Paula Humphreys — A Beautiful Lady In A Tough Field

Black is Beautiful was one of the many slogans of the black revolution of the 60's. That black women with our kinky hair, dark skin, broad features and distinct body builds were indeed attractive was a concept that was long in coming in Anglosized America.

Besides racist beauty standards there was a time when it was difficult for black women to improve on their natural beauty with no black cosmetologists and white ones refusing us. One of the pioneers in black cosmetology is

Mrs. Pauline Humphreys, proprietress of the Crescent Beauty School.

Mrs. Humphreys has trained many beauticians including my mother, Mrs. Edythe Spates, owner of Spates Beauty Shoppe. Pauline informed me the school had been in existence since Feb. 2, 1939, making next year their 40th anniversary in business. Mrs. Humphreys has been in the beauty field since 1936 when she was located on E. 16th.

I asked her about

difficulties she may have encountered as a black female in business. "In the early days there was no place for blacks to go — no schools that would accept blacks" Mrs. Humphreys says was the basis of her inspiration to make it.

Because some young black beauticians are now working in white salons I questioned Mrs. Humphreys concerning competition from white schools.

"Within the basic curriculum of the state board of Iowa it is a requirement that

students learn all phases of work including Caucasian hair" she replied. Which implies a definite crossover. Could she estimate how many students she had trained in all? She could not, but she did tell me that "...from all over the country and from foreign countries including the Bahamas ..." she had trained many many including WACS at the Fort Des Moines in a shop (which had to be segregated at the time)

The third annual Little Miss Black Des Moines Pageant will be held, Sunday, Nov. 26, 1978 3:00 p.m. Hotel Fort Des Moines, Governor's Room, 10th & Walnut. Admission is \$2.00 for adults, \$1.00 for children under 15.

Candidates participating in the pageant will be

competing for prizes and trophies, in addition to displaying an array of artistic talent, poise and articulation.

The first place winner will receive a black and white portable T.V.; 2nd place, a cassette tape recorder; and third place a six months subscription to Ebony Jr. Each place winner will also receive a trophy as will Miss "Soulful Congeniality."

Scheduled special guests appearing on the program will be Mr. Dolph Pulliam, K.C.C.I. T.V. celebrity; Mrs. Norma Jackson, gospel soloist; Ms. Melinda Anderson, Miss Black Iowa 1977; and Yvonne Fitzpatrick, soloist.

Also featured special guest will be the past Little Miss Black Des Moines 1977, Yolonda

Thompson, and The 1978 Gateway Queen Janice Rife and her court — Yolonda Grady, Barbara Bell, Dana Minor and Venita Bates.

The pageant is being sponsored by God's Army of Youth and The Young Sister's in Action. This year's pageant instructors are: Irene Fitzpatrick, Movement Coordinator; Niambi Webster, Leadership Development and Speech and Talent Coordinator; and Pam Nickerson, Talent Assistant. Mrs. Nellie Gater serves as the Advisor to the Pageant and Corresponding secretary. She has contributed to the pageant since its beginning in 1976.

Several community organizations, individuals, businesses

and clubs have responded to the financial contribution of this year's pageant. It is not a profit making program, all proceeds will go toward the prizes being awarded to the candidates, God's Army of Youth and the Dee Morris Parapelegic Fund.

Keynotes Business Women's Meeting

Shirley G. Steele, former Iowa Assistant Attorney General, Department of Justice, will be the keynote speaker for the Business Women's Association of November 21, 1978, at 7:00 P.M.

Ms. Steele is now engaged in the general practice of law with Bertroche and Hagen Law Offices, at 4044 S. E. 14th, Des Moines and 120 Ashland, Indianola, Iowa. Again, Ms. Steele holds the distinction of

being a first among Iowa's Black Women. Ms. Steele is also a part-time Business Law Instructor at Area XI Community College.

While employed in the Attorney General's office, Ms. Steele argued the landmark decision of **Quaker Oats v. Cedar Rapids Human Rights Commission** and **Franklin Manufacturing v. Iowa Civil Rights Commission** case before the Iowa Supreme Court. These decisions held that

it is sexually discriminating for private industry to exclude pregnancy benefits from its sickness and accident plans.

