C. EDWIN MOORE WILL RUN FOR MUNICIPAL JUDGE

Assistant County Attorney C. Edwin Moore will be in the race for municipal judge in March, according to his statement this week. Graduating from East High and completing his law course at Drake, Moore became one of the foremost and outstanding attorneys in the city. He became assistant to County Attorney Carl Burkman two years ago, where he made a commendable record as prosecutor in several civil rights cases.

Atty. Moore is well known among Negroes of Des Moines and numbers among his friends and former schoolmates many colored people. He now lives at 1437 Milton avenue, is married and has one child. He is a member of the East Des Moines club, Masonic, Moose and Redmen lodges.

Atty. Moore stated: "If, after full consideration of the qualifications of all the candidates, the voters of this city see fit to elect me as one of the judges of the municipal court, I will endeavor to judge the cases of all persons impartially, cautiously and charitably."

HASBROUCK IN RACE FOR PUBLIC SAFETY POST

Henry Hasbrouck, long associated with the Y. M. C. A. and the Crocker branch, has, by the wishes of his many friends, decided to run for superintendent of public safety. Hasbrouck has been the "Y" athletic director for thirteen years and also supervisor of the Crocker Y. M. C. A. During his tenure many changes have come about which endeared him to the Negro race. His persistent efforts made it possible for hundreds of Negro boys to attend the "Y" camp at Boone, Iowa, and did not draw the color line. Many Negro boys enjoyed an experience that they would have otherwise been deprived of. He was always a counselor to all Negro boys.

He was responsible for the famous Globe Trotters making several appearances in Des Moines and it gave the public a different slant to those who thought the Negro inferior. He has spent innumerable hours with committees of the Negro race trying

to help solve their problems, advising and offering suggestions that might make for better living and closer cooperation between Negro and white races. Hasbrouck is asking that they all show their appreciation of him by voting for him at the primary election on Tuesday, March 17.

Hasbrouck, who is 44, and lives at 2411 York street, said he would resign February 15th as athletic director at the Y. M. C. A. so that he can devote full time to the campaign. He is a former professional in football, baseball, basketball and wrestling, and before serving in the world war was on patrol duty for lumber companies in the Hudson Bay country. He is married and is a member of Home Masonic lodge, the American Legion, East Des Moines club, Service Men's club and First Lutheran church.

GRUND IN RACE FOR MUNICIPAL JUDGE

Harry B. Grund, assistant county attorney, is a candidate for the office of municipal court judge. Grund, who has practiced law in Des Moines for over thirteen years, has been an assistant in the county attorney's office for over three years under Carl A. Burkman, county attorney.

Grund, who started life as a newsboy and then worked nights as a printer and went to school in the day, worked his way through high school, college and law school. He is a member of the Des Moines Typographical union and has held office in that organization and in the Trades and Labor Assembly and the Iowa State Federation of Labor.

Always fighting in behalf of the under dog, Grund has been active in the fight for the old age pension and pioneered that law in Iowa. He is now fighting an attempt to bring into Des Moines the city manager plan.

If elected to the office of judge, Grund said that he would treat every person that came before him alike, regardless of color or religion.

Grund, an overseas veteran, and a member of the American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars, was one of the foremost fighters in behalf of the bonus payment to veterans.

Young Harlem Paraders Carry Banners, Distribute Leaflets

Brooklyn, N. Y., Feb. 7.—When Senator William E. Borah of Idaho spoke here Tuesday night, January 28, opening his campaign for nomination for president, he was greeted by fifty pickets who carried signs criticizing his stand on the Costigan-Wagner anti-lynching bill. The pickets, who were members of the Brooklyn junior branch of N. A. A. C. P., the Harlem branch, the Youth Council of Abyssinian Baptist church, and the Rev. T. S. Harten's Holy Trinity Baptist church, braved a biting wind in the below freezing temperature in order to let the senator and the Republican party know how colored people felt about Mr. Borah's views on lynching. Also assisting in the picketing were a few members of a Young Socialist group in Brooklyn. Prominent among the pickets was Ben Johnson, famous Columbia sprint star.

Some of the signs were designed by Aaron Douglas, famous artist and mural painter, and by Romare Bearden, well known young cartoonist. Among the legends on the placards were: "Borah Talks While Lynchers Lynch," "How About Lynching, Senator Borah?" "94 Women Lynched, Yet Borah Opposes Federal Law," "The States Have Not Stopped Lynching," "Stop Lynch Terror, Remember Scottsboro."

The placards designed by Mr. Douglas showed a Negro being lynched, with the legend, "Borah Opposes a Federal Law To Stop This." The pickets also distributed 2,500 leaflets, which stated briefly the facts about lynching and quoted the 14th amendment to the constitution: "No person shall be deprived of life, liberty or property without due process of law." Arrangements to picket the meeting were made by the national office of the N. A. A. C. P. and were in charge of Miss Juanita E. Jackson, who recruited the pickets and attended to all details. There were 100 more volunteers for picketing than could be used, especial eagerness being shown by young colored people.

