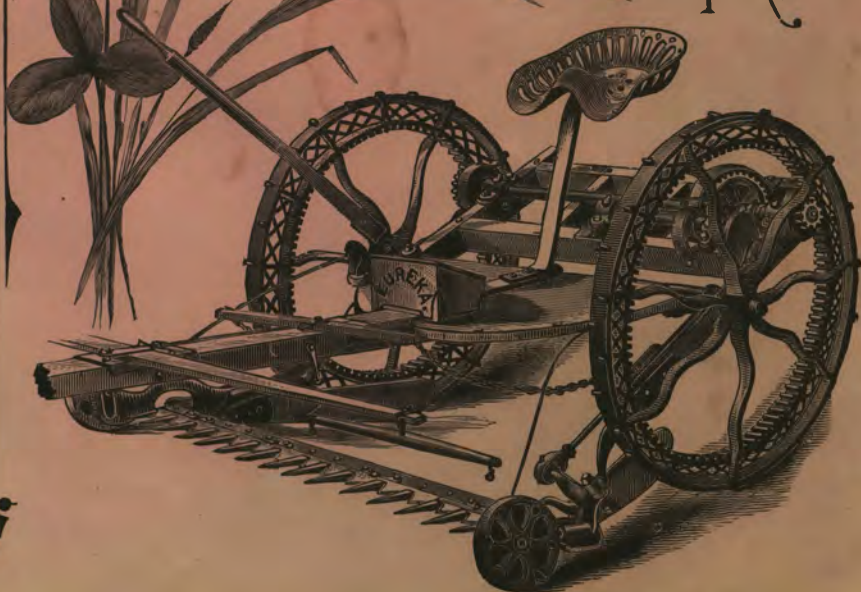

IN calling attention to the reliable EUREKA MOWER, we wish to express our thanks to the many purchasers who have favored us with their testimonials and endorsements. We are aware that testimonials from unknown men living in obscure localities can easily be obtained; but to get recommendations from men who are widely and favorably known as the most intelligent, practical farmers in the country, such as will be found in the following pages, it is necessary that the machine has *real merit*. "The trial of Mowing Machines, Hay Tedders, Horse Rakes, Hay Loaders, and Unloaders, took place at Eddington, near Philadelphia, June 26th to 29th, under the direction of Capt. Landreth and Mr. Geddes, to whom we desire to express our acknowledgments for their courtesy and attention on this and on all other occasions.

"Twenty-two machines were exhibited, all but two being tested on the dynamometer. This important business was undertaken by Messrs. Oldendorff and Bruce, the following *valuable table* being the result of their labors:

"It will be seen from the foregoing that the draft per square foot of grass cut varied from $28\frac{8}{10}$ lbs. in the case of the EUREKA machine (direct draft) to $56\frac{4}{10}$ lbs. in one of Osborne's machines, or nearly 100 per cent. From the above table we have the fact that the EUREKA was the lightest of all that were tried; and, as it is on total different principle from the original models, a short reference to its leading features may not be out of place.

"The EUREKA is a direct-draft mower—that is to say, the knife works in front of and between the wheels, and the horses, are attached to the centre of the machine, equi-distant between the wheels, and are so placed, by means of a long neck-yoke, that, while one walks on the uncut grass clear of the knife, the other walks where the track-board has cleared the cut grass; thus, the mowed grass is not interfered with—an important point as regards curing. The wheels are much larger than in ordinary machines. The cutter-bar,

which in the machine tested was six feet long, is placed in front of the wheels. The pitman works at right angles with the knife, the connection between the two being a bell-crank lever. It might be thought that the horses treading down the grass would prevent even cutting, but this is not so. Did the machine follow the tracks, instead of meeting them, we cannot say how it would be ; but one great advantage of this form of machine is that it returns along the same line, and therefore meets the grass that has been trodden down.

“Every crop can be dealt with according to its particular form. Thus, supposing the grass beaten down in any direction, the machine can be driven at right angles to the lay, and thus good cutting is secured. By a peculiar method of attaching the knife-bar to the frame, flexibility is acquired, and we could not see that any machine cut the standing grass more evenly ; at any rate, the cutting was sufficiently good. One great merit in this machine is that, owing to having a track-clearer on both sides, the cut grass is laid up in a beautifully light, open swarth, very favorable for curing. Indeed, in fair weather, very little after-work is required. Two horses worked a six-foot cutter with ease. The gearing is simple ; no bevel-wheels are used, and we do not see why such a machine should not wear well, and there can be no question that as a mower it is a highly valuable implement.

