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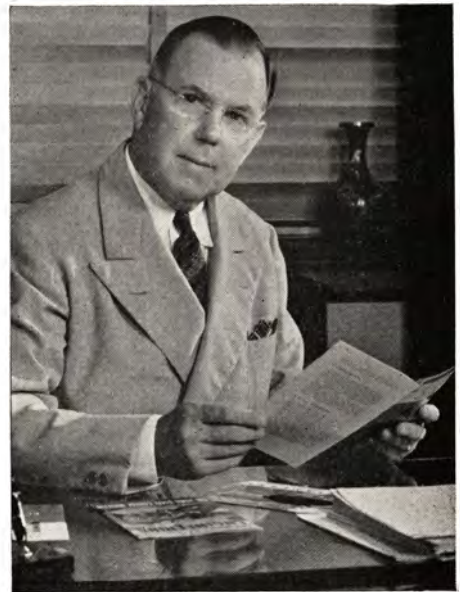

To the Alumni and Other Friends of the Iowa State College:

We are glad that you have found it possible to return to the College for Homecoming Day. We think of this occasion as one of the highlights of the year, and it is naturally made more enjoyable by your presence.

Since June, 1942, most of the energies of the College have been concentrated on the war program. During that time nearly 15,000 young men in uniform have been trained for technical and specialized work in the Armed Forces. There are still more than 2,000 men in uniform on the campus.

It is anticipated that the civilian enrollment will now begin to increase steadily, with the return of more men from the service. For the two or three years following the cessation of hostilities the enrollment at the Iowa State College is likely to be around 10,000 annually.

Much credit must be given to the members of the regular student body for their fine cooperation during the last two or three years. Because of the presence of men in uniform the regular student groups have had to undergo certain inconveniences, but they have accepted the situation as a natural consequence of the war effort and have made a notable contribution in various ways to the success of the College war program.

Every effort has been made during the war period to keep alive the essential peace-time activities of the College, particularly the student extra-curricular activities. An important phase of this program is, of course, connected with recreation and athletics. Health is of vital importance, and the College is committed to a comprehensive program which will encourage every student to keep himself in first-class physical condition.

The College is fortunate in having a good football team this year and an excellent coaching staff. We hope that you will enjoy your visit here, and we also hope that you will find it possible to return often.

Head Coach A. M. (Mike) Michalske is in his third year as Cyclone mentor. Mike had a brief appearance as head coach in the fall of 1942 when he took over the reins of the Cyclone team in mid-season. Prior to that, he served during the '42 season as line coach. Mike's experience in college football began at Penn State College, where he starred at guard and fullback for three years, graduating in 1926. After three seasons with the New York Yankees, professional football team, Michalske played for ten years with the Green Bay Packers. He was named All-American professional guard for six years.



Backfield Coach Clayton (Chick) Sutherland is serving his fourth season on the Iowa State College staff. Chick had considerable experience in Physical Education and in coaching at a number of Iowa high schools, prior to joining the Cyclone staff. He played in the back-

field at Coe College, Cedar Rapids, graduating in 1923. He came to Iowa State as freshman coach in all sports and then moved in as head baseball coach, and assisted Ray Donels who was then head coach. When Michalske took over in 1942, Sutherland became backfield coach.



This is the first season at Iowa State College for Freshman Coach Russell (Russ) Dickinson. He played end at Iowa State Teachers College, where he graduated in 1922. He then went to Itasca Junior College, Corlaine, Minnesota, where he remained as coach until 1925. Russ served as coach and athletic director at the high school and junior college at Marshalltown, Iowa, for eight years, before coming here in 1943 to become scout and assistant to Michalske. He drills the frosh and scrubs in opponents' plays and formations, in addition to assisting with the varsity line.

