Cuban republic. The only object of the insurrection is the independence of the Cuban people. It also says the action merits the deepest gratitude on the part of the Cubans and pledges the cooperation of the Cuban government and army in expelling the Spaniards.

SPANISH BOATS AT PORTO RICO

Terrible Torpedo Fleet Now a Menace to American Navy.

PROVINCETOWN, Mass., April 20.—The Barkentine Morales from Ponce, Porto Rico, reports that April 6 eight torpedo boats arrived from the Canaries. Two Spanish men-of-war are already there. A Spanish cruiser was also sighted as the vessel sailed. The boats and torpedo boat destroyers and cruisers Christobal Colon and Santa Maria Theresa were then at that port.

A Movement by the Powers.

LONDON, April 21.—The Rome correspondent of the Daily Mail says: "The Italian admiralty, I am privately informed, to-day commenced the men of the ironclads and six torpedo boats at La Spezia, under Admiral Acetina. To prepare immediately for sailing orders. I learn at the foreign office that the powers, including Great Britain, are in accord. They have so far decided to keep the struggle from European waters and to take measures to protect international commerce."

Alabama Launching May 18.

PHILADELPHIA, April 19.—It is learned that May 18 has been fixed as the date for the launching of the United States battle ship Alabama, in course of construction at Cramp's shipyard. The Alabama will be the first in the water of the three big battle ships contracted for in October, 1896. The other two, the Wisconsin and Illinois, are being built respectively at San Francisco and Newport News. All three are identically alike.

Sagasta Speaks.

MADRID, April 20.—In an address before the members of both houses of parliament Senator Sagasta said the insult offered Spain to-day is "the most infamous that has ever been offered. Spain," he added, "will not allow a parcel of her territory to be taken from her with impunity, nor will she be a party to any trafficking for her possessions." The speech was enthusiastically cheered.

Tennessee's Volunteers Ready.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., April 19.—Governor Taylor sent the following telegram to President McKinley: "Tennessee awaits your call for volunteers. The blue and gray will march together into battle under old glory, keeping step to the music of 'Yankee Doodle' and 'Dixie,' and the fire will fly and the earth will tremble."

Says Uncle Sam Is Right.

LONDON, April 20.—Sir Charles Dilke, a noted authority in England on foreign affairs, has declared that America is right in intervening in Cuba, and says his sympathies are with the United States. He thinks the decisive action will be fought at sea, and believes the war must end in a crushing defeat for Spain.

Gen. Lew. Wallace Will Fight.

INDIANAPOLIS, April 19.—General Lew Wallace, the famous soldier, diplomat and novelist, who was 71 years old April 10, has formally withdrawn from the race for the United States senate, and announced that he will enter the army and fight for Cuban independence.

President Killed.

NEW YORK, April 19.—A cable to the Evening World from Caracas, Venezuela, says President Joaquin Crespo, of Venezuela was killed in battle with Hernandez, leader of the rebel forces.

Stimulating Invention.

DES MOINES, April 22.—That the Trans-Mississippi Exposition at Omaha will stimulate invention in Nebraska and surrounding states cannot be doubted. That there is need of it as a means of promoting invention and manufacturing in the west is evidenced by the fact that only one patent was issued to Nebraska last week and only six to Iowa, while at the same time Massachusetts received 25, Ohio 29, and Pennsylvania 54.

TEXT OF THE ULTIMATUM.

Spain, Given Until the 23d to Answer, Hands Woodford Passports.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 21.—Following is a statement of the text of the ultimatum to Spain. On yesterday, April 20, 1898, about 11 a. m., the department of state served a notice of the purposes of this government by delivering to Minister Polo a copy of the instruction to Minister Woodford, also a copy of the resolutions passed by the congress of the United States on the 19th instant. After the report of this notice the Spanish minister forwarded to the state department a request for his passports, which were furnished him yesterday afternoon and a copy of the instructions to Woodford herewith appended. The United States minister at Madrid at the same time was instructed to make a like communication to the government of Spain. This morning the department received from General Woodford a telegram, a copy of which is herewith attached, showing that the Spanish government has broken off diplomatic relations with this government. This course renders unnecessary any further diplomatic action on the part of the United States:

"April 20, 1898. Woodford, Minister to Madrid.—You have been furnished the text of the joint resolution voted by the congress of the United States on the 19th instant and approved to-day, in relation to the independence of Cuba. In obedience to that act, the president directs you immediately to communicate to the government of Spain the said resolution with the formal demand of the government of the United States that the government of Spain relinquish its authority and government in the island of Cuba and withdraw its land and naval forces from Cuba and Cuban waters. In taking this step, the United States hereby disavows any disposition or intention to exercise sovereignty, jurisdiction or control over the said island except for the pacification thereof, and asserts the determination to respect and to guarantee the independence of Cuba, not to leave the government and control of the island to its people under such free independent government as they may establish. If by the hour of noon on Saturday next, the 23d day of April, there be not communicated to this government by that government a full and satisfactory response to this demand and resolution whereby the end of war in Cuba shall be assured, the president will proceed without further notice to use the power and authority conferred upon him by said joint resolution to such extent as may be necessary to carry the same into effect."