Ms. Steele who was appointed as Commissioner for the Status of Women, is a member of the Iowa State Bar Association, the Polk County Women's Law Association, the NAACP, and an Affiliate of Kyles AMEZ Church.

People are fussing about the goods that Americans buy from other countries. "Buy American" is the cry. Time was when that was a good slogan.

For the most part American made goods were just about the best in the world. Until a few years ago the words "Made in Japan" or Taiwan meant that the merchandise was so much junk, not worth the

money one paid for it. But then American companies seeking to get away from union labor costs went abroad to take advantage of the cheap labor in these other countries.

Numerous companies moved their branches to Japan or Taiwan and shipped their goods back here to compete with the factories that were still in operation here.

It had to happen. Alert people in those countries observed the American way of doing things and began to imitate them. Soon the enterprising Japanese and such had factories and were competing with the Americans for the market.

And in the meanwhile the American way instead of putting out the best merchandise, began to do their work in a slipshod manner. Think of the thousands of cars and appliances that have been recalled because of a minor defect in manufacturing. It seems to run throughout the line of manufactured goods. And the people whose good we scorned as not worth the

money are coming up with goods that are built the way we used to make them.

So our manufacturers sit around and cry about the need to put a high tariff on foreign goods in the various lines, or at least limiting the number of goods that can be brought into the country.

So they can continue to rip us off? The whole system is made to look like one giant ripoff. Talk about welfare cheaters! Who cheats any more than the people who are supposed to help the recipients get help.

Doctor clinics are getting millions while the poor people get nothing, and the doctors want relief.

Instead of limiting goods and charging a high tariff, why don't the American people try giving an honest dollar's worth, and making goods that will stand competition. Then we could buy American and maybe there wouldn't be so much foreign competition.

Bits and Pieces

This week I have very little to say. But there have been several newsworthy occurrences over the past week which are worthy of further comment. Some have previously been covered, but several have not. Some of them appeal to our hearts and others to our minds.

I noticed in the newspaper the other day that the proposed Amendment to the U. S. Constitution which would have given full rights to representation in Congress to the residents of the District of Columbia is having, to no one's surprise, a rough time. Since it was passed by the Senate last August on a vote of 67 in favor and 32 against, only one state legislature has chosen to ratify it. The legislature of another state, the article stated, had already voted it down twice. As much as one might like to think that this inattention or rejection was due to the pressures and adjournments during a legislative election year, the race issue stands out. The addition of two senators and one or more representatives who would likely be black, in view of the District's population, is a point of obvious white resistance. Even the misunderstandings and distortions which have marked the ratification process of the proposed

Equal Rights Amendment (largely due to a well funded and organized anti-ERA movement) will be but child's play in terms of that which this Amendment will likely face. The ERA, as it is called, has been hailed by some as a mark of the trend toward the recognition of the rights of women (as a minority group), but the reaction of those same state legislatures to this proposal would indicate to the contrary. If the recent conservative political trend as manifested in the results of the recent elections is any indication, it will likely be a long and fruitless seven years.

Last week I asked for some public input in the process for nominating candidates for positions as officers and Executive Board members of the Des Moines Branch of the NAACP. So far, I (nor, to the best of my knowledge, any other members of the nominating committee) have not been overwhelmed by the response. In point of fact, no one has yet come forward to place their name or that of a friend or acquaintance into the nominations process. The Chapter election will occur at the December 19th meeting, but the names of the nominees must be settled no later than the time of the November 28th meeting. If you somehow don't feel right about placing a name in nomination or for some other reason are unable to submit the needed input to one or more members of the committee before the November meeting, please attend it and do so then.

I noted yesterday that Rep. Charles Diggs (Dem., Mich.) was sentenced by a federal judge to a maximum of three years in prison. Diggs was convicted of defrauding the government of approximately \$66 thousand dollars with a payroll kickback scheme by a primarily black jury last October 7th. He was assessed no fine and was not given a minimum sentence, although a U. S. Parole