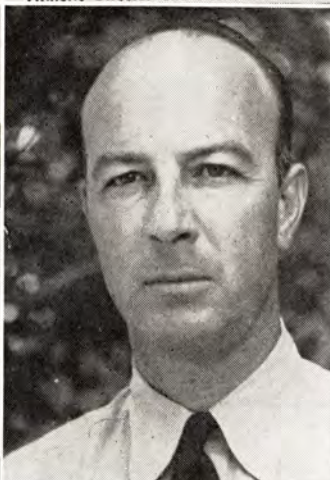

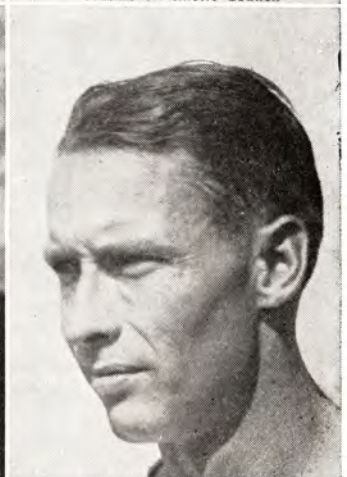

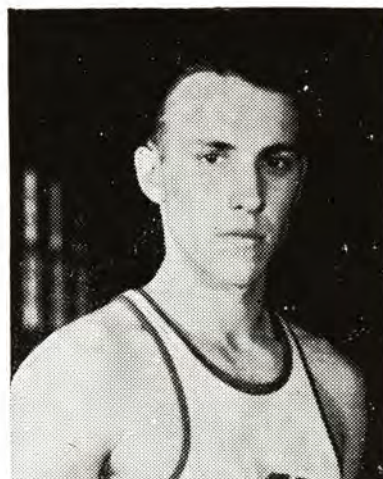
Iowa State Basketball Outlook for 1944-45

The 1944-45 basketball prospects at Iowa State College are uncertain at this early date.

Only two lettermen from last season's Big Six champions are back: William Block, Muscatine, Iowa, and Jimmy Myers, Sioux City, Iowa. Orlyn Feurbach, 1942 letter-winner, has been discharged from the Army and is back on the squad.

Two freshmen have been showing well in early pre-season practice sessions: Robert Mott, 6 foot, 3 inch Jewell, Iowa, center, and Warren Herman, 6 foot 1 inch, Gladbrook, Iowa guard. A couple of last spring's baseball team are trying their hands at basketball for the first time. Merl Kleen, husky 6 foot, 2 inch Waverly, Iowa, pitcher, and Jack Runyan, flashy shortstop from Des Moines, are working out at center and forward respectively. A minor letter-winner of two years ago, Gene Phelps, is expected to report at the close of the football season.

Sixty-five men reported to Coach Louis Menze at the initial practice nearly a month ago. The squad has been cut to 23.

Under Menze's direction, the Cyclones won conference championships in 1935, '41, and '44. Menze came here in the fall of 1928 from Central High of Kansas City, Mo. He is a graduate of Missouri State Teachers in the year 1923.

War Has Not Stopped I. S. C. Athletic Program

World War II has disrupted many programs. One of these was the broad program of sports, physical education and recreation of our students which was rapidly reaching the high mark of participation we had set for it. Iowa State always believed in physical fitness and recreation. We have always felt, and results bore out this feeling, that active, healthy students physically were good students mentally. We could see they were generally happy students and happy students eliminate many problems in natural consequence. It was all a contributing part to that intangible feeling here we just call Iowa State spirit.

Actual counts on many evenings have been made of 750 boys engaged at one time in sports of their own volition and choosing. There was not much leisure time available

here but what there was our boys turned into valuable and enjoyable use. The department in the last ten years grew from 23 to 460 acres. In this area we have an 18 hole golf course, tennis courts, putting greens, hiking and cross country trails, horseshoe courts, 20 football fields, baseball diamonds, running track, bridle trails and picnic areas. It has been a big expansion but not too much. Small wonder that so many of our students qualified for military service and did so well in their service.

During the war there have of necessity been many dislocations in this program. We have placed the emphasis where army and navy experience and requirements dictated it to the best interests toward winning the war. With the various service units here the scope has been accentuated and increased.

