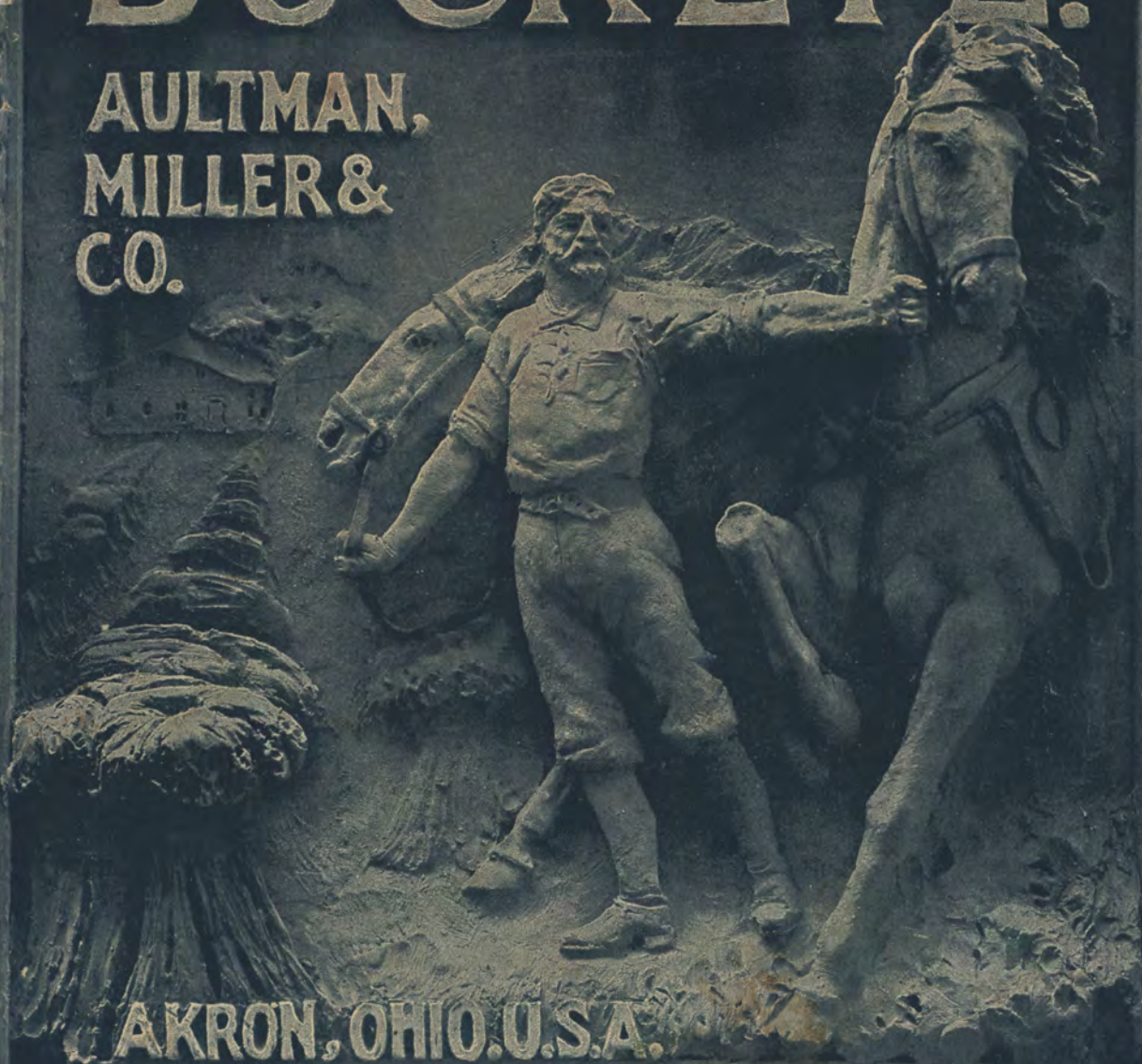

BUCKEYE MOWER.

Mower of the Centuries.

