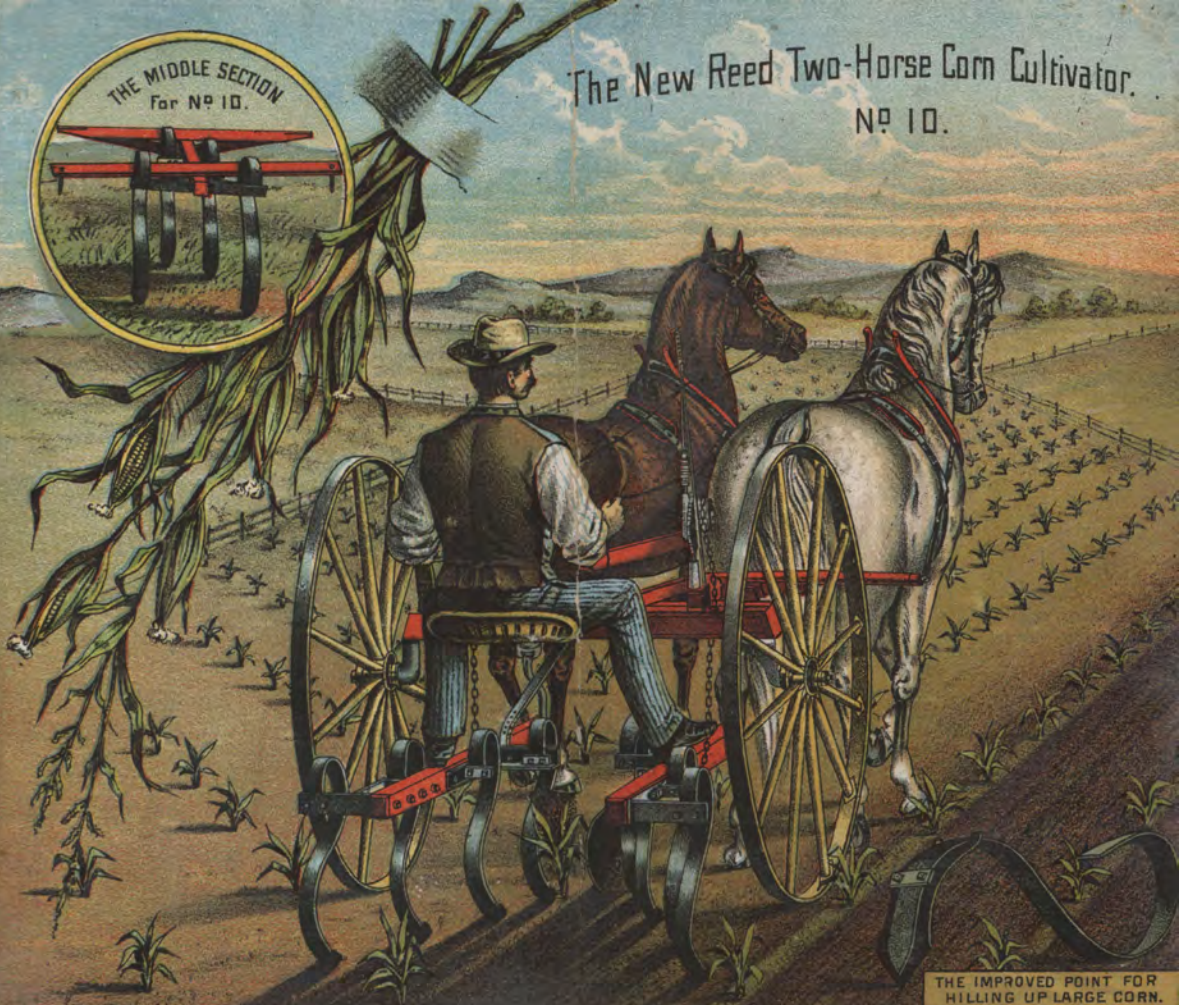

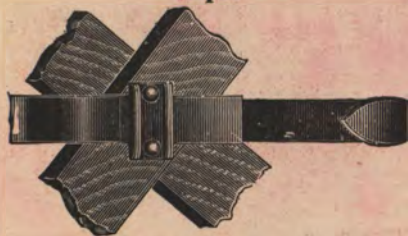


THE IMPROVED POINT FOR

Dear Sir—The Kalamazoo Spring-Tooth Harrow or Cultivator which you introduced on the farm, I have tested: first, on fallow land where I had sown wheat, oats and barley; then, on sod of June grass, of Kentucky Blue Joint, which was broken in September, 1879; then, on corn stubble—on all of which it did good work and gave perfect satisfaction. As you recommended it to work on ground where roots, stones and grubs existed, I gave it a trial on ground adjoining the new Assembly Hall, part of which is covered with withered forest trees, part sod, and part earth of basement of the building.
