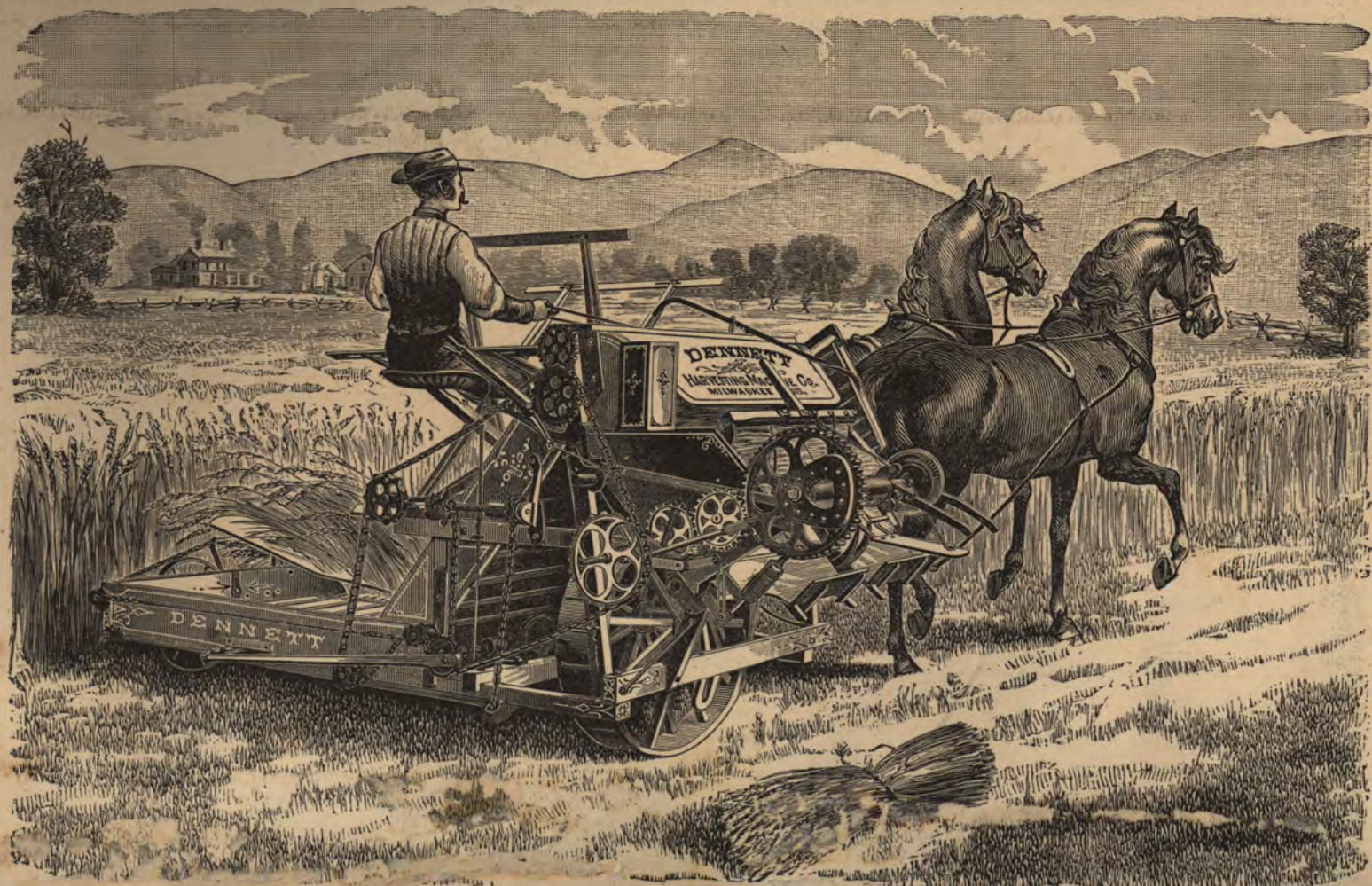

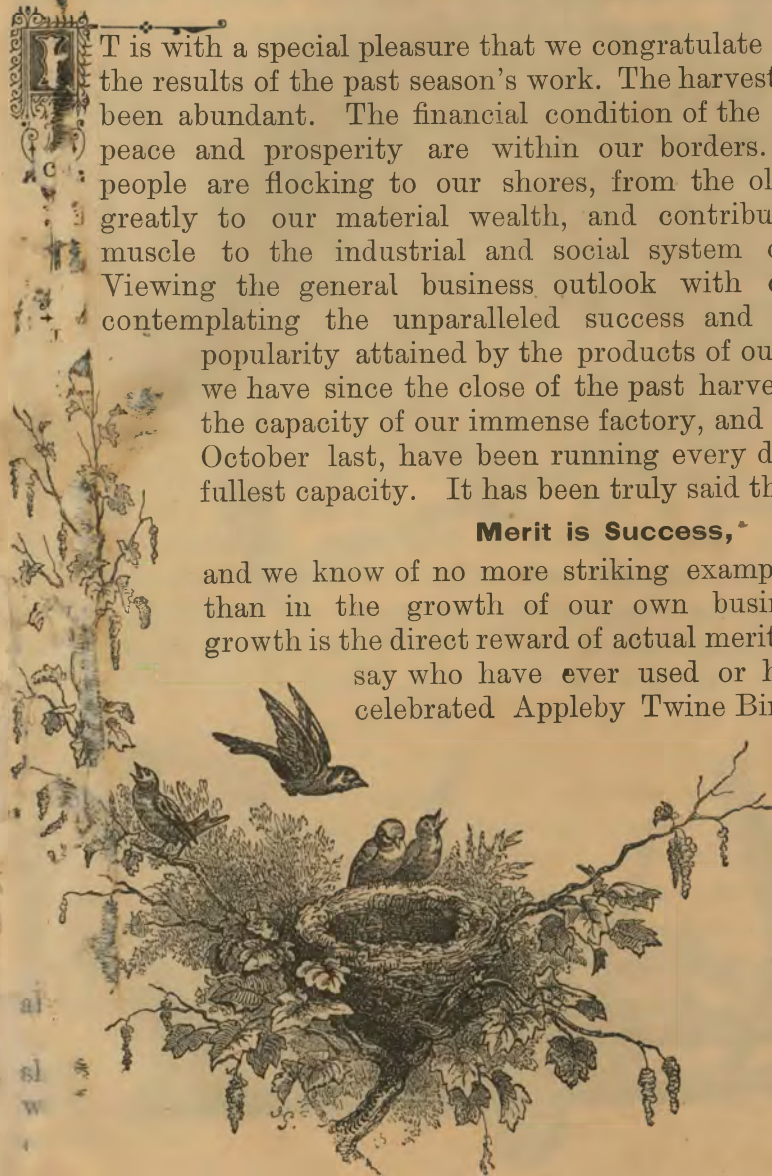

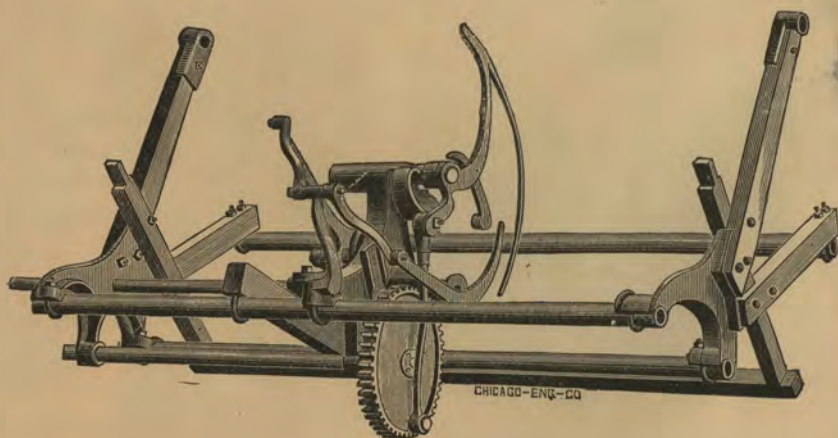

Within the past five years the Appleby Twine Binder has completely revolutionized the method of har-