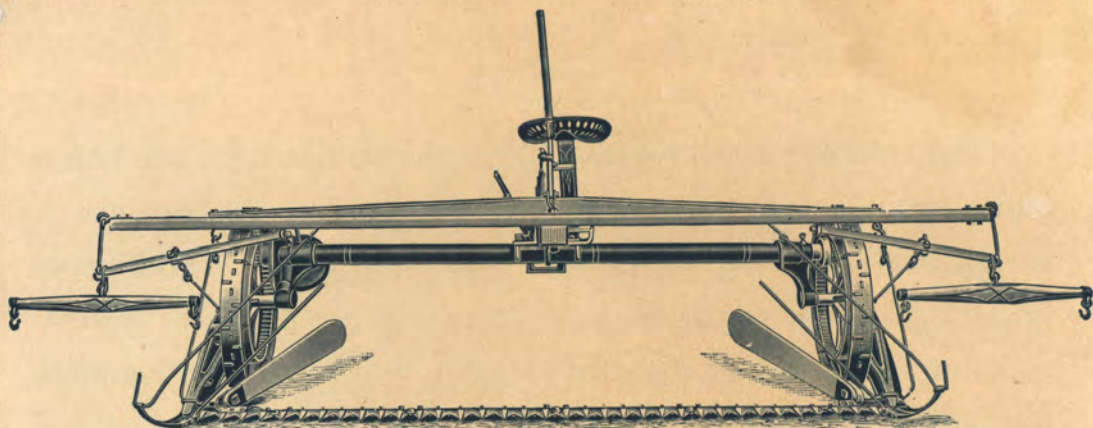
The Buckeye Mower is built to cut 3 feet 9 inches for one horse, and 4 feet 3 inches, 4 feet 6 inches, 5 and 6 feet for two horses. In practical operation, the Buckeye has won its world-wide reputation by its real worth in these respects: Simplicity of design; superior excellence of material; flexible motion of bar, enabling the cutting to conform to the ground surfaces; swiftness, ease and perfection of work; freedom from neck-weight and side draft; quietness and smoothness of action; clean, close and uniform cutting.

The controlling merits of this Mower are high wheels, wide apart; light, tubular frame; long shafting; adjustable bearings and brass bushing; absence of toggle or ball-joints; double-hooked pitman with positive parallel bearings, insuring a shear cut; direct and very light draft; highly finished cutting parts of best steel; graceful appearance; noiseless operation; unapproached durability.

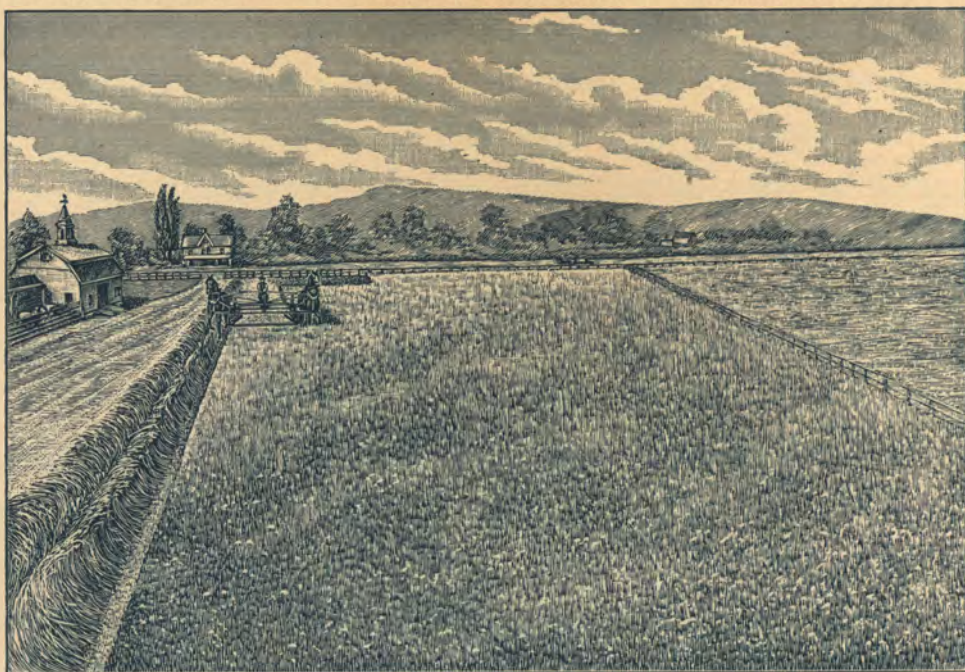
Foot and hand lever raises bar instantly to outer end, whatever may be the angle of bar to the machine. For transportation the bar is folded over onto the tongue.