Commission research analyst has stated that their procedures call for a minimum of 16 to 20 months of actual prison time when measured against the amount of money Diggs was alleged to have taken. The sentence handed down by the Court, although only a tiny fraction of that which Diggs could have received, I am not so sure that anything is deserved. Diggs maintained throughout his trial that he was being prosecuted for acts common among the members of Congress and that his violation, if in fact there was one (and there is some question of that) is minimal in comparison with what other primarily white members had done and were doing. Although I have not been exposed to much more than a tiny part of the evidence introduced at the trial, I seriously question the motives of the prosecution. This is especially so when the trial with its accompanying publicity is held shortly before the election and at a time when Diggs, as a, if not the, senior black member of Congress, would likely be a key figure in the drive to enact the proposed Constitutional amendment which would give full Congressional voting representation to the District of Columbia. Whether or not Diggs deserved to be prosecuted, his constituents overwhelmingly reelected him to another term in the House and his presence there is crucial. Even if a way can be found with the help of the Court, to prevent him from having to spend time in prison, the publicity which the proceedings received has done the most damage by seriously damaging his credibility in the eyes of the rest of America. We can only hope that sufficient credibility and authority remains embodied in him to enact the proposed Amendment and give the primarily black residents of the District the representation in Congress which the Constitution already gives those in the fifty states.

Children—The Greatest Gift—Are Being Neglected

The psychology of black life calls for a structured academic program in self-development, pride and an understanding of the "we" concept. However, simultaneously the overriding phenomenon prevails, where do "our" young, gifted and talented youth receive equal opportunities to participate in well-rounded and equally cultural and racially structured activities in the social graces? Where do our young girls learn how to meet the expectations of a male dominated society? Who teaches them how to walk with pride, talk with educated versatility, laugh with grace and demand respect from their peers, siblings and "superiors"?

An educated guess would point the responsibility on the educational institutions which claim to be willfully and successfully doing the job. A gut reaction would be to look to the parents to do the task alone.

One must not forget the ever changing and present environmental conditions in which the child is reared — the community. Is every other house on the street where you live safe for your child to walk past? Can she/he go to a neighbor in times of distress? Are your children able to say with pride, dignity and respect, "I like our neighbor Mr. Jones, he speaks when I pass by his house"?

Are our schools overcrowded with minority images, and positive visible examples of human beings showing concern for "our" children? Does this overcrowded system concern itself with hiring teachers that are dedicated to the proposition that all children are educable and innately programming "our" children to achieve and strive for excellence?

After toiling over the preceding questions, the thought came to mind, as to whether the **Bystander** readers could relate to the seriousness implied in the thoughts projected.

Afro-Academic Cultural and Technological Scientific Olympics (ACT-SO), a recently launched program designed for talented black youth in the arts, humanities and social sciences, sponsored by the NAACP is seeking not only talented youth, but dedicated adult leaders. The NAACP Youth Chapter

is struggling to survive, and help is needed from concerned community leaders. The local Jack & Jill Chapter of Des Moines is continuing to rally members in efforts to provide a strong educational and social base for "our" black youth. Evelyn Davis, Director of Tiny Tots, Inc. and numerous staff members have made their various contributions toward instilling pride and drilling high achievement in "our" youth. The Urban Council is being set up by the Urban Branch of the Y.M.C.A. Knowledge to date of other organizations established to deal with the educational and social development of our youth escape me, have they drifted so far away?

A Female Focus On The Issues

In a recent issue of Esquire magazine, an article on the judicial expertise or lack of it by our chief justice, Warren Burger caught my eye.

Lawyers, judges and law clerks who have worked and dealt with the man criticized his knowledge, his lack of sensitivity and his basic intelligence. A former colleague went so far as to label Burger

THE GREATEST GIFT OF ALL IS BEING NEGLECTED

After attending for the fifth time the Annual Gateway Queen Pageant and reciting for the fifth time a poem which I wrote especially for the reigning queen, "Ode to the Gateway Queen," I realized the significance of the event.

Several colleagues questioned me after finding out that the pageant contestants were all black, and I hastened to add that that was by choice not by practice. However after explaining to several individuals who approached me on the subject, I became defensive and informed them that "our" children are not afforded equal opportunities by competing in pageants that bear no minority ethnicity.

For the past few weeks I've read in the *Bystander* about the varying clubs that travel here and there to formally structured and organized programs out of the city and I wondered how many times had these same civic clubs and organizations, extended that experience to youth out of their family of pro-creation. Also, have they taken time to plan and implement leadership development programs in "our" community, designed for "our" young people. Members of these organizations surely are well respected members of our community, hold well paying jobs and are able to attend social functions that my pocket book won't take me.