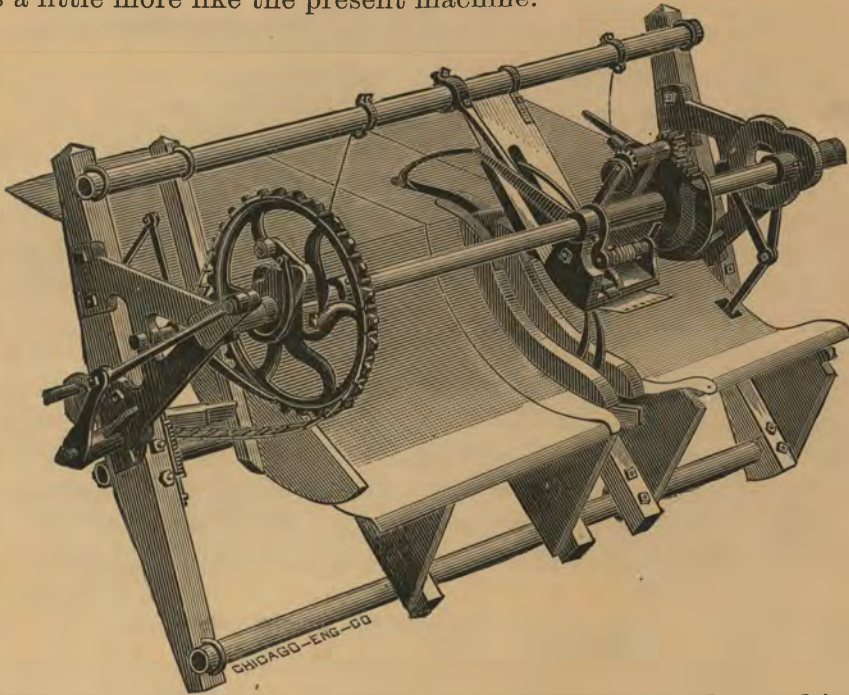


vesting small grain, and to the thousands of farmers, from whom this machine has lifted the great burden of harvest toil, a few words on its origin may not be uninteresting.

About the year 1850, the immediate predecessors of this concern commenced in Beloit, Wis., the manufacture of reaper and mower knives and sickles, the first establishment of the kind in the country. In 1855 they invented and gave to the trade the "BELOIT HAND RAKING REAPER." These machines became very popular, and the business grew very rapidly; then followed the demand for a self-rake, and the "NEW BELOIT SELF-RAKING REAPER" came at once to the front, proving a very worthy successor of the old hand-raking machine. Next in the line of improvement came the old Marsh Harvester, and this concern with characteristic sagacity and promptness, sought to and did very materially improve on the "Marsh," and put on the market the "BELOIT HARVESTER." The chief improvement being the double canvas elevators, (since adopted by the Marsh and nearly all others,) the adjustable reel, a better device for raising and lowering the machine, a more perfect grain divider and other important changes. Other companies were working on wire binders; but we, believing firmly in the ultimate success of the Twine Binder, engaged the services of Mr. John F. Appleby, and commenced to work on our present machine. From that commencement in 1872, until the machine was brought near to perfection, in 1877, a period of five years, we worked steadily and undaunted. The expenses and outlays of money were enormous, and the obstacles and discouragements were many and frequent; we were made the subject of any amount of ridicule by our wire binder neighbors but "all the same" the good work went on. Look at the following cut.

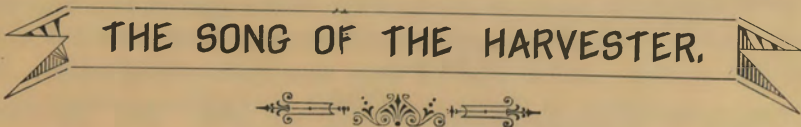


It represents the skeleton form of the first Appleby Binder produced; it weighed about 650 pounds, was about six feet long and five feet high, had but one packer, and as will be seen was quite a curiosity. The following cut is a picture of the next attempt, and although very imperfect, looks a little more like the present machine.



In 1876, our Beloit shops put into the field ONE binder, and in 1877, FOUR; they were tried from the Southern to the extreme Northern harvests, and in 1878, about 115 were built. UP TO THIS TIME THE BELOIT WAS THE ONLY MACHINE THAT HAD HAD ANY SUCCESS WITH A TWINE BINDER, and while they had not all given perfect satisfaction, which is accounted for in part by the fact that agents were not familiar with them, and farmers knew absolutely nothing about them, yet they were enough of a success to warrant the largest companies in the country in taking out licenses and engaging in their manufacture. In 1879, 225 machines with the Beloit or Appleby Twine Binders were built; in 1880, 4,000; in 1881, 19,000; and in 1882, the different companies turned out about 60,000 of these celebrated machines.

