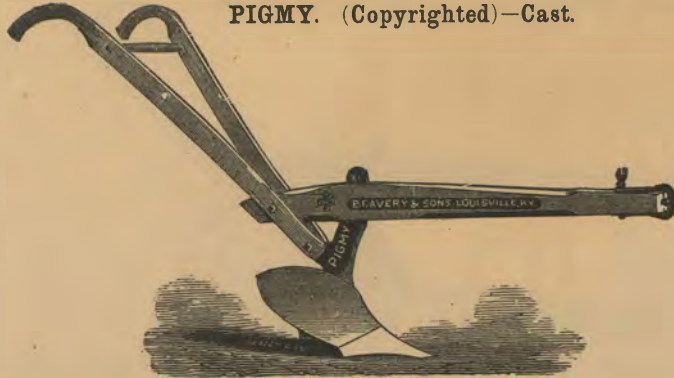

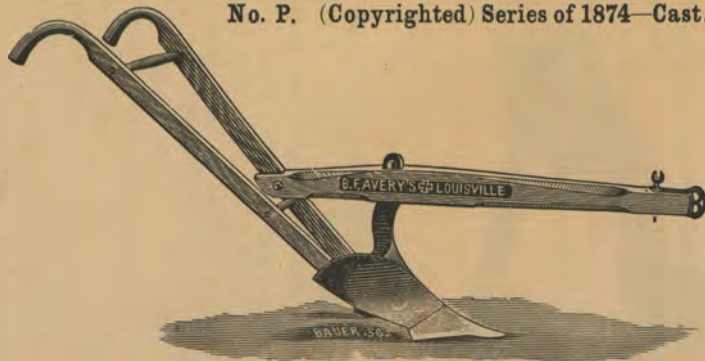

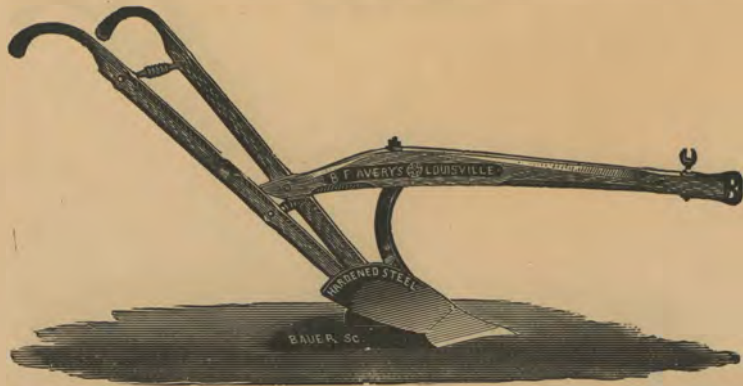
AVERY'S PATENT MALLEABLE FROG.

The malleable frog is one of the valuable features of all our steel plows, and this should be thoroughly understood by merchants selling them. Malleable iron is much stronger than wrought iron or any other iron or material. It is singularly adapted for this purpose, and although originally cast as ordinary castings are made, the process through which it is put requires two weeks of furnace treatment before it acquires the requisite strength. These frogs can be hammered into almost any shape, and have stood the strain of plowing so well, that we have never had or known of one of them to break. They not only form the frame-work of the entire plow, but being made out of one piece, in such angles as to form a complete brace, they have all necessary strength. Also, these frogs permit the use of *straight* handles instead of bent; and *straight* handles, besides being cheaper, are more easily replaced.

