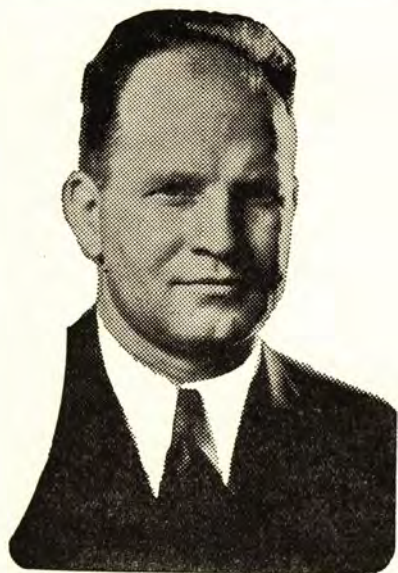
That the relations between these two institutions may continue and prosper is the sincere wish of everyone at Drake University.

These Fellows Know Football . . .



V. J. GREEN
HEAD COACH
DRAKE UNIVERSITY

THERE are several men older in the coaching profession than V. J. (Vee) Green but few have had the immediate success, following graduation from school, that Coach Green has attained.

Green was graduated from Urbana, Ill., high school in 1918 and immediately entered the University of Illinois, where he was graduated with a bachelor of science degree in 1924, with elective work in the coaching school. "Vee" received his football training under the venerable Bob Zuppke, playing on the Illinois varsity in 1920, 1922 and 1923, being the team's regular center the last two seasons.

He coached Waukegan, Ill., high school for four years, 1924 to 1927, inclusive, where his football teams won 24 games, lost seven and tied one, scoring 544 points to 198 for their opponents.

In 1928 he went to Oklahoma City University, succeeding Lynn O. Waldorf as director of athletics and football coach, when the latter went to Oklahoma A. & M. College as head football coach. In 1930 and 1931 the Goldbugs, as they are called, had their best team. In the former year they lost only to Tulsa University. The Goldbugs were undefeated the following season, winning from Central, Friends, Arkansas Poly, Missouri Mines, Phillips, Oklahoma Aggies, St. Louis, Oklahoma Baptists, Haskell, Nebraska

Wesleyan, Tulsa and Oklahoma University, the latter contest being a post-season game for charity.

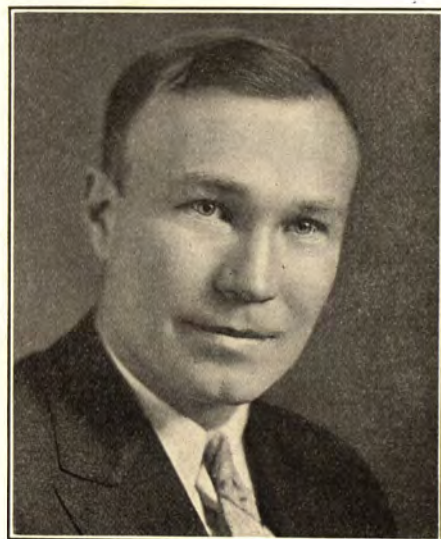
Considering the obstacles with which he was confronted in making over the entire coaching system at Drake last year, Green turned in a remarkable record. Drake's only defeats were suffered at the hands of Illinois, Temple and Oklahoma A. & M. They tied Iowa State, 7-7.

GEORGE F. VEENKER is in his fourth year as head football coach at Iowa State and in his second year as athletic director. To give merely a resumé of his colorful background as a football coach would take much more space than that allotted here. So a brief history must suffice.

"Veenk" was graduated from the Sioux Falls, S. Dak., High school, and in 1916 from Hope College, where incidentally, he was literally a one-man athletic plant. He first coached at the Grand Prairie Seminary, Onarga, Ill., and then at the Batavia, Ill., high school. After the war he went to the high schools at Gary and Hammond, Ind., where his teams won the state championship 6 out of 7 years.

Coach Veenker came to Iowa State from the University of Michigan—and at Iowa State he just seems to fit in. He practices the science he preaches, and his philosophy is ideal for this institution, where students are students first and play football, basketball, baseball, etc., for the fun of the game.

Let the sports editor of the Omaha World-Herald say it: "George Veenker deserves high praise. Superlatives are not misplaced in paying him his due for his accomplishment at Ames. He went there, from Michigan, to find a campus whose interest in football had all but died. . . . In a few seasons what wonders George Veenker has wrought!"

Here's "the Dope" ---so What!

ONE of the most interesting and ancient rivalries in the Midwest is resumed today on State Field when Drake and Iowa State clash. Today's game is the thirty-fourth between the Bulldogs and the Cyclones, in a series that had its origin way back in 1898. Since then, Iowa State has won 22 games; Drake, 9; and 2 games have ended in a draw.

The Cyclones will take the field today with a record of 2 defeats against 4 victories and one tie. Drake, less fortunate, has lost 5 games, won 2, and tied 1. Iowa State has conquered Luther, Grinnell, Missouri and Iowa, while losing to Nebraska and Oklahoma, and tying Kansas. Drake has beaten Grinnell and Haskell, and have lost to Utah, Oklahoma A. & M., Army, Washington and Denver. Simpson was fought to a 6-6 tie in the season's opener.

