These Men Direct the Cyclones' Destinies



GEORGE F. VEENKER

Football fans, we want you to meet the four fellows who have shaped forty-five aspiring grid candidates into a smart, well-trained Cyclone eleven.

Back in 1931 a silent sort of a fellow came to Iowa State and took up the football reins of a harmless Cyclone. Despite his reticence, alumni the country over became pleasantly conscious that things were different back at Iowa State. By the end of the season when his 1931 Cyclone eleven had won five out of eight of its games and had won the runner-up position in the Big Six, Coach George F. Veenker was dubbed "the miracle man" by sports writers. A year later the same man was appointed director of athletics.

The 1935 issue of the "Illustrated Football Annual" says:

"Coach Veenker has set out to demonstrate that big-time football can be carried on successfully by young men whose chief purpose on the campus is not related to athletics ... No pipe courses are offered in the academic halls. Football boys must swat the books as vigorously as their non-athletic fellows, and about the only books available for swatting deal with scientific subjects. Professor Veenker points with pride to his all-conference team members who received similar recognition in the labs and lecture halls.

"Professor Veenker, the builder," it goes on to say, "will arrange attractive intramural exercises for those not doing varsity work. That's a part of his program of restoration which began producing lovely pyrotechnical results a few years ago."

Iowa State's latest addition to its coaching staff, James J. Yeager, line mentor, has already won the highest esteem and respect of Cyclone players and fans. A graduate of Kansas State College, where he played guard on the Wildcat football team for three years, "Jim," a mild mannered fellow, has built a wide reputation as a line coach. For the past five

years Yeager has been at Fort Hays (Kansas) College, where he served the past year as head football coach. His team last fall won eight of its ten games, one victory being a 3 to 0 triumph over Kansas State.

Joe Truskowski, a three-sport athlete at the University of Michigan, appeared at Iowa State in 1932 and went to work as Veenker's right-hand man. Joe, tutor of the Cyclone ends this fall, is noted in conference circles for the co-champion baseball nines he has produced at Iowa State the last two seasons. Truck was a catcher on the Michigan baseball team, a guard in basketball and a center and captain of the football eleven, winning a total of eight major letters. Two years of coaching at Olivet College in Michigan preceded Truck's debut at Iowa State.

In 1934 another young man came to Iowa State and took over the all-important duties of athletic trainer. Le Roy Timm, "Cap" to you, was quarterback for three years at the University of Minnesota and in addition caught on the Gopher baseball nine for two seasons. Cap served as assistant baseball coach at Minnesota the year after his graduation and later took his master's degree in Physical Education at New York University. Injuries in the Cyclone camp have hit a new low in the past two years and all Iowa State teams enter competition in the best condition possible. Cap has helped Veenker tutor the backfield this fall, also.

Much of the success in building a winning grid team is the development of potential varsity greats in their freshman year. This task is capably handled here at Iowa State by a three-man staff. Louis Menze, head basketball mentor, heads the prep staff and takes personal charge of the backfield men. Genial Hugo Otopalik, wrestling and golf coach, supervises the ends and the tackles, while Harry Schmidt, Cyclone intramural director, handles the guards and the centers.

Cyclones Hope for Come-back against K. U.

Jayhawk's Green Team Outweigh Cyclones Today

Kansas versus Iowa State.

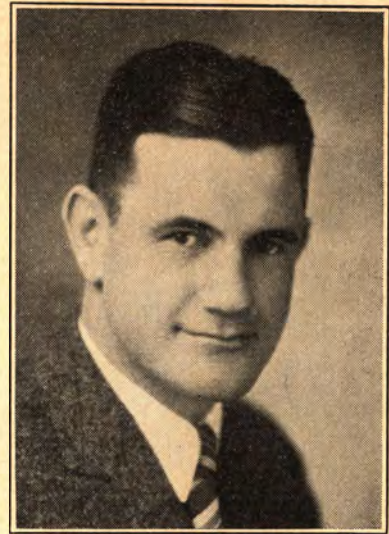
A battle between two evenly matched Big Six conference football elevens. The Jayhawks—a green but rugged team banking quite largely on a host of husky sophomores. The Cyclones—a lighter but more experienced team with quite interesting potentialities.