Madrid, April 21.—Sherman, Washington.—Early this (Thursday) morning, immediately after the receipt of your open telegram and before I had communicated the same to the Spanish government, the Spanish minister of foreign affairs notified me that diplomatic relations were broken between the two countries and that all communication between their respective representatives had ceased. Accordingly asked for safe passports. I turned the passport over to the British embassy and will leave for Paris this afternoon. Have notified the consuls.

WAR NOW A FACT.

Admiral Sampson's Squadron Begins the Blockade of Havana.

WASHINGTON, April 22.—Orders were issued from the war department for the North Atlantic squadron to sail to Havana and blockade that port. A dispatch from Key West at 2 o'clock this morning stated that the squadron was about to sail. The North Atlantic squadron, under Captain Sampson's command, is composed of the battleships Iowa and Indiana, monitors Puritan and Terror, armored cruiser New York (dagger), protected cruisers Cincinnati, Marblehead and Montgomery, gunboats Vicksburg, Wilmington and Annapolis, torpedo boats Erie, Cushing, Winslow and a large number of fast yachts and other vessels that have been added to the fleet by purchase. This force is quite competent to blockade all the ports in Cuba connecting by rail with Havana and likely to be used to supply that place in the event of siege with food and munitions of war.

SPANISH MINISTER LEAVES.

Senor Polo and His Party Leave Washington for Canada.

WASHINGTON, April 21.—When Senor Polo, Spanish minister to Washington, was handed a copy of the ultimatum which had been sent to the Spanish government, he at once applied for his passports. His application was honored immediately and at 7:30 last evening he left Washington with his suite for Canada, via Buffalo.

Ready for a Siege.

NEW YORK, April 22.—It is said New York merchants have recently sold Havana merchants a sufficient amount of provisions to enable that city to stand a siege of five months.

BREVITIES.

The government has chartered the big steamers St. Louis, St. Paul, Paris and New York. Negotiations have been reopened for the purchase of two warships and several torpedo boats from the government of Chili.

General Gary has issued a circular to the postoffice employees to the effect that such of them as wish may volunteer, should the president call for their services, assuring them that they may return to their positions at the end of their military service.

Governor Wolcott, of Massachusetts, sent a message to the legislature recommending the appropriation of \$500,000 to increase the efficiency of the militia. A bill was at once framed in accordance with the governor's recommendations, referred to committee, reported back, and under a suspension of the rules passed both branches, becoming a law with the governor's signature in twenty-five minutes after the message was received.

There was a serious disturbance at Malaga, Spain, recently, resulting in an attack upon the United States consulate. The demonstration began with the parading of small crowds through the streets shouting patriotic cries. But a mob eventually gathered and attacked the United States consulate. Stones were thrown and one of the mob leaders procured a ladder, tore down the shield having upon it the arms of the United States, and dragged it along the streets. The prefect was summoned, and addressed the people, begging them to disperse, which to some degree restored order. Afterwards the streets were patrolled by gendarmes. Later the shield was replaced on the consulate, amid the tumultuous protests of the crowd. Orders were also issued to give the consul satisfaction and to arrest the ring leaders of the outbreak.

CONSERVATIVES FINALLY WIN.

House and Senate Finally Reach an Agreement.

WASHINGTON, April 19.—After one of the hardest fought battles between the two houses known in many years, congress, at an early hour this morning, came to an agreement upon the most momentous question it has dealt with in a third of a century. The Cuban resolution was passed and will be sent to the president this morning. It provisions mean the expulsion of Spain from the island of Cuba by the armed forces of the United States. There were many roll calls in both houses, and each body held tenaciously for its own resolution. The conferees had great difficulty in agreeing. The first conference showed a determination on the part of the house not to yield a single point, and it was only after long consultations with the house leaders that they agreed to allow the little words "and and" in the first section of the senate resolution, which declares that "the people of Cuba are, and ought to be, free and independent." The resolution as finally adopted is that reported from the senate committee on foreign relations, with the addition of the fourth section, known as the Teller amendment, disclaiming any intention on the part of the United States to acquire Cuba. The resolution as finally agreed upon is as follows:

Joint resolution for the recognition of the independence of the people of Cuba, demanding that the government of Spain relinquish its authority and government in the island of Cuba and withdraw its land and naval forces from Cuba and Cuban waters, and directing the president to use the land and naval forces of the United States to carry these resolutions into effect.

