THE DAISY SULKY HAY RAKE.

The teeth on the Daisy are so shaped that they run under the hay, and, as they load up, the hay does not lift them off the ground, so they require nothing to hold them down. The weight of the tooth only rests on the ground, so they will not dig into hummocks and ridges, and never makes hay dusty.

This is the most important consideration in buying a rake, as a single ton of dusty hay may ruin a valuable horse worth many times the total cost of a rake. The next objection to all wood axle rakes is, that they sag or warp out of shape, and the teeth in the center are either constantly digging in the ground, or those at the end slip over the hay. To overcome this difficulty the Daisy has an inch iron truss-rod axle, as shown on the following cut, which can never warp, twist or spring out of shape, and would hold up a ton weight without sagging. This is a very important feature.

The Daisy is neither a Hand-Dump nor Horse-Dump, but a perfect Self-Dump.

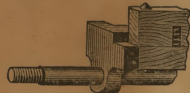
Any child large enough to drive a horse can handle it as easy or easier than a horse-dump; it will rake a windrow double the size of any horse-dump rake, and then you can turn round and bunch it up.

The wheels have a box that takes all the wear, which can be replaced for twenty-five cents, and save buying a \$4.00 wheel, as shown in the following cuts:

"THE COLORADO DAISY"

Is made the same width (8 ft.) as the ordinary rake, but has 28 teeth, including two guard teeth.

"THE GIANT DAISY"

Is 12 feet wide, taking two swaths of a wide mower, or three swaths of a narrow mower.