Why not allow them to set good positive examples that our black children seem to miss in the schools by providing them with more (sorry folks

Why not allow them to set good positive examples that our black children seem to miss in the schools by providing them with more programs geared in self-development? (sorry folks I hate to be the one to inform you that unfortunately our schools are not overcrowded with minority images, we aren't even a drop in the bucket).

Don't misunderstand facts for prejudice. I hold the utmost respect for several principals, teachers, administrators in "our" schools but I also (being human) understand that they aren't gods and can't do everything.

Since my vision was focused on the nine candidates on stage at the Gateway Pageant held Sun., Nov. 12, 1978, in my efforts to support them by sitting right up front, smiling so that they could see that somebody in the audience was rooting for them to do a good job. I can't recall if all the varying social organizations were represented at the pageant, and a quick glance at the list of sponsors and patrons, my pondering came up negative.

Why are these groups showing that they aren't concerned? Could their by-laws be so set that they haven't the time to reach out and help these beautiful black ladies (our future doctors, lawyers, housewives, etc.?)

For the past three years I have consented to assist Mrs. Nellie Gate (a small, wiry gracious lady who goes non-stop, radiating Christian love for everybody) in the programmatic implementation of the Little Miss Black Des Moines Pageant, by trying to give the candidates in the pageant some of the self-development tools and visions of creativity experienced by self.

I took it upon myself to appeal to the inner senses of some friends and mutual professional individuals in the community for both financial and mental support. A small few have responded, it makes me wonder exactly where "we" as adults are headed and further presents a tremendous concern in my mind as to the future of "our" children.

How can "our" children learn pride, self-respect, inner beauty, knowledge of the black culture and a sense of togetherness, if the community in which they reside aren't behind them?

Your response to this editorial would be greatly appreciated, not in writing, but in showing your concern by doing! *Bystander* readers out there who understand by actively doing, I commend you for sharing your God-given talent and respect you for it, you know who you are—

I believe that children are our future and if we as adults teach them well - they will lead the way. I rest my case.

stupid. Esquire is a first rate highly sophisticated and accurate magazine — one I respect, so I read the article with interest and disillusionment.

As I was reading, an interview on NBC's Today show came to mind. During the late summer a very intelligent and outspoken young black woman was questioned regarding the ramifications of the Supreme Courts unfortunate Bakke decision. It seems the young woman (I have in the interim lost her name) was a college graduate, interested in law and currently supplementing her income by moonlighting at a prominent D.C. bookstore frequented often by senators, congressmen and government officials.

One day Warren Burger came in, purchased a book and before he could leave was approached by the young lady regarding the decision. She asked why did he feel the decision was a just one, was it not racist? Would it not hurt minorities chances of employment and basic rights etc.? His answers were so ridiculous, so archaic and so latently racist I had to repeat them and show the stupidity of their basis.

Burger's premise — these are things he actually stated — were that blacks should and could pull themselves up by their bootstraps (one of the most overused cliches in the English language); be patient; that his relatives were minority people (Norwegian?) and that the basic goodness of people's hearts would help blacks overcome prejudice.

At first I couldn't believe an educated man could utter such outrageous inaccuracies and distortions. Then a terrible fear came over me for the future of blacks in America — how many other whites in high places felt like Burger?

First — it's difficult to pull yourself up by your bootstraps when figuratively and literally you have no shoes and/or when the power structure spends so much energy in 'keeping you in your place.' The vestiges of white racism are still everywhere in

America. We don't have to sit on the back of the bus any longer but there are still places of employment that will not hire blacks; neighborhoods that will not house blacks; churches that do not make blacks welcome; clubs and social organizations that ban blacks in their by-laws and schools that refuse to admit blacks; I could go on and on.

Secondly, blacks have been PATIENT 350 years — years of humiliation, lynching, castration, torture and degradation — racism in all its forms. I think the time is up on prejudice. How long do we have to wait for the Declaration of Independence to apply to people of color?

As far as minority groups go, people of Indian, black or Puerto Rican heritage are the ones left out in the cold: Italian, the Irish etc., are white. The Declaration of Independence and the constitution were written by, of and for white males and this has continued to be the case until today.