Whereas the conditions which have existed for more than three years in the island of Cuba, so near our own borders, have shocked the moral sense of the people of the United States and have been a disgrace to Christian civilization, culminating as they have in the destruction of the United States battleship, with the loss of many lives, and the suffering of the Cuban people, and whereas the president, on a friendly visit to the harbor of Havana, and not longer to be endured, as has been set forth by the president of the United States in his message to congress, April 11, 1898, upon which the action of congress was invited, therefore it is

Resolved, First—That the people of the island of Cuba are, and of a right ought to be, free and independent.

Second—That it is the duty of the United States to demand, and the government of the United States has hereby demanded, that the government of Spain at once relinquish authority and government in the island of Cuba and withdraw its land and naval forces from Cuba and Cuban waters.

Third—That the president of the United States be, and he hereby is, directed and empowered to use the entire land and naval forces of the United States and call into actual service the militia of

A POLYGLOT COMMUNE

ENGLISH - SPEAKING MINERS
DRIVEN OUT.

The Origin of the "Molly Maguires"—Strikes Were Responsible for the Bringing in of Miners from Austria-Hungary and Italy.

The current number of The Century has a group of papers on the coal regions of Pennsylvania. Mr. Henry Edward Rood, writing of "A Polyglot Community," says:

When anthracite came into general use, the original miners quickly established themselves in their adopted homes, and ceased to speak regrettably of childhood associations in Wales or in England. They had an abundance of work here, and what they would seem a fortune in the old country. In those days a Pennsylvania miner deemed it an unlucky month if he and his two brawny sons failed to earn \$200 or more. They were not always paid at regular intervals before and during the civil war, for money was not plentiful in this region. But they were credited fully on the books of the company, and they were permitted, if not encouraged, to purchase goods at the company store, where could be obtained food, clothing, tools, furniture—in fact, about all the necessities and comforts and luxuries the miner had learned to use. Prices were high, but wages corresponded, and work was steady. But after the terrible struggle between north and south came a period of depression in business. Selling prices dropped lower and lower, and wages felt the result. But the average miner did not understand this. He saw that the operator of the colliery took wife and children to Philadelphia or New York as often as in previous years, and that the superintendent wore clothing as costly as ever. He forgot that while he had been spending his wages every month, and often exceeding his account at the company store, the operator and other officials had been saving at least a portion, if not the greater portion, of their earnings. The miners grew discontented, and talked the matter over.

As the panic drew near, they had more idle hours than ever; and their complaints reached the ears of smooth-tongued rascals who "organized" them into a band ready to resist any further "oppression," as the business changes were termed. And right at this point let it be said that the old-time professional agitators referred to were wholly different from the responsible, intelligent men who have performed such good service during recent years in organizing and directing trades-unions like those which embrace the printers and locomotive engineers and firemen. If the anthracite miners of Pennsylvania had been wisely led and firmly controlled in the early seventies, the Keystone state would not be spared many black chapters in her history. But such happiness was not foreordained. Owing in some degree to the troublous times, and in a greater degree to a group of beings more devilish than human, there sprang into active combat a portion of the commonwealth the most brutal, vindictive, terrible conspiracy that ever a civilized community had been cursed with in recent times—the Molly Maguires; and it required the genius of Franklin B. Gowen of the Reading railroad, and the marvelous courage of James McParland, a Pinkerton detective, to break it up, and hang its leading spirits, not singly, but in groups of ten. Then, within a few years, came the "long strike" in the Lehigh region, when the old hands refused to work under any consideration. Week after week and month after month dragged by. The collieries remained idle; the men, women and children almost starved. Fortunes were lost in flooded mines and in burning breakers. And at last one of the greatest of the commonwealth sent abroad to Austria-Hungary and brought thence to his mining-patch in Pennsylvania the first of the "foreigners," who have long ago succeeded, by their very presence, in driving out all of the English-speaking miners who could obtain work elsewhere and who had the means to remove their families. It is an old story now, how the first of the Slovaks, Poles, Italians and Sicilians who came here were comparatively intelligent, and learned readily, in the course of a few years, the work of mining coal. And we all know that year by year the immigrants of such nationalities decreased in the scale of civilization until those who have come to the anthracite fields during the first half of the present decade are, as a rule, more dangerous to the body politic than the excluded Chinese; for not only are they eager to work for wages on which an English-speaking family would starve, but they are superstitious and murderous, and do not hesitate to use dynamite if they desire to blow up the home of one whom they particularly hate. Also, unlike the average Chinese man, each of these foreign miners insists on voting as soon as possible.

TRYING TO DISFRANCHISE THE COLORED VOTERS.