Last Saturday Coach Veenker sent his Cyclones into the Big Six race against a great Nebraska football machine—one that Bernie Bierman, Minnesota's wily football mentor, proclaimed as the best Cornhusker team he had seen. It was simply the case of the heavier, stronger team triumphing. The two favorite sons of the Nebraska plains, "Wild Hoss" Caldwell and "Slinging Sam" Francis, behind beautiful blocking down the field, ran rampant and proved to be just too much for a crippled Iowa State defense.

Meanwhile down on Mount Oread on the University of Kansas campus, the Jayhawks were subduing a scrappy Washburn College eleven. Coach Ad Lindsey tried out twenty-eight of his men in the fray which the larger Big Six school won 19 to 6.

But today is another Saturday on the grid schedule. The Cyclones have the toughest game on their schedule behind them. Many of the minor injuries that have hampered them so far have been overcome. They are ready now to swing into the remainder of their battles conceding no odds to any opponent. The Jayhawks are stepping into their Big Six campaign and are anxious to get started off on the right track with a victory.

When we speak of a green and inexperienced Kansas squad, don't picture the Jayhawks as a bunch of beginners playing their first football. Coach Lindsey has thirteen lettermen in camp, with six of them in the starting line-up this afternoon. Too, their sophomores are big, smart gridders not

wholly uninitiated into football. Kansas is headed for better days in football and they may launch this upward climb this fall.

Little George Hapgood, senior ball-toter and passer who has won all-conference honors for the past two seasons, is a real threat in the Jayhawk backfield. Emil Wienecke, Joe Giannangelo and Clarence Douglass, another trio of backfield men, have also won letters. In the forward wall, Wade Green and John Seigle, ends; Lewis Ward and Jack Vogel, tackles; Clarence Winslow and Howard Morland, guards; and Dave Lutton, center, all lettermen, are bulwarks.

A trio of sophomore backs, Francis Paronto, Paul Masoner and Dave Shirk, have already showed enough ability to displace lettermen behind the Jayhawk line.

At the helm of the Kansas machine is Adrian H. "Ad" Lindsey. He has been head football mentor at the Jayhawk school since 1932, going there from the University of Oklahoma. Lindsey is a graduate of the Kingfish, Oklahoma, High School, and received his degree from the University of Kansas in 1919. He was a football letterman for three years and captain in his senior year. He was also a star player in baseball and basketball.

Following the war Lindsey became assistant coach at K. U. In 1922 he went to Bethany College as all-sports coach. From 1927 to 1932 he was head coach at Oklahoma before transferring to Kansas.

Assisting Lindsey are Mike Getto, line coach, Bill Hargiss, freshman coach and scout, and Ed Phelps and Tommy McCall, two of last year's Jayhawk stars. Elwyn Dees, former conference shot-put champion, acts as trainer.

Although the Cyclones' line-up is mostly a veteran one, at least three sophomores will play an important role for the Cardinal and Gold this afternoon. Gordon "Bronc" Reupke, 195-pound catapult, has played fine ball at full-back in the opening two contests. Versatile Ed Bock, 200-pounder, is named by Coach Veenker as one of the best line prospects he has ever coached. Successively a tackle, half-back and guard, Bock has the speed and power necessary to head the interference. Everett Kischer, mighty mite, is the third of the Cyclone sophomore trio. Weighing but 155 pounds, Kish can do everything but punt, but passing is his long suit.

Stand-out Cyclone veterans are Captain Clarence Gustine, a thoroughly dependable end; Harold Schaforth and Jim Dishinger, rugged tackles; Russ Coundiff and Al Bauman, guards; John Anderson, center; Tommy Neal and Elwin Snell, backfield men. Don't overlook their playing this afternoon.

