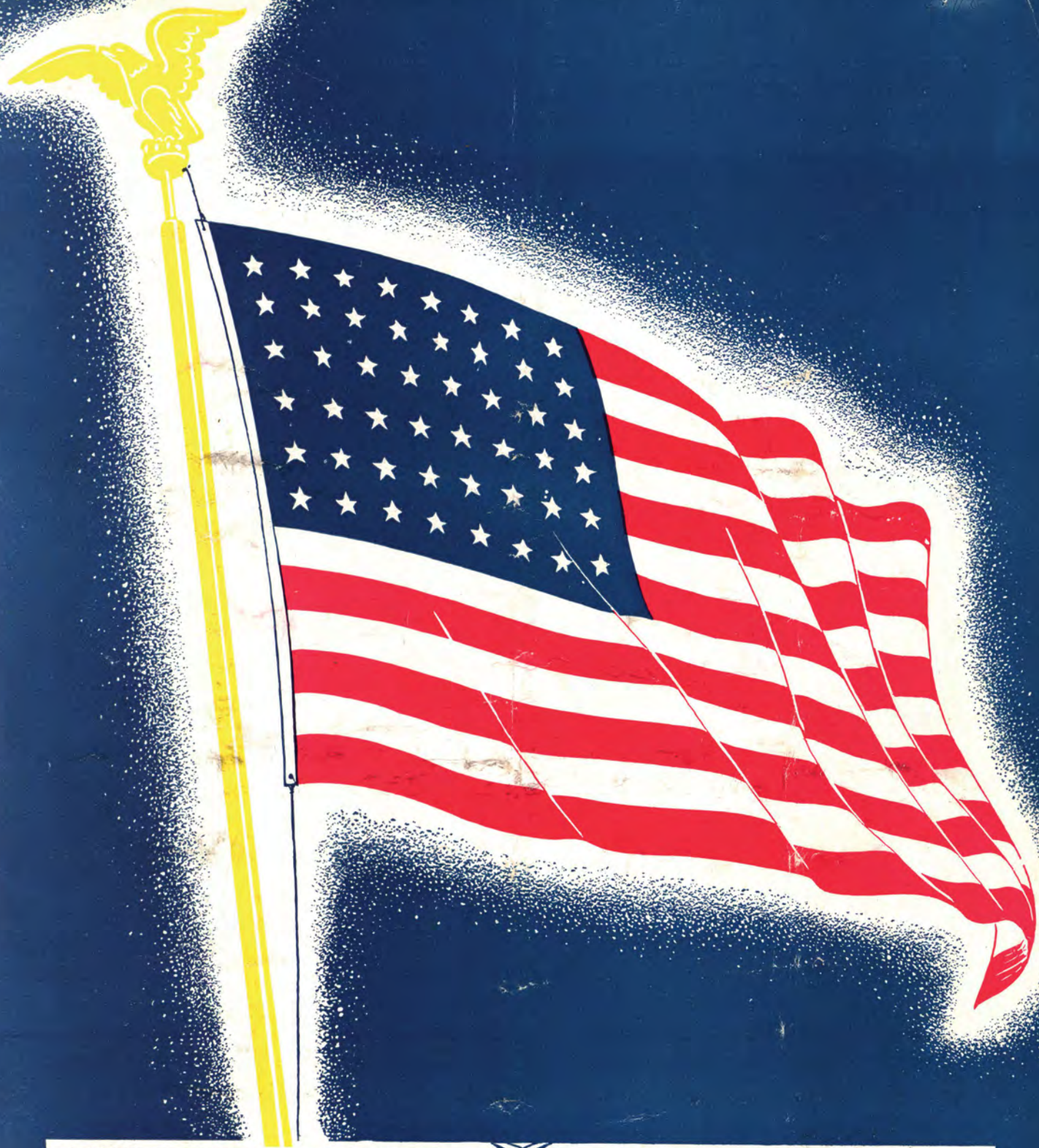




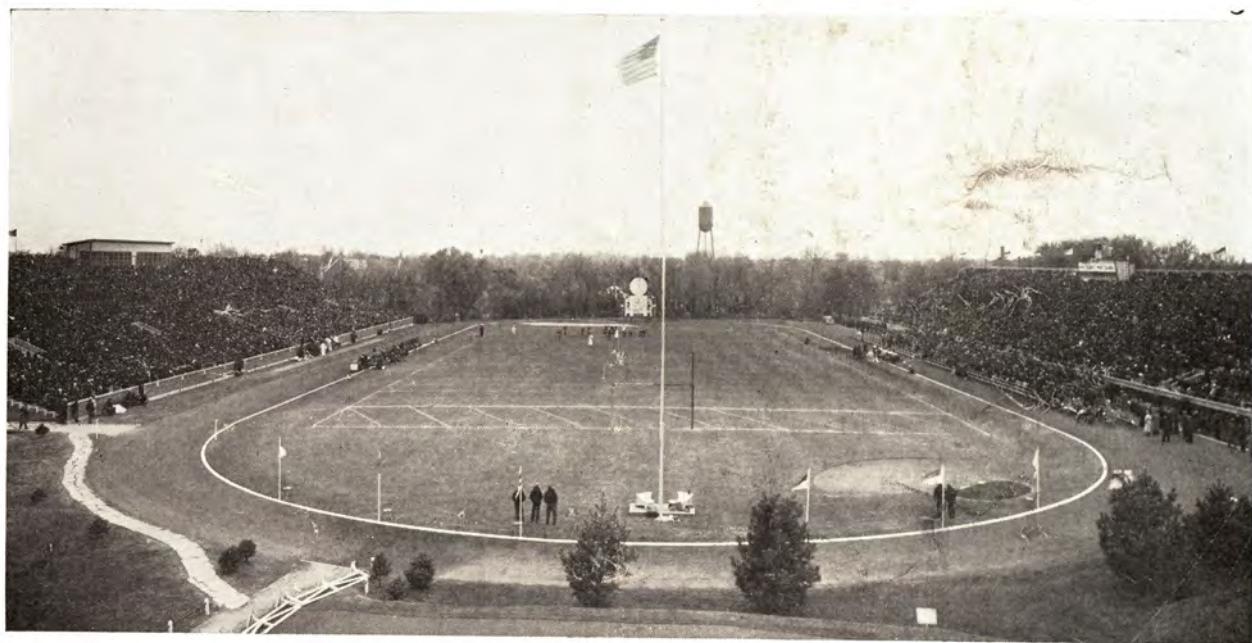

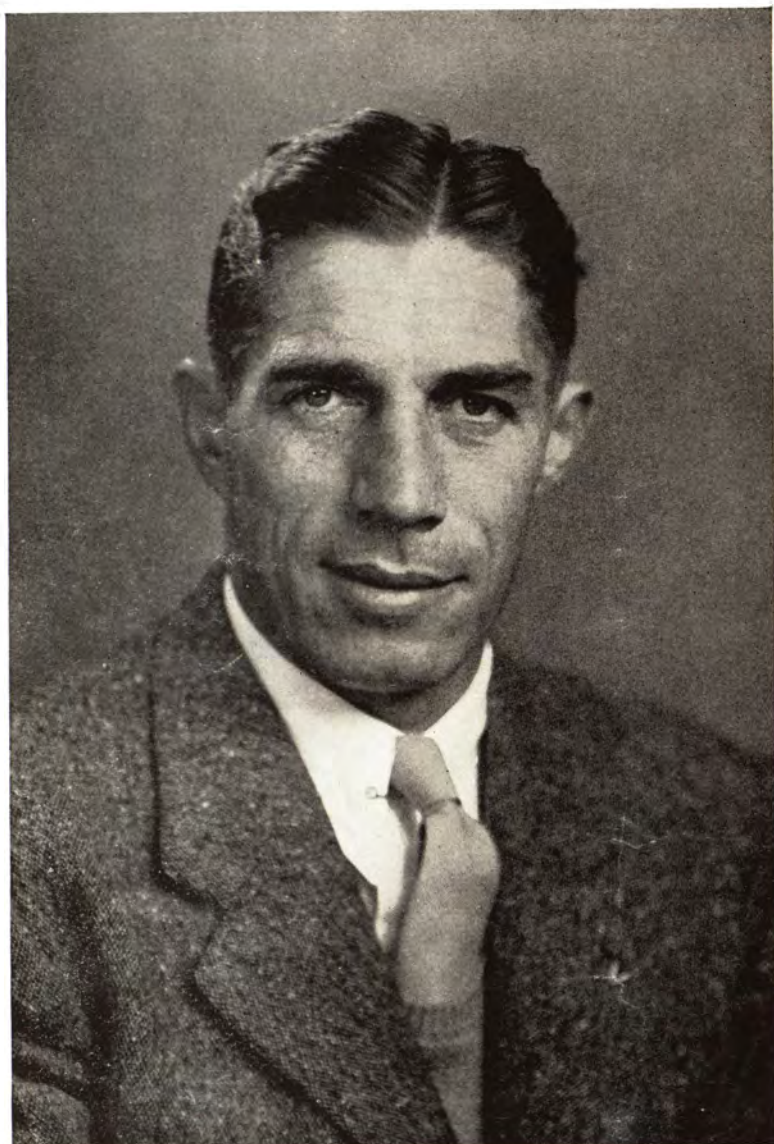

WHEN the word went out to the colleges of the nation—"Toughen your men!," Iowa State College had to make few changes in its physical education program to answer the call.

Two major changes were necessary in expanding to handle more than twice as many men in the new program. The first was to make physical education compulsory for every man in school. The next was the installation of the rugged obstacle course on North Field.

Today, five hours a day, five days a week, members of the staff send classes through calisthenics, race them over the obstacle course, or lead them on cross country runs.

AFTER that formal class period, the same leaders handle an extra hour of obstacle course and cross country running each day. Every Saturday at 1:15 some 500 men turn out for a cross country run.