With the return of peace Iowa State intends to reinstate her former program, changed only by what we learned in this war and increased to the limit of our ability. We need more indoor facilities and hope to provide them. We need a new pool. We would like an indoor skating rink for sport and hockey. We expect to have stables for the general expansion of equitation. We hope to provide an activity suitable to each student and this means a varied program. We plan as much as possible that these activities are such that they can go with the student upon graduation as part of their permanent good habits. We hope they will be disciples of the program wherever they live for we feel very much a happy community is a good community and many of these make for a fine United States of America.

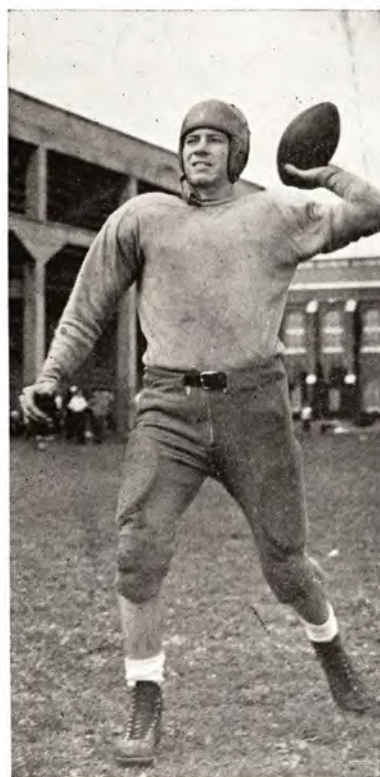

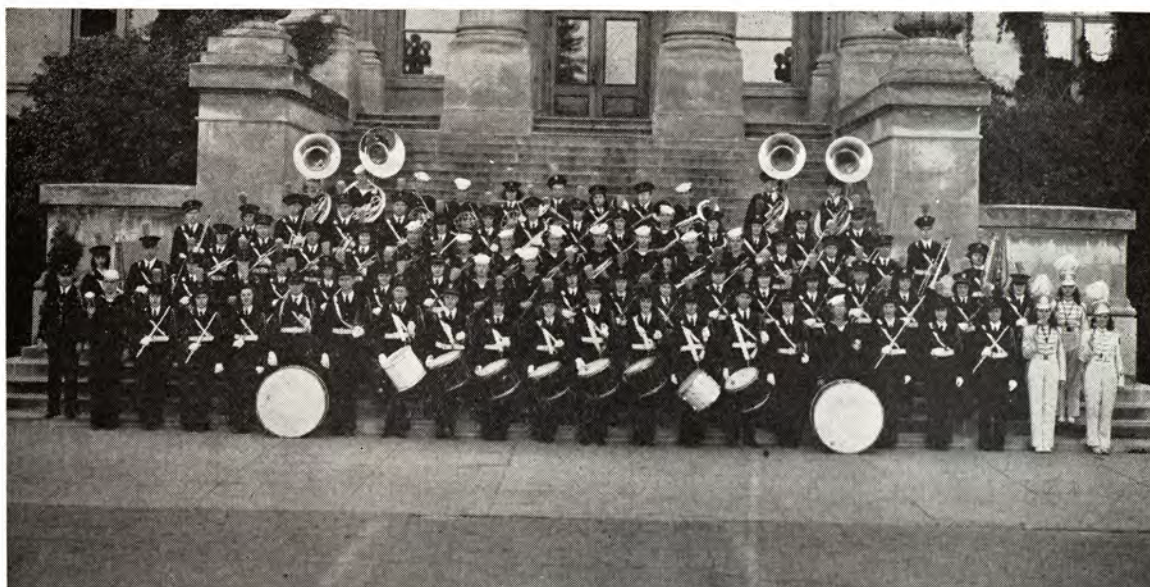

Let's give a cheer for the band! They turn out in rain or shine to entertain us at the games. They do more than any other single organization to lend color, life and enthusiasm at sports events.

Members of the Iowa State College 120-piece marching band come from all sections of Iowa and 11 other states. They play because they like music. They spend long hours at practice, so they can give us the best at game time.

This year's marching band is comprised of two units—one V-12 and one civilian.