Last, racists have no goodness in their hearts. Many whites, who don't actually hate blacks, are too afraid to come out openly on the side of their darker skinned brethren in their struggle for equality. Goodness should have triumphed many years ago for us — it hasn't, we have to do it for ourselves.

But then all in all, what can you expect from a Nixon appointee. Burger, Blackmun, Renhquist and Powell are all from the same mold. Hopefully some of the old fogies will retire and Carter can appoint some more Douglas-like liberals to the high bench.

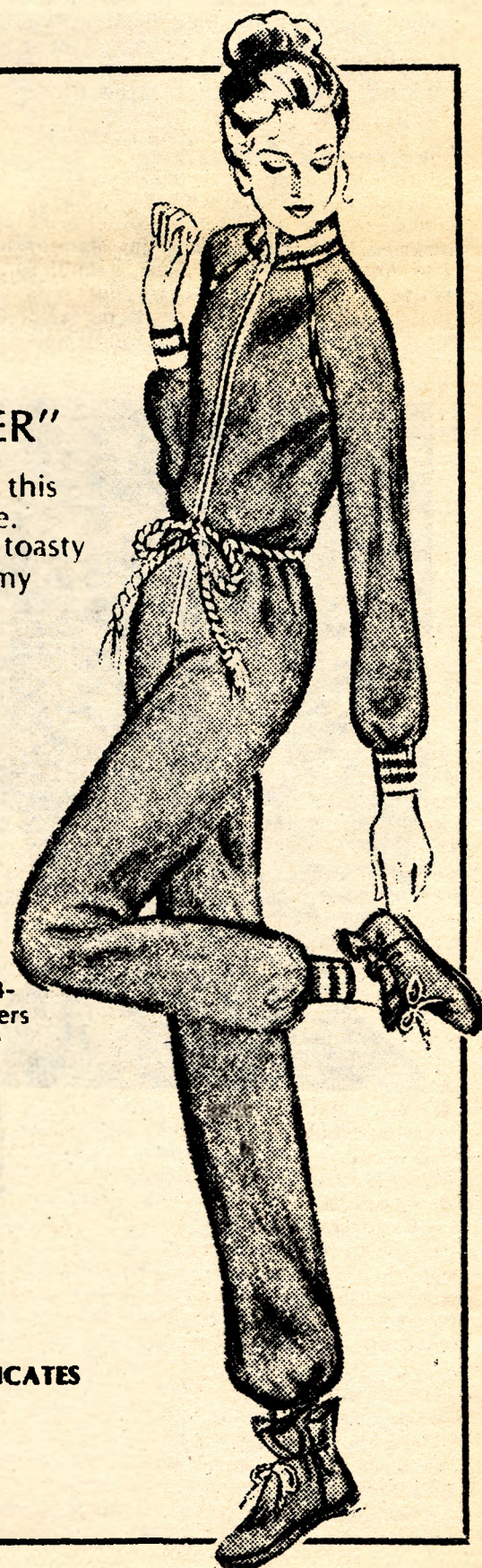

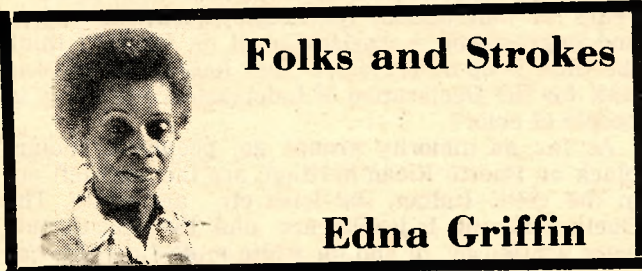

Ian Smith, head of the Rhodesian government, entered the United States in October with a black man on each arm!

Why was Smith's trip so urgent before elections in America that he made entry through a side door? An invitation from 27 congressmen instead of the State Department or the White House.

Strange 'carryin' on' until you realize Smith's 'business is in the street'. Documented proof is now available to the British people that OIL is more powerful than their government. UN sanctions against Rhodesia have not stopped a single drop of oil. Britain cast a vote for UN sanctions. Several vessels from Her Majesty's fleet were stationed off

Mozambique checking British ships while the oil went by in French or American tankers!