AS TOLD BY MAJOR S. H. M. BYERS IN HIS EASTER LETTER.

After describing the novel and picturesque old city of New Orleans, his visit to the battle-field where General Jackson killed more than a thousand British, while only losing but a dozen of his men. In speaking of the misunderstanding with Spain he says that the United States should not allow any of the States to disfranchise its citizen because their face is black, and that the Government should take steps to prevent it, he has this to say of that convention. "The Louisiana state convention is a far more important one than the one in session in New Orleans. We attended some, and listened to the debates. They seem to cover every conceivable subject of legislation, and in the constitution is once finished, it will have no use for a legislature. The constitution itself will provide for everything and it will be as good as Webster's dictionary. The one rank openly admitted profranchise of the new constitution is the utter disfranchisement of the black voter. That is bound to come to Louisiana already here, unless the power of the United States government steps in to prevent it. How a northerner might feel living here among millions of illiterate people—first out of Africa and next out of slavery—would be hard to guess. He might get to feeling just as 'downers' feel." All the same, law is law, and human beings are human beings, and the efforts of this state to make semi-slaves of the blacks is unconstitutional and a crime. But as the constitution is not to be submitted to the popular vote, the crime is, virtually, already committed, and what is the United States going to do about it?

If Louisiana can disfranchise the Negro—all Southern States can do the same thing—and then where is the constitution of the United States? Instead of blathering about war on account of liberty for the Cubans, it were better to secure liberty for our own people and a decent respect for the constitution of the United States. We do not hear the warning, slavery in a modified form is one of the quickening institutions of this country. These millions of Negroes in the south can not remain long as they are.

Either they will be slowly legislated back into slavery or they must be educated and made into proper men and women. The problem is of a hundred times the importance to this country than any Cuba or Hawaii can be. The south is not slumbering on a volcano—it is simply drifting into helplessness from the nightmare of millions of slaves set free and left in ignorance. A night-mare of a problem will yet be made the north. Quick communication has made Mississippi close to New Orleans close to Chicago. The injustice of one section will be a sin of all; the problem of the south the problem of all the country. To observe the present action of this convention is not a whit better than the state's ordinance of secession in 1861. In both cases the laws and constitution of the United States were in defiance, and again the question is, "what are you going to do about it?"

DEADLY SHOTS FIRED BY GUN

In One Instance an Innocent Man Was Sentenced to Be Hanged.

In a recent paper appeared an account of a strange accident in which a man was killed by the discharge of a gun while lying asleep on a lounge in his room, the weapon being discharged by reflected rays of the sun falling upon the cartridge chamber of the firearm, says the Cincinnati Enquirer. Since the publication of the story a correspondent from York, Pa., writes concerning the accident and refers to a similar case, in which, through the efforts of a clever Cincinnati lawyer named G. C. Wallis, the person accused of murder and sentenced to be hanged was set at liberty, the circumstantial evidence on which he was convicted being entirely exploded by a witnessed demonstration as to how the accident really occurred. The York correspondent referred to volume 17 of the Criminal Law Magazine, page 607, on which a full account of the case appears. The case was that of the state of Tennessee against Avery, tried in Henry county, that state, and is one of the most remarkable in the history of criminal jurisprudence. In June, 1887, Charles Ensley, the cousin of a man of the name of Avery, was killed in his room while lying on a lounge about 3 o'clock in the afternoon. The weapon which caused the death was a small rifle, sending a 32-caliber ball through Ensley's brain. No one was in the house at the time but Ensley. An empty rifle was found lying on a rack on a wall of the room in which the killing occurred and the bullet fitted the tube. Avery was arrested; the crime, as he was the only living relative to Ensley, and by the death profited to the amount of about \$100,000. Avery was tried, pleaded not guilty, but was convicted of murder in the first degree and sentenced to be hanged. He appealed to the Supreme court and engaged Mr. Wallis to defend him. The Supreme court remanded the case back to the Circuit court on technical errors. Two mistrials were brought about and then came the strangest part of the story. The brilliant Wallis struck the keynote to the mystery. In August, 1891, he had the rifle loaded and hung on the wall. A white sheet with the form of a man marked on it was placed in exactly the position occupied by Ensley when lying asleep, and a heavy cut-glass pitcher of water like the one found in the room was placed on the shelf above. The temperature was 90 degrees in the shade, one of the hottest days of the year. The pitcher acted as a sun-glass and the hot rays of the sun shining through the water were refracted directly on the cartridge chamber of the rifle. Eight witnesses were in the room and a few minutes after 3 o'clock a puff and a report occurred and the ball struck the outlined form back of the ear in the exact location where Ensley was shot and the theory of circumstantial evidence went to pieces. The incident, being witnessed and sworn to, readily explained itself to the jury.