The Iowa State band is unique in that it performs the half-time show with only three rehearsals. Usually, it takes more rehearsals for a band to prepare such a performance. The intricate maneuvers put on by the Iowa State band are a tribute to the efficiency and discipline with which the members carry out their assignments.

Homecoming Show

Today, the Iowa State marching band has a fine show arranged for our enjoyment. The band will form in a company front formation with half at each side of the field. After the fanfare, they march upon the field and form the word OKLAHOMA, in honor of the visiting team. The theme song from the show of the same name will be used as the theme of this formation. The band will then strike up

with "The Surrey with the Fringe on Top," during which the Homecoming Queen will ride in a surrey. At the conclusion of this act, the college girls' pep organization—The Twisters—will come whirling through the formation, breaking up OKLAHOMA, after which the band forms a CYCLONE, playing the Iowa State fight song.

The second act will be the formation of the word WELCOME and going into ALUMNI. During the formation of these words, the band will play one of Iowa State's favorite songs, "Bells of Iowa State."

At the conclusion of the tribute to visiting alumni, the band will pay homage to students and alumni of Iowa State College who are serving in the armed services of our country. Band members will form a five-point star and play a concert arrangement of "My Hero," by Oscar Strauss.

Band Direction

Associate Professor Alvin R. Edgar deserves much credit for his arrangement of our between-halves shows at games. His untiring effort and knowledge of music and show presentation made them possible.

The head drum major is William Reinhardt, of St. Louis, Mo., a member of the Navy V-12 class at Iowa State College. The trio of drum majorettes are Shirley Tolefson, Woodbine, Iowa, Maxine Mallory, Hampton, Iowa, and D. Ann Martin, Osage, Iowa.

The Iowa State cross-country team, coached by George Bretnall, has its fifth meet today against the University of Oklahoma harriers over the Cyclone course. Prior to the Homecoming dual, the Iowa State runners have participated in four meets, winning three.

Cross-country dual scoring is a bit different from other track meets. The first five men of each participating team count. The first runner scores one point, the second two points, and so on. The team having the lowest score is winner.

Since Bretnall came to Iowa State College

in the fall of 1937, from Baker University, Baldwin, Kan., the Cyclones have developed winners in cross-country, indoor and outdoor meets. Bretnall graduated from Cornell College, Mt. Vernon, Iowa, in 1921. He was a member of the 1920 United States Olympic squad running on the 1600 metre relay team.

The first 1944 cross-country dual was held against Cornell College, with the Cyclones winning 15 to 40. The second meet saw the Iowa State team defeat Peru State Teachers of Nebraska 18 to 37. The third meet was held October 14, with Drake University emerging victor over the Cyclones by the score of 22 to 33. A return meet against Cornell College was held on the course at Mt. Vernon, with the Cyclones again taking the Purple into camp by 19 to 36.

Sixty-nine men have been working out during this season, ten of whom have won places on the team. They are: Bill Arlen, Naperville, Ill.; George Davis, Lincoln, Nebr.; Vic De Kalb, Fairfield; Calvin Hobson, Hardy, Nebr.; Ralph Regan, Ridgeway, Mo.; Jack Reed, Washington, D.C.; Morris Rowland, Maryville, Kan.; Henry Schwenk, St. Louis; Robt. L. Stewart, Lincoln, Nebr.; and Roy Wehde, Holstein. Schwenk, a consistent second and third place winner, has been transferred to midshipman's school, along with Wehde.

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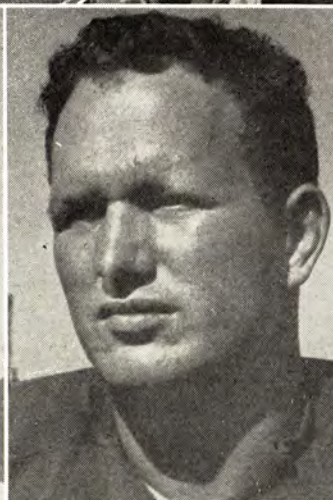