At the close of the season of 1881, having completely outgrown our shops in Beloit, and requiring better manufacturing and shipping facilities we removed to Milwaukee and the company was incorporated under its present name.

DESCRIPTION OF THE HARVESTER.



NOTE.—We shall have a carefully selected stock of Repairs at each Agency.

There are a large number of Twine Binders before the public to-day, and we fully realize the fact [that our machines must depend on their OWN MERITS for the position they are to occupy. Twine Binders have now been on the market long enough for farmers to judge for themselves which machines embody the very best points, are finished with the greatest care and expense, will do the work with the least possible delay and expense, draw the easiest and last the longest before going to pieces. We are also fully aware of the importance of building our machine AT THE FACTORY instead of being obliged to follow it up with an army of expert doctors, and build it all over again in the field, and we believe that our long experience with Twine Binders, together with our unequalled facilities and determination to have the *best or none*, will be fully appreciated by the farming public, when our machines are placed in careful comparison with others, and that we shall be accorded the same degree of preference and patronage the coming year that we have met with in the past.

Our samples are now in the hands of agents, and we respectfully invite attention to their general make-up, and to the following points in particular, and ask a careful comparison of the same with other machines. A Harvester and Binder costs considerable money, and it will pay you to take what time is necessary to make a thorough examination, and then put your money where you will get the best return for it.

Our Cutter Bar

Is made of the very best refined steel and iron; we departed from the old wooden bar in 1879, while other companies relying on their "reputation" for patronage rather than the real excellence of their machines, retained that cheap feature until within the past year, when they found that farmers were bound to have a metal bar. We believe we have the very best constructed metal cutter bar in existence, and will warrant IT NEVER TO SAG OR WARP. This is important, for the reason that when a cutter bar is once bent or sags, the whole harvester will become uneven, and will never run true after that. By the peculiar construction of our bar, we not only secure great strength, but we bring the platform canvas near to the sickle, thus preventing all "slobbering," and ensuring neat, clean work, whether grain is short or long.

Guards.

In order to cut clean and prevent clogging in dew and rain, it is necessary that the Steel Sickle should play on an equally good surface. We never have heard one instance of our machine clogging, and the reason is that our Guards are made of malleable iron with a wide sickle steel plate riveted in them, which is sharpened and polished, thus giving two perfect cutting edges. The Guards are bolted to the Cutter Bar, and one can be taken off and another put in its place in a minute.

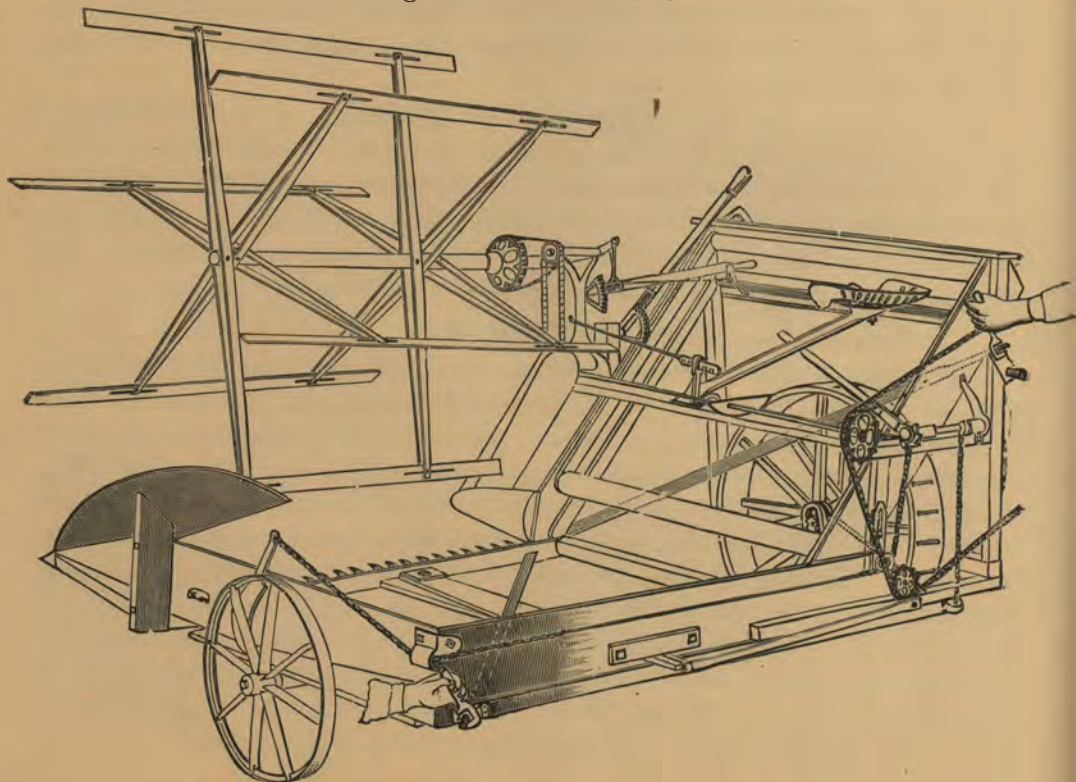
Grain Wheel.

