American Pilot Speeds Selassie to War Front

Senator Tom Connally Asked To Act in Punishing Leaders

New York, Nov. 22—Senator Tom Connally of Texas, who wrote the N. A. A. C. P. last December that he did not intend to support the Costigan-Wagner anti-lynching bill because he believed the states could and would stop lynching, was asked this week by the N. A. A. C. P. to advise it of what steps the state of Texas was taking to punish the lynchers of Benjie Mitchell, 15, and Ernest Collins, 16, who were hung November 12th by a mob at Columbus, Texas. The N. A. C. P. telegram stated in part:

"We call your attention to statement of County Attorney Moore describing lynchings as 'expression of will of people' and to statement of County Attorney Hahn, who violates every principle of judicial behavior by calling dead boys guilty when no trial had been had to establish their guilt. Texas has supplied country with seveneenth and eighteenth lynchings of 1935, thirteen of which have occurred since 'fillbuster' proving states cannot or will not act. Please advise if you in coming session of congress will support federal legislation."

The association also telegraphed a protest to President Roosevelt on the two lynchings in Texas and the lynching of a white CCC worker in West Virginia.

U.'s, \$1.50; Woman's Missionary societies, \$1.50; other auxiliaries, \$1.50; conventions, \$10.00. Expenses: Lodging, per night, 50 cents; meals, 35 cents.

Due to the closeness of this meeting there will be none held this year in the east central region. Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Kentucky, Michigan, Wisconsin and Minnesota delegates are invited to participate at Des Moines. Dr. L. K. Williams of Chicago, who will speak, is president; Rev. J. M. Nabrit, Atlanta, Ga., secretary, of the National Baptist convention.

Van Cawley Guilty 2nd Degree Charge

Van Cawley was found guilty of second degree murder Friday after the jury had received the case Thursday afternoon. The penalty is from ten years to life.

HOWARD DEFENDING

A motion to dismiss the murder charge against Van Cawley, 45, transient, of Louisiana, accused of killing Altha Turner of Independence with an ash stand in a fight over a crap game, was overruled in Judge Russell Jordan's court Wednesday. The state rested its case in the afternoon.

Van Cawley, represented by Charles P. Howard, criminal lawyer, began his plea Thursday morning. "Bad whiskey and dope given by the inmates caused the killing" was basis of the defense. The fatal battle occurred October 19th at 207 Ridge street.

Los Angeles, Calif., Nov. 22—Home runs by Mule Suttles, one by Bill Wright and one by Zolzie Wright, a triple by Brewer and three doubles by Turkey Stearns featured Tom Wilson's Elite Giants' attack as the Giants defeated Joe Pirone's All Stars, 13 to 5, in the first game of their three game series Saturday afternoon at Wrigley field. The Giants gave Mallin a surprise party in the eighth inning when they scored eight runs on ten hits.

After getting off to a bad start, Chet Brewer pitched a fine game and only allowed three hits after the first inning and struck out seven batters. The Giants made their hits' count, getting eighteen.

Sunday Games

The Elite Giants and Pirone's All Stars divided a doubleheader on Sunday afternoon. The Giants won the first game with Paige and Griffith pitching shut out ball. Paige pitched two hits for five innings, when he was relieved by School Boy Griffith, who pitched great ball for four innings, not allowing a hit and striking out six batters. HAUPTMANN APPEAL TO HIGH COURT BASED ON N. A. A. C. P. CASE

New York, Nov. 22—Lawyers for Bruno Richard Hauptmann, convicted of kidnaping and killing the Lindbergh baby, are basing their appeal to the United States supreme court on the decision in a case fought and won by the N. A. A. C. P. The case is known legally as Moore vs. Dempsey, 26 U. S. A. 86, and was the principal case in the sharecropper fight in Phillips county, Arkansas, made by the N. A. A. C. P. in 1919-24. The decision of the high court was that a trial in a court dominated by mob sentiment was not due process of law and was therefore unconstitutional.

Hauptmann attorneys are attempting to show the U. S. supreme court that his trial was dominated by mob sentiment. Prior to the winning of the Arkansas case by the N. A. A. C. P. there was no such ruling in American law. Leo Frank's lawyers made a similar appeal from his conviction in Georgia, but the court refused to make such a ruling. Several years later the N. A. A. C. P. took the Arkansas cases up on appeal and won.