In the numerous mower trials of the past season, with dynamometer tests, the Buckeye has not once failed to show the lightest draft, even over the roller bearings, *while cutting*.

In its fifty-six years, the Buckeye has met and vanquished every rival. Gold First Prizes cluster about it more thickly than any labor-saver of the farm. It is only at the beginning of its career. The Twentieth Century will confirm the verdict of the Nineteenth, also the supreme merits of Buckeye principles, for these are eternal.



Buckeye Center-draft Mower.



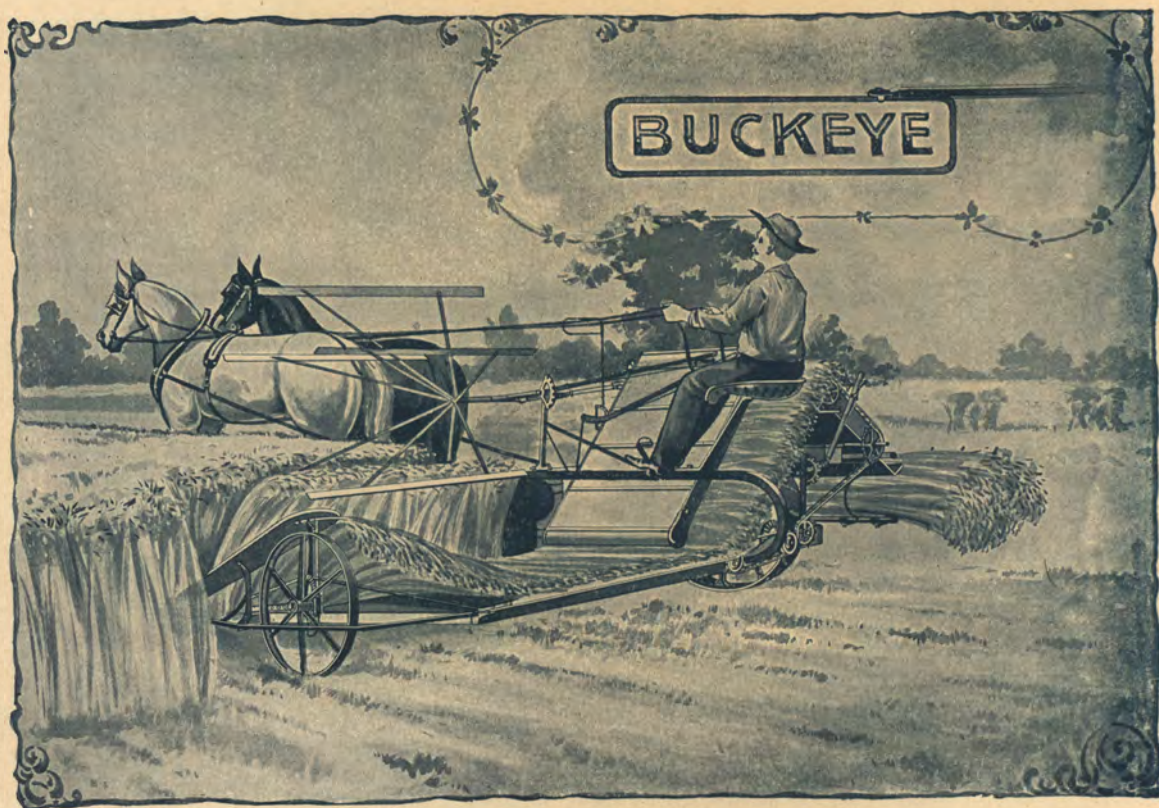
Youngest Born of the 19th Century.

The 1899 harvest verified every prediction we have made for the Center-Draft Buckeye. The new century will see all swaths six feet and over cut by center-draft machines. To do good work, and last, a long thin mower knife must be pulled, never pushed, against its work. On the Center-Draft Buckeye the knife is always pulled, always taut, like a jigsaw. This is our patent—no other mower has this supreme advantage in wide cutting.