The device we use for fastening the Grain Wheel and upon which we have made an application for a patent, is the simplest and most perfect contrivance ever invented.

Raising and Lowering.

On this very important point we challenge the field. We lower our machine so as to cut stubble four inches high, and raise it so as to cut it twenty inches high, and all is done easily by the driver with one hand and without getting down from his seat. We have used this device with some alterations and improvements, every season since 1877, and it has always been a complete success—never getting out of order.

The following cut shows the grain end of the raising and lowering device, together with the grain wheel and our



Celebrated Adjustable Diagonal Braces.

Generally the first thing to wear out about a Harvester is the Platform Canvas, next the Elevator Canvases. Why is this? We will tell you. After a machine has run a day or two there is a tendency for the grain end to work back and throw the platform out of square, then the rollers are not parallel and the canvas wears out. We prevent this effectually by the use of a long flat brace attached to the Cutter Bar, near the first Guard, extending diagonally under the Sway Bar to the back grain corner, and there attach it to a casting and adjust it by a nut. One or two companies have adopted a round brace, but in order to use it have been obliged to throw out the Center Sway Bar and shake the sickle from one end, which requires cumbersome and complicated gearing, and does not move the sickle as easily as when attached at the center. In order to preserve the "center shake" we invented the flat brace, and so far as we know, are the only ones using it. We also invented and were the first ones to use the long diagonal brace extending from the Cutter Bar, near the first Guard, under the Elevators, to the upper back corner of the frame, and there attach it to a casting and adjust it by a nut; these, in addition to the ordinary fixed braces, keep the Elevators square at all times, and in connection with the Platform Brace and metal Cutter Bar, already described, will keep the whole machine square and in perfect running shape until it is worn out. Don't buy a machine that will go to pieces in three or four years. Ours *is put up for service*, and a thorough examination of it will convince you of that fact.

We SHAKE THE SICKLE FROM THE CENTER, which makes the machine at least one-half a horse easier draft, requires much less gearing, and renders the sickle much less liable to break than to have the connection at one end.

Adjustable Reel.

The adaptability of a Harvester for handling tangled and lodged grain depends mostly upon the Reel. We have, in our long experience in grain harvesting, met and provided for all conditions of grain, and we have found the Reel to be a very important thing; we make ours larger than any other and run it a little slower; it has a forward and back motion, and an up and down motion, each one independent of the other, and we have never found grain so short, or so tall, or so badly lodged, that we could not handle it well. We are making two styles of reel levers, either of which arrangements is perfect.

Master or Main Driving Wheel and Axle.

By comparing the size of our master wheel with other machines, you will find it is LARGER, broader and much stronger made; its size

ensures easy draft, while its width will admit of its working on soft ground where narrower wheels will not go. Please examine also how securely the main axle is locked with the hangers so as to prevent side play.

The Arrangement of the Main Shaft Boxes.

is such that there is very little friction, and they seldom have to be replaced; they are made as perfect as mechanical skill can finish them, and there is no babbit metal or split boxes to bother and wear out.