PRESSION MADE IN TEXAS

In last week's issue of The Bystander a heading, "Will of the People," says County Attorney Moore, concerning the lynching of two youths in Texas, was misconstrued by several of our readers as meaning C. Edwin Moore, assistant Polk county attorney in Des Moines. Attorney O. P. Moore of Columbus, Texas, made the statement which aroused nationwide resentment.

Atty. Moore, of 1437 Milton avenue here, is noted for his fairness and square dealings with Negroes. He is well known and liked by the colored people for his vigorous prosecution in several civil rights cases. Graduating from East High, he took his law course at Drake university. It is said that he plans to run for municipal judge next spring.

SAM LANGFORD IS SERI- OUSLY HURT BY TAXI

New York, N. Y., Nov. 22—Sam

Langford, years ago one of the greatest prize fighters ever to pull on a pair of gloves, is in a hospital, the result of being run down by a taxicab.

Sam, who is almost blind, was crossing the street when a taxi driven by Eustace C. Eaves approached, and although the driver sounded his horn, Sam could not get out of the way in time. He was knocked to the pavement and the wheels of the car driven over him.

Chester Simms of North on Tribune's 2nd All-City Eleven

NEGRO PLAYERS BELOW USUAL AWARD STANDARD By Everett Wadsworth Staff Writer

For the first time in many years a Negro was not selected on the first squad of the Tribune's all-city football team, chosen annually by Frank Brody, sports writer. The usual number of colored grid players appeared in the East and North High lineups all season, but were not outstanding enough to merit all-star honors. All were good, hard workers, but they lacked the usual brilliance of most Negro ball carriers. The bulk of the positions went to Roosevelt, titleholders. There are no colored players at the west end institution.

Hit by injuries, ineffectiveness and dissonance, North High suffered a most disastrous season. Chester Simms, converted from guard to fullback, was the class of the Pink and Green eleven. Severe leg injuries prevented his appearance in the final two games, which handicapped his chances. Simms was awarded tackle position on the second team. Lester Jefferson, a new backfield "find," proved a sensation and is expected to "go places" next year. Due to an infraction of a school rule, Ozzie Lewis, halfback, was kept out of several games, which dimmed what otherwise might have been a brilliant career.

East High, facing the toughest schedule in Iowa, with not a "breather" in between, made a fairly good record as runnersup for city champion.

REPORT 2,000 ETHIOPIANS

DIE IN AIR RAID

Asmara, Eritrea, Nov. 22—Italian aerial squadron under Gen. Aimone fought a two hour battle with a strong Ethiopian land force, resulting in the killing, it is reported, of 2,000 Ethiopians. The bombing was executed by twenty planes which had scouted an Ethiopian force estimated between 15,000 and 20,000 concentrating in the narrow valley of Mai Mesic, south of Buia, the most advanced point of the main Italian forces on the northern front. The plane swooped down to within 100 feet of the ground, dropping four and one-half pound bombs. The bombers were constantly under severe rifle and anti-aircraft shell fire.

The planes of Brune and Vittorio, Mussolini's two sons, were hit nine times. Two planes were forced down. Each plane of the twenty had ten or fifteen bullet holes.

Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, Nov. 22—Emperor Haile Selassie boarded the imperial plane piloted by John Robinson, formerly of Chicago, in a hurried dash to Dessaye, the chief war base in the north. The emperor will direct all operations of the armies under Ras Siyoum, Ras Kassa and Ras Mulu Geta. He will move incognito among his troops so as to avoid being bombed or captured by the Italians. It was announced officially that for an indefinite period no one will be allowed to report his majesty's movements.

Rome, Italy, Nov. 22—The failure of the 69 year old General Emilio de Bono to bring Ethiopia to her knees has resulted in his dismissal from the Italian colonial army in East Africa. The military plans that were mapped out by Mussolini's war council anticipated a quick, substantial victory that would force the adamant emperor of Ethiopia to sue for peace before the application of the League's sanctions became a fact.

Jack Blackburn is On \$10,000 Bond

TRAINERS OF LOUIS FACES

COURT DECEMBER 5TH

Chicago—Assault to kill charges were nolle prossed against Jack Blackburn, 52, trainer of Joe Louis, and John Bowman, 24, Tuesday in felony court and the state instituted counts of manslaughter against Blackburn and William Parnell and then had both taken into custody on bonds of \$10,000 each.

This was the latest step in efforts to find the slayer of Enoch Houser, 69 year old Tuskegee graduate, who was shot down October 20th during a gun battle between four men in front of 357 E. Fifty-seventh street. All the cases were continued until December 5th.