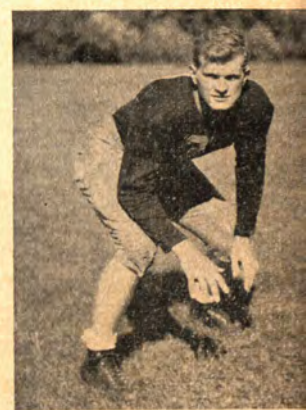

May We Present . . .

CAPTAIN CLARENCE GUSTINE, end on the Cyclone eleven, is now in his third and greatest season as an Iowa State gridder. Gus, also a major letter winner in baseball for two years, is one of these steady and dependable players that gladdens any coach's heart.

HAROLD SCHAFROTH, two-letterman on the Cyclone squad, is holding down a tackle position for the third season. A veritable bear on defense, Shaf has won all-Big Six honors for two years.

RUSSELL COUNDIFF, the shortest man on the Cyclone squad, is playing his third year at guard. Full of fight and pep and possessed with plenty of speed, Russ is a star in the forward wall.

JOHN ANDERSON, junior letterman, has been getting the first call for the center position this fall. Andy weighs 190 pounds, hails from Ankeny, and seldom makes a bad pass.

JAMES DISHINGER, letterman at center last season, was shifted to tackle this fall and is doing great there. A rangy six feet, three-inch red-head, Dish is a vicious tackler and a neat blocker.

AL BAUMAN, first team tackle on the 1931 Cyclone eleven, has returned to school to clinch a place for himself on the 1936 team. Al weighs 190 pounds and is even in better shape than he was five years ago.

ELWIN SNELL, speedy and snaky ball-carrier, is playing his second season in the Cyclone backfield. Snell, major letter-winner in baseball, is also a fine pass receiver.

TOM NEAL, Snell's running-mate, was an all-conference selection in his sophomore year two seasons ago. Tommy, a 160-pound senior, is a real triple-threat man as he is a clever ball-carrier and a capable punter and passer.

FRED POOLE ranks as one of the best kickers in the United States. Freddy, "the kicking fool," won nation-wide recognition in his sophomore year, two seasons ago for his kicking against Iowa. Poole is also a major letter-winner in track and basketball.

AL WAITE might well claim the title of the Midwest's champion light-weight full-back and shot putter. Only five feet, seven inches tall and weighing less than 175 pounds, Al hits the line as hard as a 200-pounder and holds the school record of nearly forty-four feet in the shot put.

DARREL JOHNSON, a minor letter-winner at full-back with the Cyclones last fall, will see a great deal of action at that position this fall. Johnson hails from Boone and weighs 190 pounds.

CHARLES HEILMAN, sophomore end from Fort Dodge, is giving Rushmore and Gustine a run for their money. Chuck has plenty of speed and is a sweet pass receiver.

BURDETTE HANNA, playing his third year with the Cyclone varsity, should see a good deal of action at the center position this fall. Bud is dependable and a hard worker.

GEORGE BAZIK, 165-pounds of dynamite from Gary, Indiana, is Snell's under-study at the quarterback job. A sophomore, George is a fine pass receiver, a good blocker, and a capable punter.

EVERETT KISCHER is a sophomore triple-threat man who shows plenty of promise. Although he weighs but 155 pounds, Kish is a clever ball carrier, a sensational passer, and an accurate place-kicker. His home is in Albert City.

WILLIAM DAILEY, senior guard on the Cyclone squad, is seeing considerable action this fall. Tipping the scales at 205 pounds, Bill, an Ames boy, is the heaviest regular on the squad.

GORDON REUPKE, hard-driving sophomore full-back, played in the line during his prep school days in Waterloo. Reupke (pronounced Rup'ke) hits the line hard, has plenty of speed and is a vicious tackler on defense.