If you were paying attention to Ian Smith on TV, you may recall there was no mention of oil. Instead there was talk of who will represent Blacks in the government. Bishop Mozewera and Arthur Sithole take over to explain they are for a solution without bloodshed. They are for moderation. It also means the guerillas are within sight of victory. There will, of course, be much wailing in our country that we need to save the Africans from Cubans, Communists, and don't forget them "Roosians"! Keep cool, keep your eye on the rising price of gas.

Defeat of Apartheid, Ian Smith, and black sellers of less than freedom is assured because few whites are prepared to die for apartheid, many blacks will risk death in pursuit of freedom for themselves and their children.

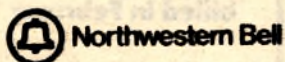

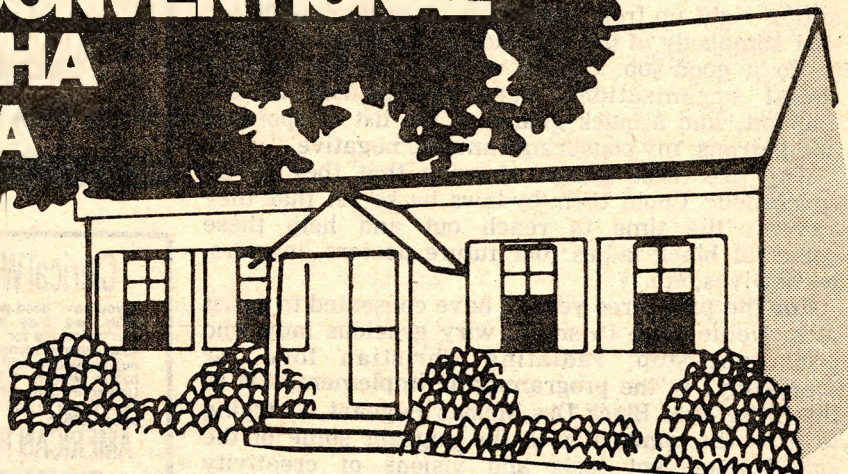

New Klan—Heritage of Hate

This is a documentary review of a program telecast on Channel 11 Monday night.

This was itself a tale of recent KKK activity in America. Of poor, deluded, ignorant 'white trash' who feel the Klan will be their salvation from Communism, 'nigger take-over', whites becoming second class citizens and losing their jobs to blacks.

It was the story of David Duke, the college educated leader of the Louisiana Klan in his bid for the state senate race. He lost, but did get 11,000 votes or 1/3 of those cast.

This was the history of the Klan and how in the 1920's 9,000,000 whites — sheriffs, governors, lawyers, policemen, etc. were members. Many of us laugh at Klan members and their rantings. I found myself chuckling many times at the incoherent ramblings of this lunatic fringe group.

But I wonder how many millions of whites who would fear reprisal by actually joining the Klan or the Nazi Party or the American States Rights Party or the white citizens councils of the John Birch Society actually believe in the tenets of the above

groups? How the Klan has changed its image from cross burning and lynching and castrations to saturating the media particularly talk shows was clearly documented.

But the same old 'Keep the niggers in their places or ship em back to Africa' mentality persisted. As Jesse Jackson put it to David Duke in a debate, "Blacks are no longer afraid of the Klan".

Also he stated he could not comprehend why whites are so afraid of blacks, why so many whites do feel inferior — when actually people of color are made to feel less than human from childhood.

This fear, this paranoia, this antagonism was mirrored again and faces of the Klan members interviewed. Robert Shelton, imperial wizard of the United Klans of America again blamed the civil rights movement on an unseen Communist conspiracy (J. Edgar Hoover thought this also).

The murder of Mrs. Viola Luizzo in 1965 was discussed in detail by FBI informant Gary Lowe. He told who specifically murdered this brave white woman.

All four of these

murderers served less than 3 years for ('violating her civil rights instead of murder) and are now free. The scales of Justice were sorely out of balance with this case. It has always hurt my heart that sympathetic and caring whites of conscience such as Judge Frank

Johnaon and the late Schwerner and Goodman have to go through such hell and risk their lives in certain areas to help black human beings.

Jews did not fare any better than blacks in this documentary. Why Kluxers and racist feel Jews have financially backed black revolution is beyond me. True there have been numerous liberal Jewish individuals who have sided with blacks in their struggle to be free, but it

simply gave the Klan another excuse of anti-semitism. This along with the outdated epithet of 'Christ Killer' some so-called Christians have hurled at Jewish people.