All this compulsory program is in addition to the greatly expanded intramural program which involves the activity of 80 per cent of the men in school. A recent survey showed that nearly 16,000 man hours are spent in athletic activity on the campus every week.

Iowa State Toughens 4,000 Students

Director George Veenker and his staff have planned the work to produce physically fit soldier material in the shortest possible time. Even before the hardening program went into effect, Iowa State held an enviable reputation at recruiting offices for its graduates and students passed uniformly higher physical tests—higher than other schools of the nation. Today that reputation is better than ever.

CREDIT for the excellent performance of the hardening program is not taken by the staff alone. Without the wholehearted support of both faculty and student body the program would have failed. With that badly needed cooperation, the Iowa State hardening program rates with the best in the nation. Indeed, its reputation from the first was so great that The Athletic Journal, national coaching and physical education magazine, asked college authorities to write an article describing the course.

Director Veenker points out two excellent reasons for the program. In the first place, he says, it will produce better physical specimens for the army. And just as important, it will give those same men, better trained than the enemy, a better chance of returning to us. After all, the purpose of fighting is to have peace—and we'll have a better type of world with these boys back with us.

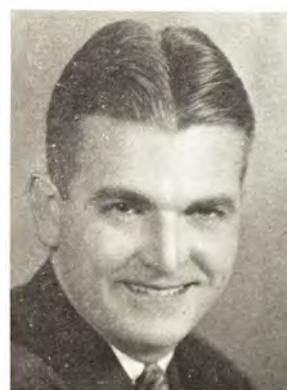

WE, AS coaches at Iowa State, made up our minds long ago that we would have to suffer a lot through the loss of some of our boys.