CARROL WITMER is playing his first year of football this fall. Cap, a junior half-back, was the fastest sprinter on the Cyclone track squad last spring. His home is in Maxwell.

ED BOCK is the utility man on the Cyclone squad. At the opening of the season Ed, a 200-pound sophomore, was used at tackle but later was shifted to the blocking half-back position. He hails from Fort Dodge.

CLYDE SHUGART, an all-state high school tackle in his prep school days at Ames High, is another converted back-field man. Shugart weighs 200 pounds and is fast for a man of that weight.

ARLO MILLER, the lightest man in the Cyclone's forward wall, is one of the promising sophomore ends. Weighing but 160 pounds, Arlo, who comes from Ida Grove, will see plenty of action at one of the end posts.

ROWLAND RUSHMORE is another all-state high school star who is making good at Iowa State. Rolly, a junior letterman at end, is playing his second season as a regular.

CLARENCE DEE, Melbourne, was a first team guard on the University of Iowa eleven in 1934, and now

In the thirty-six years intervening since our first game we have met in hundreds of athletic contests in every sport. In some sports you have excelled, while in other lines our Cyclone teams have been superior; but all during this competition a fine spirit so typical of the Big Six conference has existed.

So, regardless of the outcome of today's game, we hope your stay here at Iowa State will be pleasant and that our friendly athletic rivalries will continue indefinitely.

CORNELL NEXT

Just one week from today Dick Barker, one of the Cyclone's immortal athletic heroes, will bring his Cornell College football eleven to State Field to meet Coach Veenker's Cyclones. A real game is in store for those of you who will be on hand. Last year, you remember, a smart, well-coached Cornell team held the Cyclones to a 6 to 6 tie here on State Field.

On October 24 the Iowa State eleven will journey southward to battle with the Missouri Tigers at Columbia, Missouri. Then on October 31 the Cyclones tangle with Major Biff Jones' colorful Oklahoma Sooners before a Homecoming crowd.

HERE'S TO THE BLOCKER!

"Kovacevich has the ball. He darts through a gaping hole off right tackle. There's only two men between the runner and the goal. He's loose! 25, 20, 15, 10, 5. It's a touchdown!" How often a similar graphic description or the actual sight of a long run to a touchdown have sent quivers of thrills up the spines of all of us.

Eulogies to the ball carrier who picked the hole in the line, neatly side-stepped a couple of would-be tacklers and out-ran another.

But let's not forget the other ten men on the team who were actually responsible for the success of this thrilling dash. Were you watching the blocking half-back—that "work-horse" so essential to the success of the ball carrier—and the quarter-back as they took out a couple of the opponents' secondary defense? Did you by any chance see one of the ends flatten the safety man with a jolting block, while his mate on the right flank boxed in the opposing tackle? Were your eyes trained on the guard as he came charging out of the line to team up with the full-back in shoving the defensive end out of the runners' path?

No? Well, we were watching the flight of the ball-carrier too, we'll confess, but this all happened. We know, because day after day every man is drilled thoroughly for his specific duty on each play. One small lapse on the part of any one player spells ruin for the success of the play. But when every maneuver is properly executed—you guessed the answer, it's one of those thrilling touch-down dashes.

Due credit to the efforts of the ball carrier but here's to the blockers and their contribution to this game of football.

Under the SPORT SPOTLIGHT

The world's first intercollegiate football game was between Princeton and Rutgers at New Brunswick, New Jersey, on November 6, 1869 . . . Jim Thorp, the immortal Indian who played for Carlisle, holds the all-time scoring record for one season—198 points in 1912 . . . Football's longest pass was made in the Kansas-St. Louis game of 1906. The pass, from Robinson to Schneider, went eighty-seven yards for a touchdown for St. Louis . . . Football players in 1876 wore "tights" . . . From 1906 to 1910 football fields were marked lengthwise in five-yard stripes as well as crosswise, giving the field the semblance of a checker-board rather than a gridiron . . . The longest punt of the 1934 season was a 102-yard boot made by Dick Crayne of Iowa in a game with Indiana . . . Paul Robeson, Negro opera singer and screen star, was All-American end in 1918.