“If, as in the EUREKA, a six-foot cut can be made as easily as a four-foot, we have a saving of one-half of the horse-power.”—*Taken from the original Report of Judges, pages 15 and 16.*

Dear Sir.—I mowed my young orchard to-day, and was astonished to find the EUREKA did better work there, *in every respect*, than the Buckeye. I didn't leave six clips for the scythe, on the average, at each tree, and I didn't bark a tree, or have to stop for clogging, as I invariably have to do with the Buckeye. I padded the out-ends of the whiffletrees with a soft rag, and then drove close and turned in pretty short as soon as the whiffletrees passed the tree. I never want to take a side-draft machine into my young orchard again. I have used the Buckeye for fourteen years, and one half day with the EUREKA has cured me. I write this because you seem to admit that for orchards a side-draft machine might be better. Don't you ever admit any such foolish thing again! Half the time I have to leave a strip for the scythe, the whole length of the row, with the Buckeye, or else clear back the mowed grass so as to work the machine. But the EUREKA works without clogging when you "gee" or "haw" in short; and when you drive half of the cutter-bar on the mown grass, it slides right under the cut grass. I have mowed about thirty acres, and have not cut a guard or nicked a section, and the knives are not injured at all. I have not found the place where I do not like the EUREKA better than any side-draft machine I ever saw. If it works, as I think it will, in lodged clover and heavy Hungarian grass, I shall call it a necessity on any farm where these crops or any very heavy grass is raised. I have mowed very green timothy (just in bloom), that would yield three tons per acre, and in four hours it was fit to go into the barn. It stood up so loose that both sun and wind got entirely through it and cured it equally and uniformly throughout.

Mr. Clark thinks I am "awfully converted," for a man so strongly prejudiced against the EUREKA as I was up to the day I first sat on one, only a week ago.

You did not ask me to write you how I liked the machine on further trial, in orchard, etc., but I cannot deny myself the

pleasure of doing so. You are at liberty to show this to whomsoever you choose. *As far as I have tried the EUREKA, it gives the most absolute satisfaction.*

I am very highly pleased with the EUREKA MOWER. It not only cuts rapidly, and with great ease to the team, without side draft or weight on the horses' necks (I think if rigged with shafts it would not be hard for one horse), but one can make better hay with it than with any machine I know of: for the reason that it *cures so much quicker* by the horses and wheels not trampling it down, as is done by other machines. I took the EUREKA and a side-cut machine into a 22-acre field; each cut six swaths when they were stopped by rain. The six swaths cut by the side-cut machine were the *last to cure*, and go into the barn. The rest of the field was cut with EUREKA, and *cured* and hauled in while the other was yet unfit to go in. I do not know how to say enough of EUREKA as a Mower.

Dear Sir,—I used the EUREKA six-foot Mower last season, and I consider it the best mower manufactured. I mowed thirty-seven acres for one of my neighbors on which the stone had not been picked since the ground was plowed for wheat, and for which reason two other parties whom the owner had expected to mow for him would not bring their mowers on the farm. I mowed 8 $\frac{3}{4}$ $\frac{4}{5}$ acres one afternoon on the above described ground with a span of horses, which weighed 2,125 pounds, and I asked several parties at supper time, when I finished work at night, if they could see a wet hair on either horse, and not one of them answered yes (of course I did not ask them to look under the collar). Another advantage, besides lightness of draft, is the condition in which it leaves the grass to cure. I had one field which would average most three tons to the acre, and it cured nicely, while one of my neighbors who joins farms with me had to turn every swath in a ten-acre lot, which was not as

heavy as mine, but mowed with a new Champion. I have heard that he wished he had bought a EUREKA.

I consider hay worth from one to two dollars a ton more if mowed by the EUREKA than with any other machine, as the grass stands up or lays so loose that it cures at the bottom before the top is burned.

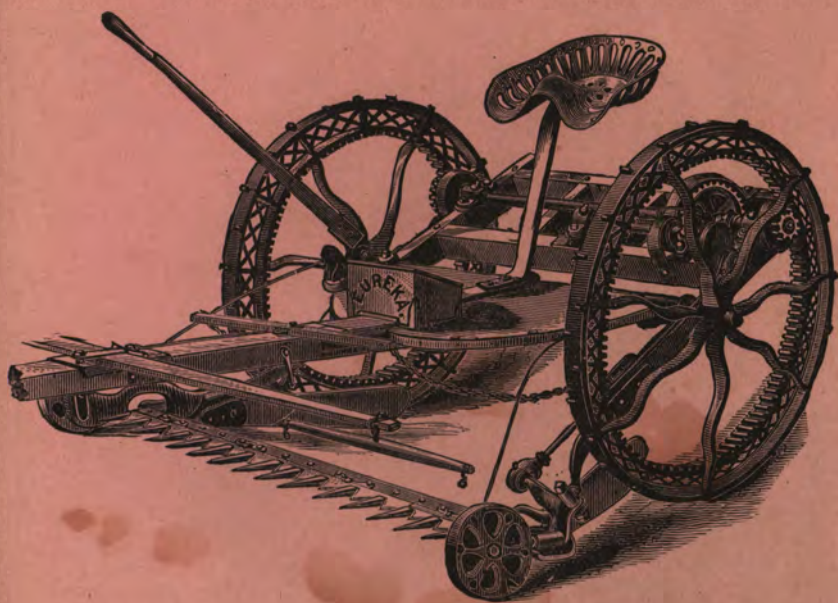