Blackburn, Parnell, Bowman and "Red" Ellis were released on November 2 at the inquest conducted into the killing when the coroner's jury at the county morgue said Houser came to his death at the hands "of a person or persons unknown to this jury."

HERE'S WHAT OZE SIMMONS HAS SET IN GRID RECORDS

Iowa City, Iowa, Nov. 22—In eighty-eight attempts from scrimmage, 533 yards; average of six yards per play. In six games, 533 yards traveled; average of 88 yards per game. Touchdown trips: 71, 63, 60, 59, 51, and a one yard plunge.

Such are the figures on the major offensive achievements of Oze Simmons, University of Iowa back. And the statistics don't show the forward passes he has batted down or intercepted, the tackles he has made, or the blocks he has hurled when other Iowans carried the ball.

These are the details of Simmons' scoring: 51 yards return of punt, South Dakota; 60 yards after getting lateral pass from Dick Crayne, South Dakota; 63 yards after getting lateral from Bush Lamb, Colgate 71 yards through line, Illinois, and 59 yards around end, Indiana.

And his gains of 1935 to date: 10 yards in four trials, Bradley Tech; 23 yards in seven trials, South Da-

kota; 120 yards in 21 trials, Colgate; 192 yards in 19 trials, Illinois; 119 yards in 18 trials, Indiana, and 69 yards in 18 trials, Minnesota.

BRAGG DIES AT HIS HOME
Edgar R. Bragg of 762 Ninth street died Tuesday at his home. He is the brother of James E. Bragg, veteran showman and former actor, who is now conducting a booking agency. James Bragg was stage director of the Bystander Negro talent week and has done much toward putting colored entertainers on the road.

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SEE THE PUBLIC ABOUT YOUR ORGANIZATION

Now that the political campaigns are beginning to take on more life, many political clubs and organizations are springing up or reviving their old activities.

Keeping in mind that it has always been the policy of the Bystander to open its columns to all groups, this announcement reiterates its welcome of all these groups to use the columns of the paper at all times.

"ON THE UNIVERSITY"

A reporter interviewed Ozzie Simmons at Iowa Monday. The football hero gave a short but intelligent statement and wound up by saying "Please don't put such words as dos, dat and dis in it. Really they are a reflection on the University."

Too often reporters quote intelligent Negroes and manage to get in a lot of broken English, which they know the party did not state.

In this instance Ozzie gave a new angle, as he is capable of doing on the football field. "It is a reflection on the University."

STILL WRONG

When the Macon County, Alabama, grand jury indicted the Scottsboro boys last week, one Negro was on the jury. This was arranged so as to meet the constitutional objection upon which the Supreme Court threw out the last trial.

It is wrong in principle to exclude Negroes from the jury service; it is equally wrong to choose Negroes for jury service knowing in advance who is and who is not to be on the jury.

The Bystander hopes that the Negro member based his vote on the evidence as presented to the grand jury and not any pre-arranged deal which was put up to hang these boys "legally." There is too much evidence of jury tampering.

ENCOURAGING SIGNS

At the recent election in Kentucky, a young Negro lawyer, was elected to the legislature on the Republican ticket. He was elected in spite of the Democratic landslide and is the first of the race to be a member of the Kentucky legislature since the late nineties.

The presence of a Negro in the legislature is bound to help the group in Kentucky; it is an inspiration to the race and sure sign of improvement in the general status of the race. Undoubtedly other border and southern states will follow suit as the Negro realizes and uses his political strength.

A BETTER SETTING

The picture "Sanders of the River" starring Paul Robeson was shown at the Paramount theatre last week. As usual Robeson performed wonderfully well and nobody would say that he was not a topnotcher through the whole performance.

Health Talks

IMMUNIZATIONS AGAINST DIPHTHERIA

Valuable public educational work has been done, in a number of states regarding the prevention of diphtheria, but the vast majority of parents are not yet sufficiently impressed with the importance of the procedure, nor are they aware that it can be accomplished now by one injection of a toxoid, which is entirely safe and rarely causes the child any inconvenience. The day may come when no child will be admitted to classes who is not immunized against diphtheria.

Just as small-pox has gradually disappeared by vaccination so can diphtheria. The disease is definitely preventable at a very low cost, but is very difficult to cure and very expensive to treat along with the added expense and grief of a funeral which follows in a large percentage of cases.

The present season is an appropriate one for performing the above service to all children past six months of age; we urge all our readers to give this matter serious consideration and to take some action without delay.