CYCLONE CLIPPINGS

Iowa State teams won shares of Missouri Valley conference football titles in 1911, 1912, 1915 and 1929 . . . Cyclones were state grid champs in 1907, 1908, 1911, 1915, and 1934 . . . In games with other grid elevens in the state, Cyclone teams have won 127, lost forty, and tied ten for a percentage of .760.

Iowa State defeated the University of California at Los Angeles, 20 to 0, on November 27, 1926 . . . The first important game to be played on Iowa State's home grounds was the Cyclone-Nebraska contest of 1897. Iowa State won, 10 to 0.

The stadium on State Field was dedicated in 1924 with the Cyclones downing Kansas, 20 to 0 . . . The Cyclone's only loss in 1907 was to Minnesota, 8 to 0 . . . Minnesota also spoiled a perfect record for Iowa State gridgers in 1903. The Cyclones won eight games but lost to the unbeaten Gophers, who piled up 717 points against their opponents that season.

Johnny Behm, captain and quarter-back for Iowa State in 1925, made three safeties in the Drake-Cyclone game at Des Moines on November 21, 1925. The final score was Iowa State 7, Drake 6.

Don Stoufer, full-back and captain of the 1905 and 1906 Cyclone football elevens is the father of Bill Stoufer, 1936 Cyclone track captain. Stoufer's 1906 team, coached by A. W. Risting, won nine games and lost one, that to Minnesota.

The 1935 Cyclone eleven attempted 146 forward passes and completed forty per cent of them for gains of 525 yards . . . The Cyclones netted the most yardage of any Big Six team by passing in conference games last fall.

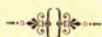
Two of Iowa State's scoring plays in their 21 to 12 victory over Kansas were made in sensational fashion . . . Elwin Snell made a twenty-five-yard run to score one touchdown, while a thirty-five-yard pass from Bill Allender to Gustine scored another.

An attendance record for Cyclone football was broken at Lincoln, Nebraska, last Saturday. Nearly 30,000 fans paid to see the contest between the Huskers and the Cyclones held at Memorial Stadium. This was the largest crowd ever to see an Iowa State team play. The previous record was also set at Memorial Stadium in Lincoln. About 25,000 paid to see the Huskers nose out the Cyclones 7 to 6 on October 27, 1934. Iowa State football players are always assured of a hearty welcome when they play Nebraska out at Lincoln.

Cyclones Scored Thrilling 21 to 12 Victory in 1935

On November 23 last fall a fighting and inspired Cyclone football eleven stunned the grid world by outfighting and outscoring a highly favored University of Kansas team. Iowa State went into the contest, held at Lawrence, Kansas, as the underdog, for the Jayhawks had downed Oklahoma and Kansas State and had lost only to the champion Nebraska Cornhuskers, while the Cyclones had not won a Big Six encounter.

But the net result was the most thrilling battle staged in the conference last fall. Kansas outgained the lighter Cyclones all the first three quarters but they could never penetrate Iowa State's valiant goal-line stands, and three times the Cyclones unleashed deadly offensive thrusts that scored a trio of touchdowns and gave them the victory, 21 to 12.

The Jayhawkers got the jump with a touchdown in the first quarter. The Cyclones got into hot water when a couple of punt exchanges gave Kansas the ball on Iowa State's 26-yard line. A pass from George Hapgood to Peterson put the ball on the 11-yard line, where Peterson took just three trips into the line to score. McCall kicked the goal to place the count, Kansas 7, Iowa State 0.

This was not the last time Kansas knocked at the Cyclone goal line, but it was the last time the Jayhawkers found the Cyclone line willing to yield.