This program is not the first nor will it be the last on the KKK. But it was a good one — in that it simply let the Klan speak for itself — which is a devastating indictment of their policies and their denials of violence. It must be

sad to live in fear, anger and frustration as these members of the Klan do. I would feel sorry for them if they were not such an abhorrent boil on the face on America.

Blacks should view IEBN and educational and public networks in increasing numbers — it is far more sensitive to our needs, has far more black programs, and views us in a much better light than commercial TV — much better than CBS, NBC and ABC has done.

Black news is good news

Benjamin Banneker

Benjamin Banneker was born November 9th, 1731 at Ellicott's Mill, Maryland. His grandmother (Molly Walsh), a white woman who had come to America as an indentured servant, but after completing her indenture acquired slaves of her own and eventually married one of them, taught Benjamin to read. At an early age, Benjamin is reputed to have made the first wooden clock in America. But his rise to fame began around 1773 when he began making astronomical calculations for almanacs. He accurately calculated an eclipse of 1789 and soon thereafter sold the farm he had acquired so that he could concentrate his attention on the study of astronomy and mathematics. In this same year, 1789, Thomas Jefferson, a slave holder, and the then Secretary of State, presented the name Benjamin Banneker to President George Washington as a candidate for the team of three that would survey the land comprising the District of Columbia, the new capital of the nation. Banneker worked with the team for two years.

In 1792 he began the publication of his almanac. The next year, 1793, found him publishing a pamphlet entitled *A Plan of Peace-Office for the United States* where he suggested that a Secretary of Peace be added to the cabinet of the President of the United States. Banneker's racial awareness and abolitionist sentiments might be discerned in the following excerpts taken from a letter he wrote to Thomas Jefferson in 1792: "I am fully sensible of that freedom, which I take with you in the present occasion; a liberty which seemed to me scarcely allowable, when I reflected

I was slated to appear in court Monday morning on the shotgun charge stemming from my confrontation with a street gang last summer, but I found out I had a warrant issued for my arrest for the contempt of court charge where I refused to testify against my sister-in-law on charges of attempting to kill me.

I refused to testify because she was being tried by an all white jury which is in violation of the constitution. I have never forgotten what we Black Panthers were fighting for ... among them was the right of Black people to be tried by a jury of our peers. I had made up my mind Sunday evening before the shooting incident to not appear in court so that I could appear at the people's meeting with Iowa Power to state my position about the morally reprehensible policy of cutting people's power off in the winter. I must apologize to Jo Baughman of the pre-trial release program for my breach of trust. She and the pre-trial release program have really been in my corner. I would never run from the law because I would never do anything that I felt unrighteous about or could not be justified in the eyes of the people.

I don't know the outcome of my present ordeal. If the police don't kill me I will probably be writing the next week's article from behind bars. From there I will probably go to the big house (prison). I would like for you the readers and my beloved downtrodden ones to know that I love you (forgive the mushy stuff) and fear no consequences. You have in your midst (and on your side) an uncompromising, born warrior, a gladiator to be cast into the arena to combat oppression no matter how it may manifest itself or what weapons are at its disposal. 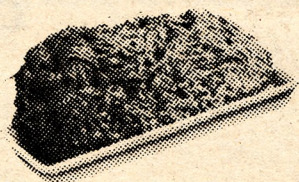

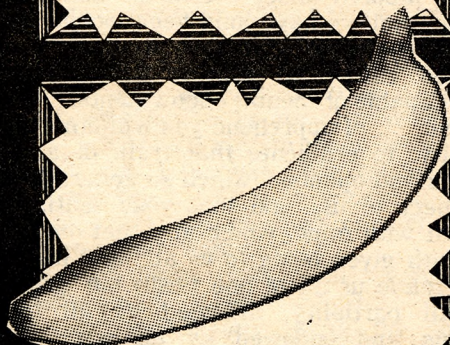

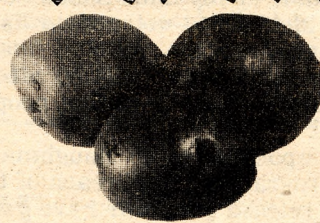