The Roller Gudgeons.

are firmly riveted at each end of the rollers, and the

Tilting Device

is so perfect that the driver can rock the guards up and down with one hand, and with but little effort, while the machine is

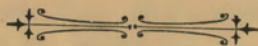

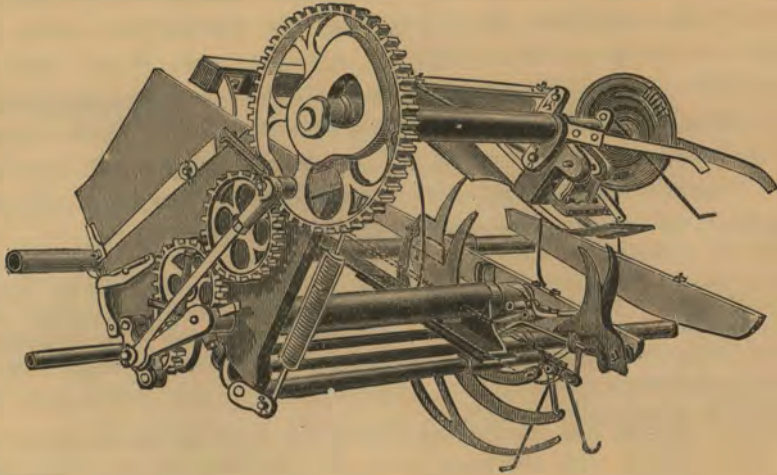

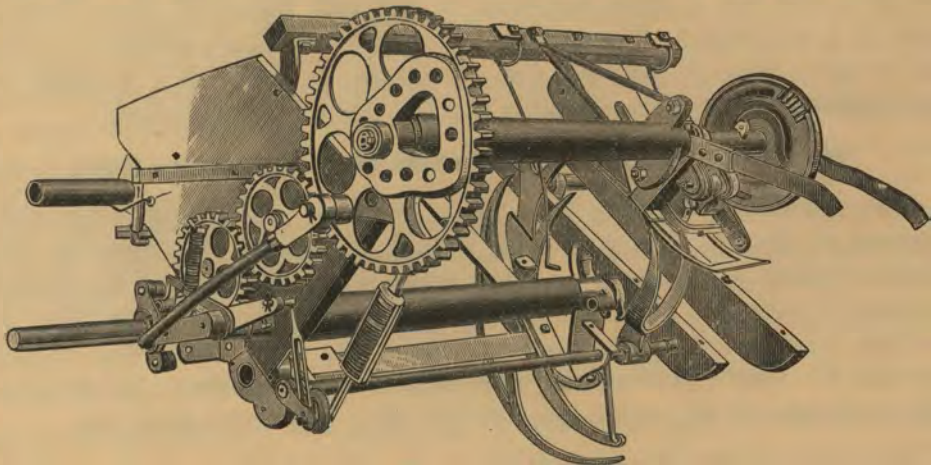
The following is an outline cut of the Standard Binder.

On this Binder we have wrought a complete revolution in the direction of SIMPLICITY and EASE of MANAGEMENT. Two years ago we very quietly put out a few Binders embodying the principles of this New Machine. They were so simple, and worked so completely, that

we at first intended to make all our 1882 machines after that pattern; but thinking the more prudent course would be to put the improvement only on a part of the machines, we did so, and the result has been that not one has given the least bit of trouble. There is so much less to them than any other Twine Binder, that they "take the eye" at once. They are very strongly built, and seldom get out of order, and cannot "run away" and make little bundles. They weigh 50 pounds less than the Standard Binders, and can be set in one minutes' time so as to make six different sizes of bundles, from the smallest to the largest.

WE HAVE DISCARDED THE MALLEABLE IRON TRIP TAIL, THE ENTIRE TRIP SHAFT AND ALL ITS FIXTURES; THE MALLEABLE IRON TRIP SWORD, THE TRIP SWORD CONNECTION, THE TWO CAST IRON PACKER CONNECTION HOLDERS, ALL THE IRON RODS THAT THROW THE DROP DECKS, ALL THE CAST IRON HINGES (EIGHT IN NUMBER) THAT OPERATE THE DROP DECKS, THE DOUBLE TRIP HOOKS; THE WOODEN SLACK LEVER AT THE BACK END OF THE BINDER, WITH ALL ITS CAST IRON FIXTURES AND CONNECTIONS.

PLEASE COMPARE THE TWO CUTS AND NOTE HOW MUCH SIMPLER THE ONE IS THAN THE OTHER, AND REMEMBER THAT OURS IS THE ONLY BINDER THAT HAS THESE IMPROVEMENTS.

Gearing and Balancing the Machine.