Iowa State waited till late in the second quarter to match this Kansas lead. The chance came when Hapgood failed to field Allender's punt and the

ball was downed on the Kansas 4-yard mark. Harris' punt went only to the Jayhawk's twenty-four. Snell ripped off seven yards and then Allender forward passed to Grefe who was caught two yards from the goal. Snell drove through center for the score. Poole converted from placement to tie the count, Iowa State 7, Kansas 7.

The tide turned when Kansas failed to score in the middle of the third period and had to be content with a field goal. Kansas took a punt on its thirty-three and on two good passes by Hapgood and a run by Hayes got a first down on the Cyclone 4-yard line. Here the Cyclones tightened and the Jayhawkers were shoved back to the 17-yard stripe at which point Tommy McCall place-kicked a field goal to put the Jayhawkers out ahead, 10 to 7.

But Iowa State came right back after the kickoff to nullify this score. Snell

made a 25-yard return of a punt to Kansas' 35-yard line. Two plays later Allender started to the right, then turned and passed to Gustine far off to his left in the clear who romped over the goal unmolested. Again Poole converted. Score, Iowa State 14, Kansas 10.

The Cyclone lead didn't look very promising even then, for Kansas was on the 5-yard line as the third quarter ended. The Cyclones gained the ball on downs after another valiant goal line stand. Neal punted, and ten plays later Cyclones again took the ball on downs within the 5-yard stripe. Neal's punt was blocked and Kansas got the ball on the 8-yard line. Four plays got it to the 1-yard line, and when the Cyclones took the ball on downs, Snell downed the ball for a safety to keep his team ahead, 14 to 12.

A bit later Neal intercepted Hapgood's pass on the Kansas 32-yard line and then Iowa State went to town for the final score with Snell ripping off a 20-yard run for the points. Again the try for extra point was good, and soon afterwards the game ended, Iowa State 21, Kansas 12.

Altogether, sixty passes were attempted in the game. The Jayhawks completed fourteen of thirty-one, while the Cyclones made twelve of their twenty-nine tosses good.

According to the Sunday *Des Moines Register* of November 24, 1935: "Iowa State College students successfully crashed the New Ames Theater Saturday night as they celebrated the Cyclones' 21-12 win over Kansas at Lawrence."

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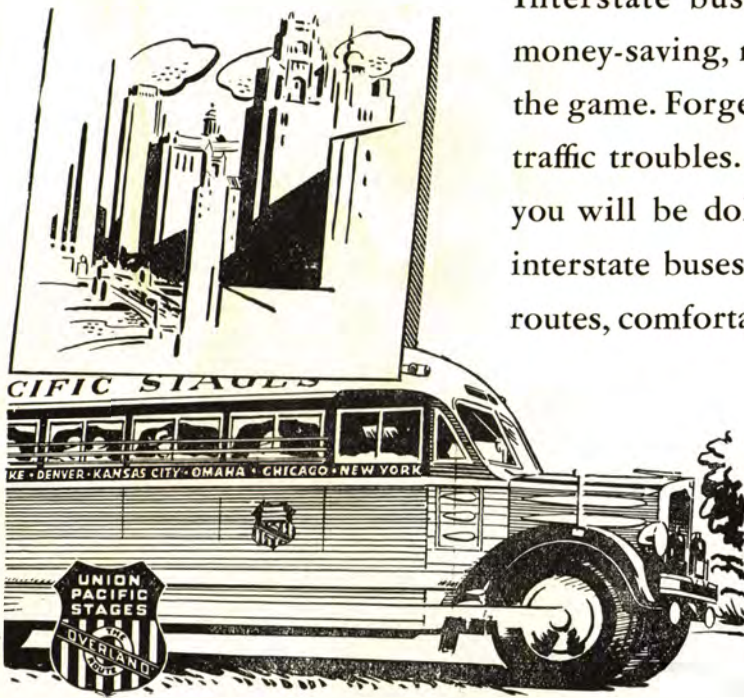
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