This mower has no dead center; it has few oiling points; one horse walks in the uncut grass; but the return cut leaves no trace of trampled grass. The wheels always roll on stubble. The turns can be haw or gee, so that hillsides can be cut on a level line, instead of up and down. The field can all be mowed from one side, instead of around. The grass is left in perfect condition for drying.

The draft is direct to frame; low, adjustable seat; no side draft, no neck weight; good foot and hand lifting lever, also tilting lever; gearings are protected, and cutters are modeled after those of the Standard Buckeye, the very best made. Widths of cut 6, 7 and 8 feet.

The Center-Draft may be the youngest machine in the Buckeye family, but it's bound to "cut a wide swath."

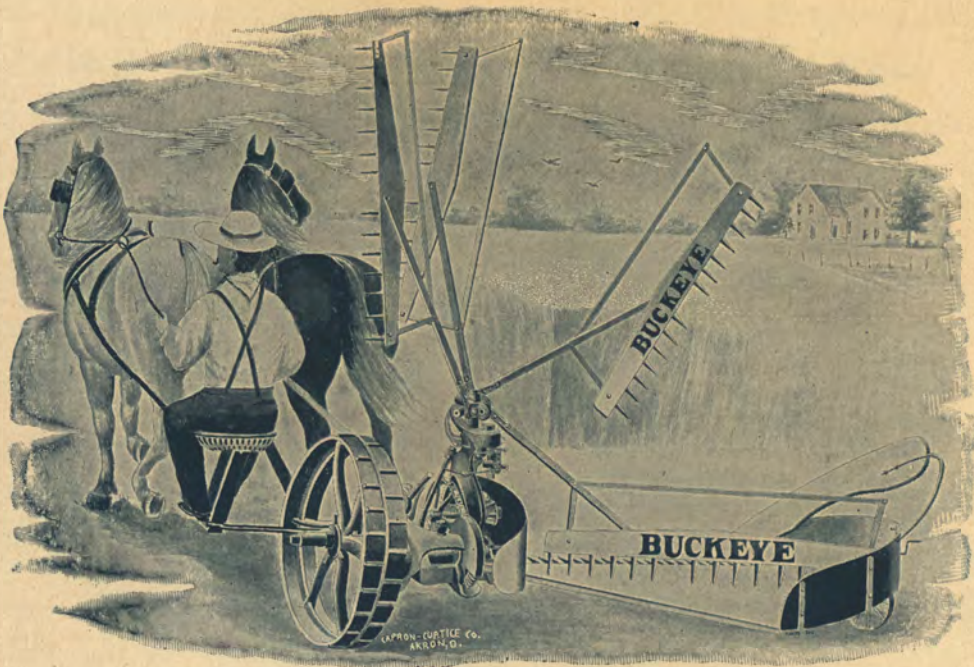
The Progress of a Century.

This machine reels, cuts, straightens the butts, ties the bands at the point desired, then delivers the sheaves in bunches for the shocker. One man thus reaps from 15 to 20 acres a day, with the least possible draft on his team, and most comfort to himself. The Buckeye has neither sectors nor frame. Its simple, light knotter can be kept always as good as new. It is capable of accomplishing more work, better work, longer work, and this with fewer parts and mechanisms and with less draft than any other binder made by the hand of man.

The Buckeye Binder is free from useless complications and dead weight. It frees its owner from the vexations of harvest. It possesses every improvement that has a fully established value; it discards useless advertising clap-traps.

The Buckeye is a strictly high-class machine. It has kept its fast hold on the best binder trade in the richest farming districts of America. It is conceivable that steam, or electricity, may some day be employed, but during the period of horse-drawn binders the Buckeye's supremacy will be maintained.

The human experience and human skill of the Nineteenth Century bequeathe to the Agriculture of the Twentieth Century no boon so full of blessings for the farmer as the Buckeye Binder.



BUCKEYE REAPER.