Drive Wipes Out Black Shirt Unit

HAILE'S MEN CUT OFF WATER
FROM ITALIANS—SEE

FALL OF MAKALE

Addis Ababa, Feb. 7.—A new drive suddenly launched and with characteristic swiftness and fury of the Ethiopian army wiped out the famous Black Shirt division and decimated Italian reinforcements commanded by Gen. Diamanti.

The Ethiopian and the Italian struggle for possession of the seventy-five mile road between Makale and Adowa, in northern Ethiopia. Mussolini's men will be forced to recapitulate under the sporadic attacks of native roving bands.

This large scale engagement begun forty-eight hours ago is still raging with Ras Desta Demtu attacking the Adowa road from the south, Ras Kaassa from the east, while Ras Mulughetta's army stationed around Seket, and acting as a reserve, can be thrown into action as emergency requires.

According to an official communique issued by Ethiopian general staff, 3,000 Italians have been killed and 5,000 wounded. In this battle near Tembien eighteen tanks, thirty-three field guns, 175 machine guns, and 1,600 rifles have been captured by Ethiopian warriors.

Judge Cooter Effects Truce Between Rev. and J. H. Sims

A series of lawsuits which began in the Polk district court in September and threatened to disrupt father and son relationships, was peaceably ended in the municipal court Tuesday, after two days' jury trial, when Judge Chas. S. Cooter conferred with the parties and their attorneys privately and suggested a way of settlement which was accepted. The father and son, each with tears streaming down their cheeks, embraced the other at the conclusion of the ordeal.

The parties to this unfortunate four months' litigation were the Rev. J. P. Sims, 83, a retired A. M. E. church minister, who now lives with his daughter, Mrs. Ada E. S. Walkop, at Moline, Ill., and his son, J. H. Sims, of Des Moines. The litigation began over the title and the right of the son to occupy the property at 954 West Fourteenth street place. The son first brought court action to get undisputed ownership of a property interest which he had occupied for more than twenty years.

The verbal understanding with the father was that he had paid taxes, insurance and also made permanent improvements. Rev. Sims was represented by Atty. S. Joe Brown and J. H. Sims by Atty. E. S. Tesdell.

This action was lost by J. H. Sims. The Rev. Sims then instituted in the municipal court an action to recover the immediate possession of the property, which action was settled by a written stipulation, in which the son acknowledged the ownership of the father in the property and agreed to pay him a certain amount each month for the right to occupy.

TALMADGE GANG

CALLS N. A. A. C. P.

"ROTTEN COMMUNISTS"
Macon, Ga., Feb. 7.—Governor Eugene Talmadge and his followers who gathered here January 29th to attack the New Deal, demonstrated once more that many southern white people cannot get their minds off the Negro question long enough to analyze intelligently the political questions of the day.

Thomas Dixon, author of "The Clansman," from which the film, "The Birth of a Nation," was made, made a speech before the crowd here in which he denounced Walter White, secretary of the N. A. A. C. P., who telegraphed the convention asking whether in fighting for the constitution it would observe the constitutional rights of the Negro.

New York, Feb. 7.—When informed that Thomas Dixon had called the N. A. A. C. P. a rotten Communist organization, Walter White said here today: "We thought Tom Dixon was dead. The N. A. A. C. P. regards it as a high compliment to be called names by the man who wrote 'The Clansman.' His speech proves that the awakening of colored people over the country and their militant demand for their rights as citizens is beginning to be felt."

Missouri U. Sued Over Color Bar

N. A. A. C. P. BRINGS COURT ACTION TO GAIN ADMISSION TO LAW SCHOOL FOR NEGRO STUDENT

St. Louis, Mo., Feb. 7.—The N. A. A. C. P. last Friday launched its second great legal attack against the educational color bar when it acted to force the University of Missouri to admit Lloyd L. Gaines, 24 year old St. Louis youth, to the university's school of law. First victory in the campaign being carried on against unequal educational opportunities was won by the N. A. A. C. P. on January 15th when the court of appeals in Maryland upheld a decision of the lower court ordering the University of Maryland to admit Donald Gaines Murray, a Negro graduate of Amherst college, to the university law school.

The first gun in the new battle for equal rights was the filing of a petition of mandamus on January 24th with Judge Walter Morris Dinwiddie of the 34th judicial district at Columbia by Attorneys Sidney R. Redmond, Charles H. Houston and Henry D. Espy of the N. A. A. C. P. legal staff for the petitioner against S. W. Canada, registrar of the University of Missouri, Frederick A. Middlebush, its president, and the curators of the university to show cause why he should not be admitted to the school of law. There is no publicly supported law school for Negroes here, although there is a separate school system presumed to be equal in educational opportunities.

The petition cites that the University of Missouri is owned, maintained, governed and operated by "The Curators of the University of Missouri," a corporate body existing by legislative fiat, and administrative agency of the state performing an essential governmental function with funds largely derived from the treasury of Missouri under appropriations by the state legislature from taxes collected from the citizens at large, including the petitioner.