One very important advantage our Binder has over most others is its gearing, and working end is in the rear instead of the front, thus taking all weight off from the horses' necks, and balancing the machine perfectly; those who put the heavy end in front will tell you to get upon the seat and see if their machine is not well balanced also. But ask them how it is when the machine is running on rough ground or where the driver jumps off the seat for something—a moment's thought will demonstrate that the front end is not the place for the weight.

We use the Economical, Simple Steel Stationary Disc.

and it is the most perfect Disc made, it never gets out of order and is adapted to Manila, Hemp or Flax twine; the single Disc used on other binders raises and lowers, and has much more complicated mechanism connected with it, and requires more twine from the fact that our knotter takes most of the twine to make the knot FROM THE BUNDLE, whereas the single moving disc MOVES TOWARD THE KNOTTER AND FURNISHES THE NECESSARY TWINE, ABOUT TWO INCHES, MORE THAN OURS REQUIRES.

Our New Detachable Threading Stick

makes ours the only binder which can be threaded without getting down under the machine.

We have put a new track-clearer in the disc, which renders its action positive, and keeps out the particles which tend to spread the sides.

We have the string finger and needle so arranged that the string finger can perform its secondary office, namely, *that of moving ahead of the needle* as it is entering the breast-plate at the critical time when wet or tangled grain is liable to be forced into the breast-plate and choke the machine, at the same time it performs its primary office with absolute perfection, namely, that of placing the cord on the knotting jaw. These improved machines have demonstrated the fact that the string finger, if rightly made, is ahead of anything ever produced for tucking the cord on to the knotting-hook and preventing the choking of the Binder in wet and tangled grain.

Moving the Binder.

We are putting a new device for moving the binder backward and forward, on part of our machines this season. The result is accomplished by the use of a simple lever within easy reach of the driver's hand, and is very quickly and easily done.

Minor Details.

We have used the Double Canvas Elevators since 1875, and our elevation is simply perfect. Our binder will not chock up no matter how heavy or wet the grain may be, whereas many others are obliged to use "packer trips" and other complicated devices to keep their binders from chocking. It separates all its bundles perfectly, no matter how much wild buckwheat or tangled morning glory there may be in the grain. We contend and hold ourselves ready to prove by actual tests in the harvest field, that that class of binders which have the gearing and heavy end in front will scatter more grain at the rear of the binder than ours. Especially when going slightly up hill or the guards are rocked up a little. Also, that we can handle tall rye and heavy grain equally as well or better than they. There is no side draft to the machine, and we can refer to reliable farmers in almost every locality where the machines have been sold who have finished extensive harvests with but two light horses. Lastly we invite special attention to the machine in general and to its

Finish and Workmanlike Appearance

which is an index to its merits all the way through, and we are willing at all times to meet our competitor in the field and let the machines talk for themselves.

Transportation Trucks.

Recognizing the necessity of having some method of transporting our Harvester on the road or through ordinary bridges and gateways, we

this year arranged with the Ashley Wire Co., of Joliet, Ill., to supply the Calais & Barnes patent trucks, which all of our patrons who have used them pronounce the best thing out. Their simplicity and strength, and the ease with which the driver can, unaided, load or unload his machine in a few minutes and remove it any distance without danger to machine, commends it at once.

Reaper.

We now have in process of construction a light single Reaper, in which we are aiming to embody all the good points, and in general to improve on the "Royce" and "Triumph" machines; but owing to the rapidly increasing demand for our Binders, we shall only be able to put our Reapers on the market the coming season in limited numbers, their principles have been tested and whoever buys them may rely on a good Reaper.

Platform Binder.

Our new Platform Binder, we believe, has been as successful as any yet put on the market, but like all others, its future is uncertain. The success or failure of the "low down" principle is still an unsolved problem; it may come in time, but we say to farmers, don't invest your money in a "low down" until you see them fully perfected, we believe you will have ample time to wear out one good elevator binder before the "low down" machine is perfected and safe to invest in, if, indeed, they *ever* are.

Gentlemen:—Your favor of July 10th, inquiring as to the results of my experiments with the Beloit Harvester with Binder attached, came some days since to hand, but owing to a press of work, my reply has been delayed until now.

As to the machine, too much cannot be said in its favor. I had a fair chance to try it under all circumstances, first in barley, cutting clean and neatly about 20 acres daily and binding snug and uniform. Then in the oats with like result, using three horses.