Columbus, Texas—Chalking up the season's high with number eighteen lynchings, more than 700 persons, including several women, took two Negro youths accused of the murder of Geraldine Kolman from Colorado county officers Tuesday and hanged them to a live oak tree four miles north of Columbus. "It is an expression of the will of the people," commented County Attorney O. P. Moore on the incident. The blood-thirsty gang is still searching for another Negro whom they say is implicated in the crime.

The two prisoners, Benny Mitchell, 15, and Ernest Collins, 16, were being taken from Houston to Columbus Deputy Sheriff Berry Townsend for trial Wednesday in juvenile court for criminally attacking and killing the girl October 17th. As the officers and their prisoners reached a bridge at Altair, eleven miles south of here, the mob stopped them, jerked the boys from the car and rushed them to a spot only a mile from the farm of the slain girl's parents.

Accused of Thievery

Miss Kolman, high school graduate, was criminally attacked, slain and her body thrown into Cummings creek, which flows through her father's pasture. Miss Kolman is thought to have been killed when she rode into the pasture in search of thieves who had been stripping pecan trees. Police claim the Negroes said in their confessions they were seated on a log on the farm when the girl approached on her horse.

When they denied they had been stealing pecans, she told them to follow her and she would show them a tree that had been stripped. Officers quoted the Negro boys as saying they conceived the idea of attacking her as they walked behind her. "Let the law take its course," pleaded E. B. Moran, an Episcopal rector, as the "citizens" wreaked their vengeance with the rope.

BUYING GERMAN STEEL

A plan to buy steel in Germany to build a bridge in New York is under fire. The proponents of the plan say that they can buy a million pounds of German steel piling for less than the American price. Enemies of the plan say it is taking from American workers, and giving to German workers, employment. The unannounced, real objection to this steel purchase from Germany is that it is helping to finance the German steel industry and Hitler's program, with American dollars.

This, in effect, would amount to an endorsement of Hitler's persecution of the Jews. It is not hard to figure out who is making that objection, and can just about bet that the objection is going to stand, and the steel will not be bought from Germany.

I wonder if my folks will ever learn the above simple lesson? After all, the war of today is an economic war. Let nobody tell you that you cannot go a long way in fighting your own battle economically. The white man is too busy fighting his own battle to start any for you, but if you start your own and it is well founded, he will help you.

Jews alone in America will not be able to stop this purchase of German steel, but American public opinion, a righteous institution, if sufficiently aroused will stop it.

POPE PIUS-MUSSOLINI ALLIANCE

Pope Pius is repeatedly reported in the public press as favoring Mussolini's effort to steal Ethiopia. You can dress it up in all the languages you want to, but it amounts to just that. The only addition that could be made by way of mitigation is that he proposes to make the theft in broad daylight and consummate it by means of downright murder of those who resist him.

Now I have been one of those who absolutely refused to permit myself to hold any blanket prejudice against the Catholic religion and persist in that position, but Pope Pius is reported in the papers of November 14 as making a supreme effort to have applications for sanctions against Italy postponed because of his belief "that a delay in sanctions not only would spare the world great economic disorder, but also would increase tremendously chances for settlement of the Italo-Ethiopian war, which might come through COLLAPSE OF THE ETHIOPIAN RESISTANCE."

Now that simply means what it says, and to me it further means that the Pope is using his high ecclesiastical office to keep Ethiopia in a situation in which she will not be able to resist Mussolini's idea to take their country or murder them all.

You may criticize me all you want to, but all of my life I have found it difficult to have any regard whatever for Christianity as it is applied by its proponents to Negroes. Experiences of this kind make it even more difficult. If the Pope cannot be depended upon to demonstrate a practical application of the teachings of Christ toward all people, who can he? The irony of it all is that the prevailing Christian faith in Ethiopia is Catholic.

Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) divided into Two Hundred Shares (200) of the par value of Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) per share, all of which shall be known as common stock. The stock shall be issued only when paid for in full, in cash or in property, as required by law and shall be issued at such time and in such manner as may be determined by the Board of Directors. The holders of Capital Stock shall be entitled to vote at any and all stockholders' meetings, and each share of stock shall be entitled to one vote, which may be exercised in person or by proxy. The stock shall be negotiable, and the property of stockholders shall be exempt from corporate liability. The corporation shall begin its existence on the date of issuance of the certificates of incorporation by the Secretary of the State of Iowa (October 31, 1935), and shall continue for a period of twenty (20) years, unless sooner dissolved by a majority of the outstanding stock at an annual meeting or special meeting called for that purpose; and the