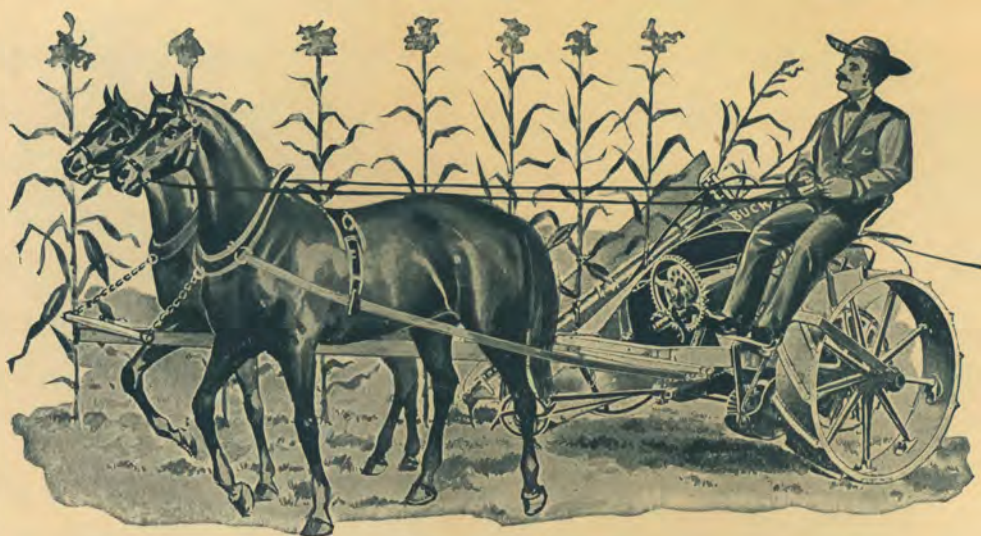
Ten Centuries of "Fathers."

The Reaper has "Fathers" till you can't rest. It is a thousand years old. The Gauls reaped by ox power. But for real "gall" the American "Fathers" take the cake. The modern reaper was invented in Scotland nearly a hundred years ago.

Reapers still continue to have their uses, same as the old sickle and scythe. Aultman, Miller & Co. make large numbers of them and, in spite of the swifter and better work of the binder, the demand for the Buckeye Reaper increases yearly. It delivers the sheaf at one side so that the whole field may be cut without binding. It is drawn by a team of horses or oxen all day long with only such attention as is needed for oiling and sizing sheaves. Its width of cut is 5 feet.

The sheaves are delivered automatically, of any size, and as far apart as desired. The whole machine can be raised or lowered and stays where put. It can also be tilted to take up lodged crops. The platform is easily folded up to pass over roads and through gates.

There is no want that can be supplied by a reaper that is not perfectly fulfilled by this machine.



BUCKEYE CORN HARVESTER.

Salvation for 20th Century Corn Fodder.

The Nineteenth Century is notable for many things. One of these was its waste of corn fodder. Untold millions of the rich products of our fields have been wasted, burned, destroyed. And now, near the end, comes the Buckeye Corn Harvester, so that the Twentieth Century's inheritance from the Nineteenth may be without a single reproach. Our machine is not a new experiment. It is stalwart enough to fight its allotted battles, and is ready for its new century's run.

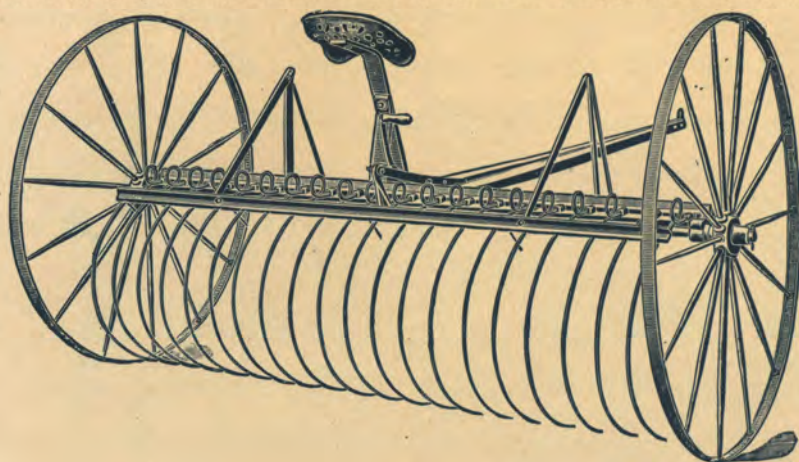
The Buckeye cuts, gathers, and assembles the stalks on a horizontal deck; a butter assures evenness of the butts; it ties bundles as large as may be wished with a good knot. The bundles fall gently only a few inches from the platform to the ground. The gearings are well protected from mud; the machine can be raised or lowered to cut the desired height, and two horses are enough. Its capacity for gathering in leaning stalks is equal to the best in that respect. It cuts, packs, trips, separates, binds and delivers the bundles to one side with the same regularity as the Buckeye handles grain. Every one of these necessary operations is done with certainty and precision.