The ground was level. Then in the wheat, on very uneven and hilly land and heavy grain. The land was the roughest and most hilly I ever saw harvested; still our machine surprised us and every one who saw it work-

ing on those steep side hills, cutting neatly and evenly, and binding so uniformly and satisfactorily, as round after round was taken midst the hills. In heavy grain and light grain it is alike satisfactory.

And rendering the gearing almost noiseless. The gearing is located on the main shaft, between the drive wheels.

The knives are always kept in motion. The motion is gotten up very quickly, so that NO BACKING IS NECESSARY when starting the machine in the most difficult kind of cutting; nor can it be clogged down in the worst grass or clover, its power and action being such that the guards will be cleared by every vibration of the knife.

The driver, FROM HIS SEAT, has PERFECT AND EASY CONTROL OVER THE ENTIRE MACHINE. By means of the tilting lever, the points of the guards can be thrown UP OR DOWN, and with the lifting lever the bar may be raised bodily from the ground, in order to pass OVER ANY ROCKS OR OTHER OBSTRUCTIONS; thus by means of these two levers, the cutting apparatus is ENTIRELY UNDER THE CONTROL OF THE DRIVER, and may be instantly changed, as occasion may require.

The finger-bar (4 ft. cut) is made of cold rolled iron, rolled expressly for us, and is tough and strong and as light as can be made for the purpose.

Two mowing knives are furnished with each Iron Mower. The machine is thrown in and out of gear by a lever within easy reach of the driver, which stops and starts all of the gearing. THERE IS NO BETTER PITMAN USED on any machine than will be found on our New Iron Mower.

It has NO SIDE DRAFT, and no weight on the horses' necks. It is all IRON AND STEEL, except the tongue, whiffletrees, neck-yoke and swather. Runs very light, and is

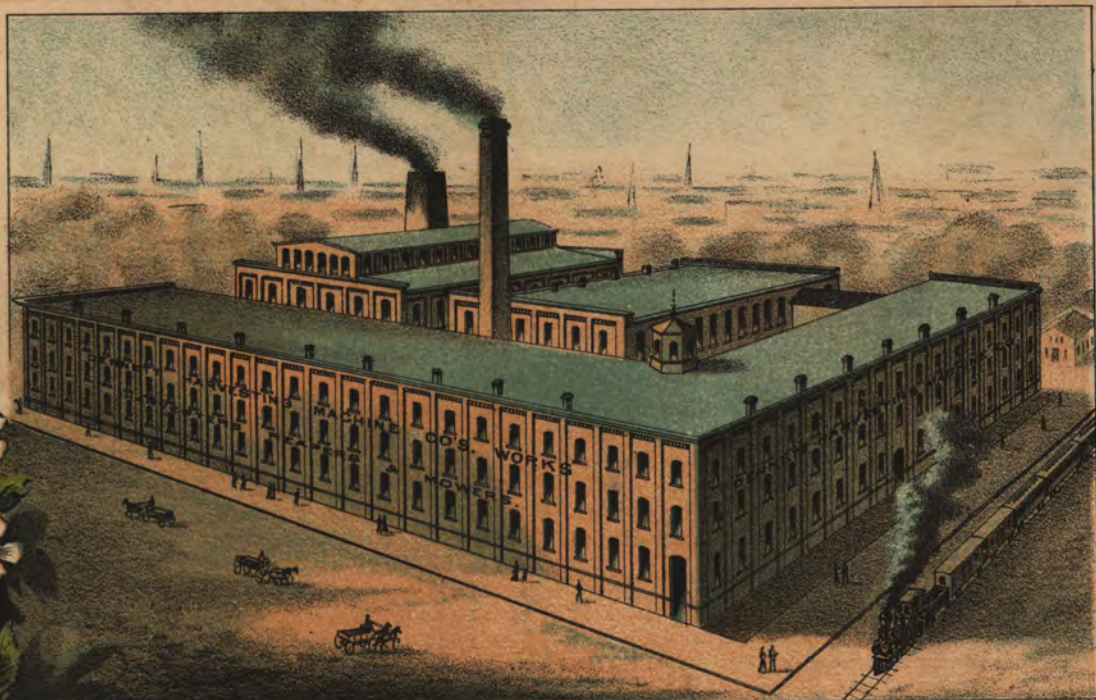