We try to teach these boys while they are here in Ames to make sacrifices and bear bad news. We, the teachers, are now flinching—flinching when we know the boys in battle are not flinching.

We say, “but who could have said that it was going to be Don?” when we know it would be the same way with any of the others. Our boys get precious to us. We value them highly. And we should.

NOW, Don Griswold played that right half-back down there for three years, sure, dependable. He blocked and blocked, steady and determined, seldom carrying the ball.

His real character came out on defense. There he showed what he would do as a flyer. What went over him was not important—what was before him was his objective. Interference made no difference—the man with the ball was the goal. That presaged His Battle of the Pacific.

SO, WHEN Don Griswold played his last Great Game no one could have doubted his method of attack. As he played football,

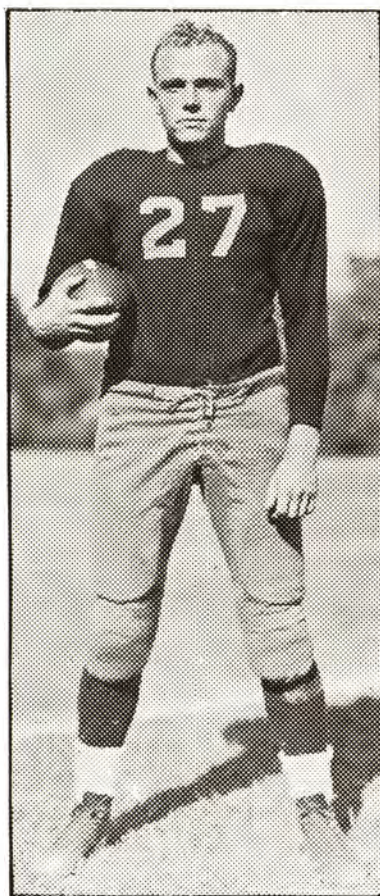
with recklessness on defense and savageness in clearing the way for his own runner, so Don Griswold played at war—giving everything he had.

Killed in action in the Pacific, Don unloaded his last bomb for a direct hit to put a Jap ship out of action. Oblivious of everything but his order to “get that ship,” Don was “clipped” on the play but he got his “man.”

FOOTBALL and his own flaming spirit did that for Don Griswold, one of Iowa State’s finest blocking backs, one of Iowa State’s finest. It was his team—Iowa State or the United States—and nothing was too big for him when it helped his team.

Whatever need be said about our American athletes, our American heroes, Don Griswold said in his last flaming charge at the enemy line.

May we all have the courage to so live, as well as to bear his loss.

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SIGNALS & PENALTIES



Holding. (Penalty—by offense, 15 yards; by defense, 5 yards.)



Time out.



Offside or violation of kick-off formation. (Penalty, 5 yards.)



Penalty refused. Incomplete pass, missed field goal or conversion, both sides offside, etc.



Delay of game or extra time-outs. (Penalty, 5 yards.)



Illegal forward pass.

Crawling or pushing, 5 yds.; helping ball carrier, 15 yards.



Safety.



Player illegally in motion. (Penalty, 5 yards. If from shift or huddle, 15 yards.)



Score — touchdown, field goal, or conversion.



Unnecessary roughness, illegal defensive use of the hands, clipping, running into or roughing the kicker. (Penalty, 15 yards.)



Intentional grounding of forward pass. (Penalty — loss of down and 15 yard penalty from spot of preceding down.)

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Illegal formation or position of one or more players. (Penalty—5 yards from where ball was put in play.)



Illegal touching of kicked ball inside opponent's 10-yard line—touchback.



Unsportsmanlike conduct. (Penalty—15 yards.) For flagrant unsportsmanlike conduct—15 yard penalty and disqualification.



Interference with forward pass, pass touching ineligible player, or "screening" pass receiver. (If penalty on offense, when interference occurs beyond line of scrimmage, 15 yards and loss of down; on or behind line of scrimmage, loss of down only. Interference by defense, ball to offense on spot of foul as first down.)