SELF-DUMP RAKE.

The BANNER STEEL SELF-DUMP HAY RAKE has the following capital characteristics: An Angle Steel Platform; Angle Steel Rake-head and Steel Clearer-sticks; a Solid Steel Axle and Steel Truss Rod; a Steel Dump Device and Crucible Steel Teeth.

This rake dumps itself automatically just when it should do so, and never at any other time.



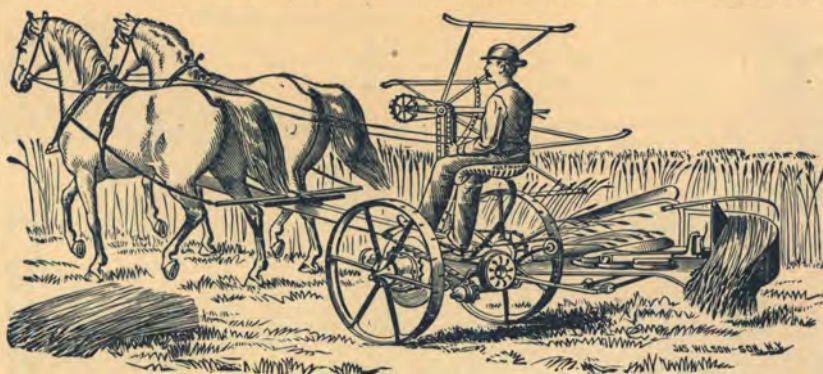
HAND-DUMP RAKE.

THE BANNER STEEL HAND-DUMP RAKE has the Head and Platform of Angle Steel. This is supported by a Continuous Solid Steel Axle; also on the larger sizes by a Truss-Rod. A Lock Lever holds the teeth to their work, but a slight upward motion of the hand dumps the load.

Our Rakes are 8 and 10 feet wide. The 8-foot size has 20, and the 10-foot size has 26 Spring Tempered Steel Teeth. Both have Combination Pole and Shafts, for one or two horses. Both have good seats with double steel, easy-riding springs. Both are guaranteed to be strictly first-class.

The Buckeye Table Rake Reaper and Mower Combined.

The Table Rake is an Automatic Side-delivery Reaper, and is built and sold either as a Single Reaper or in combination with the Buckeye Mower. It consists of an ordinary quadrant platform, with a fork on the end of a jointed arm, which sweeps around a vertical axis in the center of the table, so as to allow the fork to follow closely the surface of the platform. The fork, starting into the grain close to the inside shoe, sweeps across the platform in a line parallel to the sickle, gathering and compressing the grain against the outside or circle board, and delivering the gavel in a compact form for binding, and entirely out of the way of the machine on its next round. The fork is entirely independent of the reel, and is so