Scottsboro Burning Called 'Accidental'

EXPECT WHITEWASH OF
PRISON TRUCK TRAGEDY

Scottsboro, Ala., Feb. 7.—(Special)—They died like rats! They were never given a chance! Locked in a steel cage, twenty convicts, all Negroes, were burned to death here Friday afternoon in a prison truck when a thirty-five gallon drum of gasoline exploded. At the last minute two other convicts fell from the door which had been burned open by the blazing inferno, but their condition is so serious they will die before the week is out. They are Paul Dawson of Demopolis, Ala., and John Stokes of Birmingham, Ala.

For hours, in the immediate vicinity of the flame, the air was charged and surcharged with the odor of human flesh. While the mercury was five below zero and snow was falling lightly, even this did not prevent crowds from jamming the highway to find out if it was true that the Scottsboro boys had been burned up as they had heard.

When Gov. Bibb Graves ordered an investigation into the explosion and death of the convicts, W. B. Rogers, president of the administration board in charge of Alabama prisons, declared it a mistake; the gasoline should have been placed in another truck.

SCORES A TRIUMPH ON AIR PROGRAM

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THERE IS A WAY

Recently The Bystander criticized Secretary of Agriculture Wallace for speaking disparagingly of the Supreme Court because it declared the AAA unconstitutional. Last week a reader suggested that The Bystander ought to oppose the Supreme Court too because by the same process of reasoning, the anti-lynching bill would encounter the same fate.

The Bystander is not interested in such an argument for if the anti-lynching bill is unconstitutional as drawn the Supreme Court would not be performing its duty if it declared otherwise.

But this argument of our reader fails to meet the situation when some cases are known where the mob has taken prisoners from one state into another to stage a lynching. This of course is a clear field for federal legislation. He also forgets that by direct and indirect methods the federal government has been giving aid to farmers for years none of which has been knocked out by the court.

On the other hand in spite of the fact that many states have made no effort to curb lynching, the federal government has not even given its moral force to any effort to prevent this form of lawlessness. However it has gone in for protecting citizens against kidnapping without regard to state lines. The point is that there are several ways to do any job; and federal cooperation to stop lynching is no exception to the rule.

STRANGE HAPPENING AT THE FRONT

A dispatch from the war zone states that the chaplain of the famous Black Shirts Italian regiment was shot, captured and later beheaded by the Ethiopians. No mention was made of any other casualties in the regiment.

Judging from experience, The Bystander would like to know how a chaplain of a regiment gets so badly mixed up with the enemy and his buddies go unharmed. Of course maybe he got lost from his outfit, or was acting as a spy instead of a sky pilot—to use the army term or the buddies were retreating so fast toward his position of safety that they passed his station leaving him to the advancing Ethiopians.

BEGIN NOW

Prospective nominees for city offices are announcing their candidacy every day. Soon the political pot will boil every minute in the day—in fact we are in for a rather intense fight for in the background are issues far greater than the candidates in the field.

As a group we have taken a more or less active part in politics but as a general rule come out at the small end of the horn. There are some excuses for the situation but there is no reason why a substantial effort should not be made to correct them.

Health Talks

THYROTOXICOSIS (Toxic Goiter)

Thyrototoxicosis is the name given to a peculiar complex of symptoms along with an enlargement of the thyroid gland, and increase in oxygen consumption, a decrease in weight and strength, and a bulging of the eye balls (exophthalmos). It occurs far more often in women than in men and usually between the ages of 15 and 35. These patients are usually restless, nervous and irritable.

When the patients finally visit the doctor they usually present the following symptoms: Loss of weight despite an increase in appetite, rapid heart beats, palpitation, very emotional, tremor of fingers, inability to sleep well, easy muscular fatigue, excessive sweating, and considerable enlargement of thyroid gland.

The importance of rest and diet in the treatment is of prime importance. The three types of treatment are medical, surgical and X-ray. Of the three surgery is the most positive cure.

COUNTRY-WIDE SENTIMENT RISES AGAINST BORAH

New York, Jan. 31.—Country-wide sentiment among colored people against the presidential candidacy of Senator William E. Borah of Idaho is rising, according to reports received here by the N. A. A. C. P.

Ohio Republicans, especially in the Cleveland area, have been threatened with a split by influential colored Republicans if Senator Borah enters the Ohio primaries.

The announcement in the New York Times this week that Congressman Hamilton Fish would go to Chicago next month to try to enlist support for Senator Borah among delegates to the National Negro Congress has aroused resentment among Illinois voters and has brought widespread condemnation from many sponsors of any prospective delegates to the Congress. The Charleston, W. Va. branch of the N. A. A. C. P., at a meeting held January 19th, unanimously adopted a resolution condemning the candidacy of Senator Borah, and pledged its opposition to him in primaries of West Virginia.

Second, an intelligent effort should be made to know the issues and candidates. Individual voters are seldom able to do this; as a result intelligent dependable leadership should be sought out and followed.

Third, curb the Negro or white political leader who claims he can deliver the Negro vote en masse. Usually such Negro leader cannot get elected vice president of his own Sunday School class and the white one is down and out among his own group and grabs at anything available to get something for himself.

Fourth, go to the polls and vote.

Undoubtedly we have made some progress during the past few years. In this campaign there is chance for improvement.