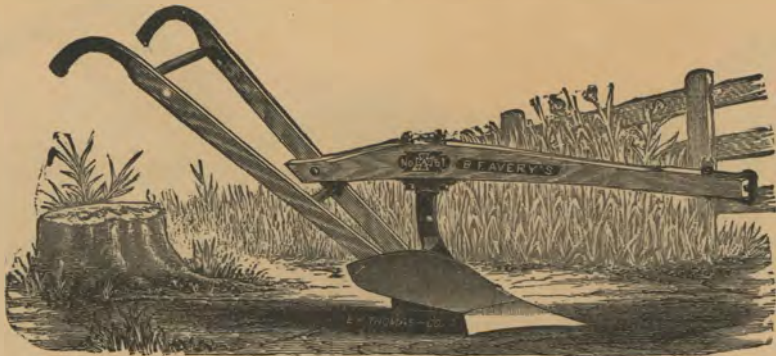

The extra shares are all duplicates, and are welded to a strong bar, making them far more valuable than the ordinary slip-shares. All our steel plows have now the improved sloping steel landside. 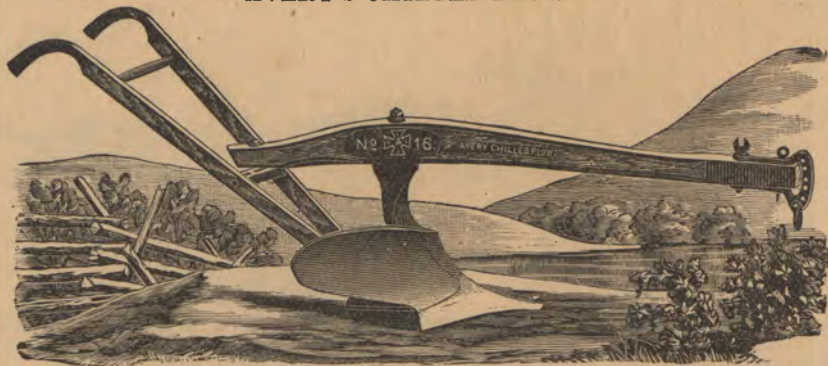
If this plow could be seen at work, it would be pronounced a "clipper." It will scour perfectly in the worst black-land.

AVERY'S CHILLED PLOW.



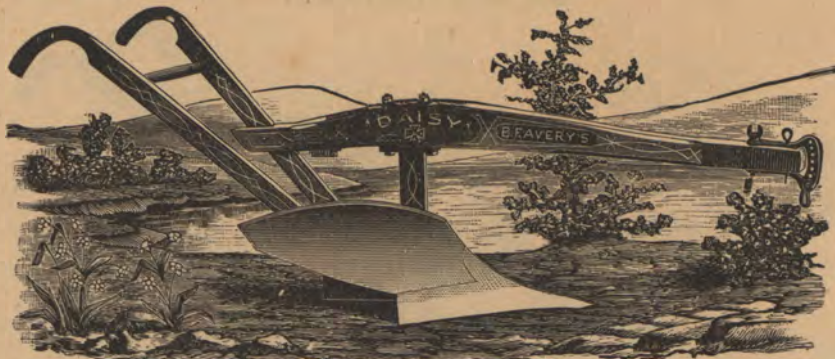
The greatest care has been exercised in making these chilled plows, and they will be found doubly as strong and tough as any other chilled plow now made. We manufacture seven sizes: No. 14, 6½-inch cut, is a light one-horse plow; No. 14½, 7-inch cut; No. 15, 8-inch cut, is a light two-horse plow; No. 16, 9½-inch cut, works well in sod and stubble; No. 16½, 10-inch cut; No. 17, 11-inch cut, is especially adapted for heavy plowing; No. 18, 12-inch cut, is a good, strong three-horse plow. Remember, we warrant these plows to cut as stated, and not to fall short in cut, like those of many other manufacturers.

THE "DAISY" CLIPPER SERIES.

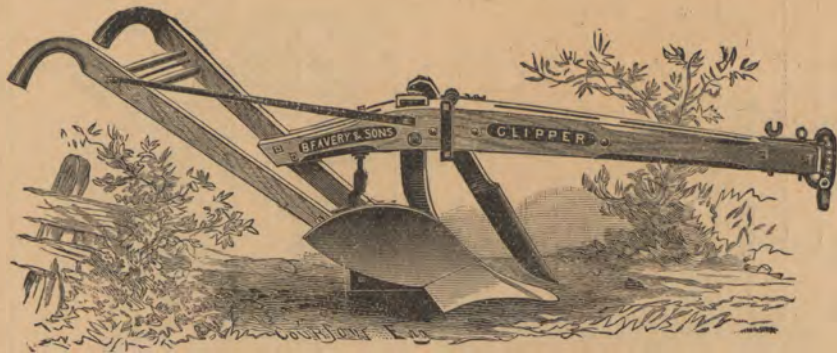

It is, without exception, the strongest, lightest draft, and handsomest plow ever brought into the market. We make the "Daisy" in three sizes: "G," 10-inch cut, \$14.00; "H," 12-inch cut, \$16.50; "K," 14-inch cut, \$19.00. These prices without extra points. This plow has cast as well as steel points, so that farmers can use the former when the ground is soft after rains, and the latter when the ground is hard and baked up. This plow has been materially changed in shape, etc. and, as it now stands, is by far the best and strongest plow in the market. The stock is of seasoned white oak, with a broad iron plate attached to the beam, while the coulter is securely capped and so arranged as to be changed from a jumping to a cutting coulter.

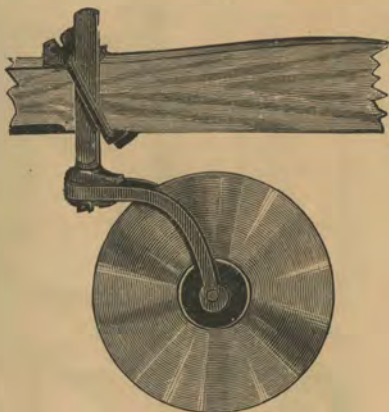
FIVE-TOOTH CULTIVATOR.