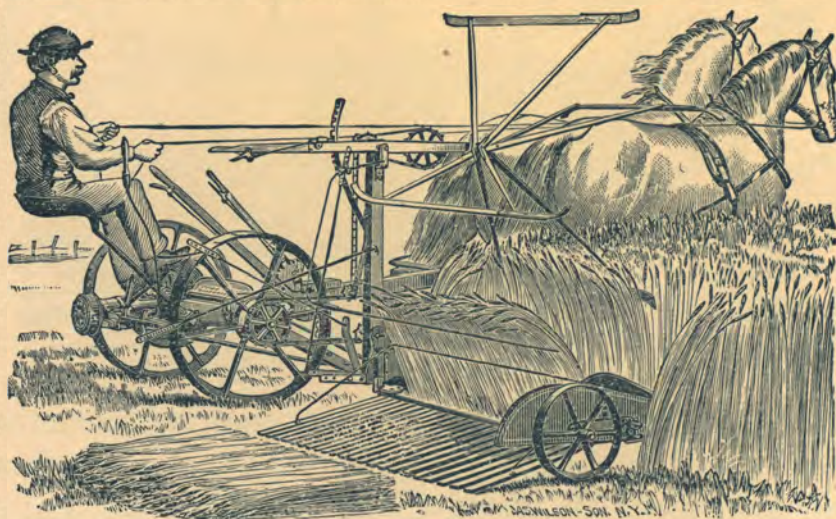


arranged as to work automatically. It is always under the control of the driver, and can be stopped or started at any point by means of a lever worked by the driver's foot. In thin grain, and at the corners of the field, the bundles can be carried as far as desired before dropping.

The simplicity, the great durability, ease of control and splendid work done by the Buckeye Table Rake are so widely recognized as to render it unnecessary to dwell upon them here. No reaper has ever succeeded in making so neat a sheaf, and no equal to it in taking up down grain has ever been produced. The Table Rake and Buckeye Mower Combined has long been, and still continues to be, the favorite machine in some of the richest farming districts of the Union.

The Buckeye Dropper and Mower Combined.

The Buckeye Dropper deposits the sheaf in the rear of the machine. The bundles are easily sized by the driver, by means of a foot lever. The cutter-bar being in front, the driver's safety is assured. This brings the slatted platform right under the driver's eye, thus sparing him the straining and tiresome effort required in constantly looking back to ascertain the size of his gavel, while his eye should, in fact, be in front, looking out for obstructions. With farmers who do not raise very large crops the Buckeye Dropper is justly a great favorite, because it is the simplest form of reaper; it is easiest to handle; its work is equal to the best, and it is the least expensive.



OUR COMBINED MACHINES. We have not hitherto made mention of an important stride in the progress of the mower and reaper industry, which was first made by the inventors and manufacturers of the Buckeye, viz.: the combination into one machine of a good mower and an equally good reaper. Both our Table Rake and Dropper machines are built as mowers, but are so made that a self-raking attachment or dropping attachment can be added in a few minutes. These attachments can be set to work automatically, and they are under the control of the driver as completely as the mower itself.

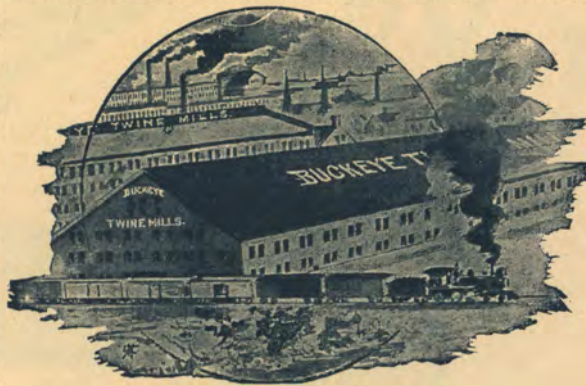

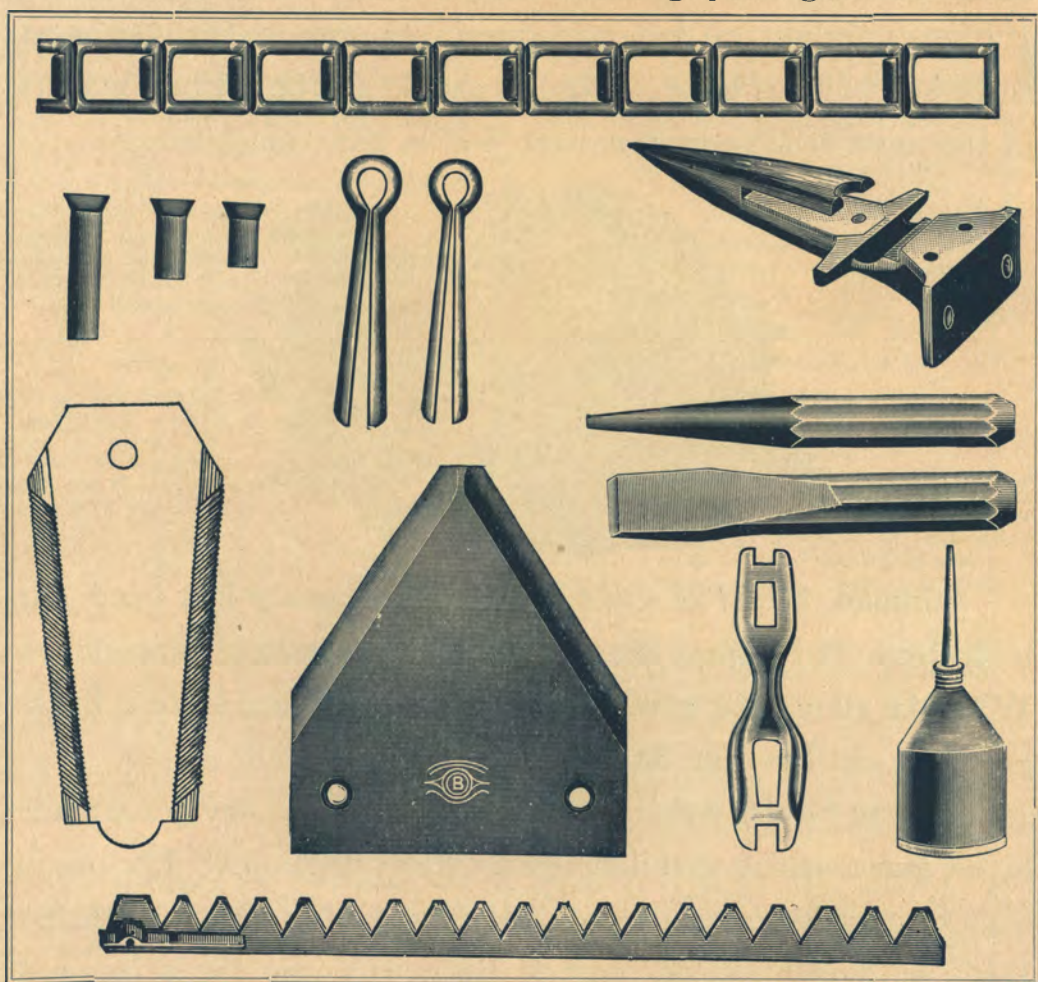

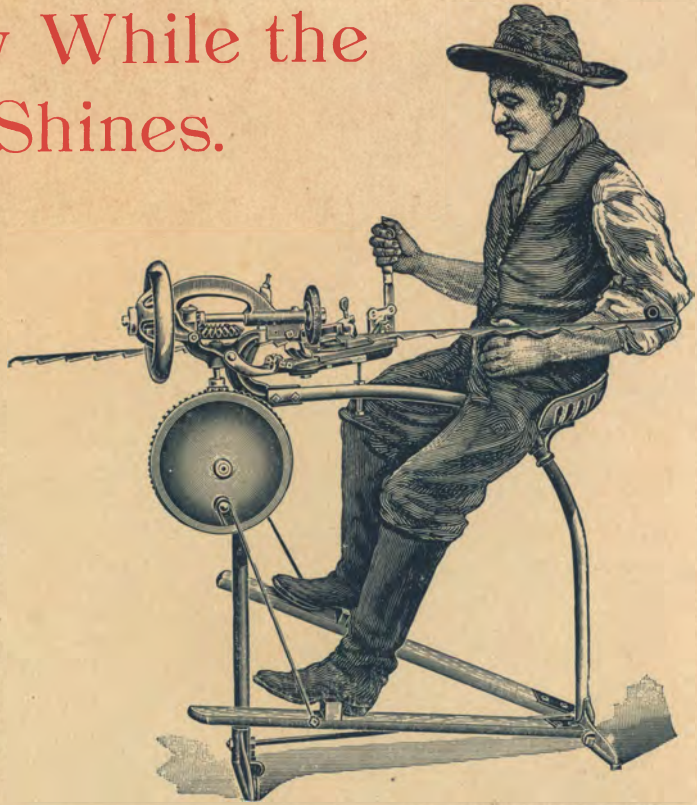