Despite their recent let-down, the 1934 Iowa State team still rates as the best football team that the Cyclones have turned out in the past two decades. Luther, Grinnell, Missouri and Iowa were downed easily. Nebraska was outplayed, but a missed point after touchdown cost Iowa State a 7-6 ball game at Lincoln. A heavy Kansas team, that outweighed Iowa State 18 pounds per man in the line, fought the Cyclones to a scoreless deadlock on a muddy field, and Oklahoma turned 2 blocked punts into touchdowns in the first quarter to conquer the Cyclones 12-0.

Drake, doped at the start of the season to have the best team in the Missouri Valley Conference, started out poorly, but has shown re-

markable improvement in later games. The Bulldogs flashed some real power when they swamped Grinnell in a sea of mud a few weeks ago. Later, Haskell was downed as a feature of the Drake homecoming, and last week, the Bulldogs visited the Rocky Mountain sector to play Denver. Although outplayed, Denver scored a safety and intercepted a pass to down

Drake 8-7. Incidentally, last year, Iowa State played Denver in an early game, and scored a surprising 18-13 victory over the western team; the two teams did not meet this season.

Drake will bring some of the classiest backs to Ames that the local fans have seen all year. My Ubl, former Minnesota star, is the ace of the Bulldog backfield. He is a triple-threat back, and his passing probably will be the most accurate that the Iowa State team has faced all year. Jack Potts, Chuck Swan, Captain Warren Gaer and Herb Scharlin are all flashy performers that the Cyclones will have to stop. The Drake line is manned by veterans such as Deskin, all-state college end, and Leonard Cole, a giant tackle who weighs nearly 215 pounds and is over 6 feet 6 inches tall.

Against this array of talent, Coach Veenker will send Bill Allender, Harold

Miller and Tommy Neal, a set of dangerous backs, whose brilliant running has created havoc with Cyclone opponents all fall. An air attack starring an Allender to Hood combination, and some great punting by both Allender and Poole are other features of the Iowa State offense.

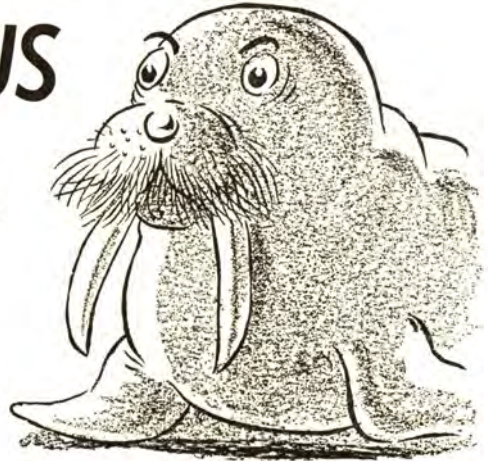

WILBUR KROEGER, No. 28

185-lb. junior end. Home, Eldridge, Iowa. Started the Grinnell and Missouri games. Is used mostly as a reserve end. He is a great blocker, and a good defensive man. He has lots of fire and is valuable to the team morale. In the spring he rates as one of the best of the Cyclone weight men.

RUSSELL GUTE, No. 27

175-lb. senior guard. Home, Glidden, Iowa. For 3 years Gute has been used as a reserve guard. The type of dependable griddier that gladdens any coach's heart. Works hard always, and the team isn't weakened a bit when he is inserted in the regular line-up.

HAROLD BIRNEY, No. 63

185-lb. sophomore fullback. Home, DeWitt, Iowa. Birney is one of the sophomore reasons why Iowa State is such an improved team this year. He is very fast despite his bulk, and is rapidly getting experience that will prove helpful to him. This fall he has improved his blocking and tackling.

FRANK HOOD, No. 34

206-lb. senior end. Home, Creston, Iowa. He is a good pass receiver, good defensive man, and his size makes him capable of handling big tackles. Has won two letters in basketball, and is captain of this year's team. He has started every football and basketball game since he became eligible for competition—a total of 50 games.

RUSSELL COUNDIFF, No. 59

185-lb. sophomore guard. Home, Gary, Ind. One of the many sophomore linemen that brightened the Cyclone outlook this fall. A sprained ankle kept him out of the earlier games, but for his creditable work in the Sooner game he deserves special praise. He is very fast despite his stocky build.

WILBUR WINTER, No. 57

167-lb. senior halfback. Home, Alden, Iowa. Was the regular Iowa State quarterback last year, but this year with a pick-up in weight, Coach Veenker has shifted him to a blocking

halfback position. He is one of the fastest men on the squad, and one of the four halfbacks that will be lost through graduation.

MARVIN OBERG, No. 38

196-lb. sophomore tackle. Home, Fremont, Neb. Oberg has shared the duties at the right tackle post with Catron all year. Oberg is really a veteran, for he played at Midland College in Nebraska before matriculating here. Sports writers gave him special commendation following the Sooner game last Saturday. This is his last home game.

FRED POOLE, No. 52

185-lb. sophomore end. Home, Ames, Iowa. Rated by Ossie Solem, the Iowa coach, as the greatest kicker he has ever seen. Averaged over 54 yards per kick against the Hawkeyes. Has added to the Cyclone scoring several times this year by booting long field goals. Bert McCrane, Register sports writer, has nominated him as year's "best punter."

HUNTER BROWN, No. 33

170-lb. sophomore center. Home, Red Oak, Iowa. Another transfer. He played at Tarkio College in Missouri before enrolling at Iowa State. Has held down the center job in every game, and through most of every game. Backs up the line on defense, and really does a good job of tackling. It will be difficult to find a replacement for Brown in 1935.

HAROLD SCHAFROTH, No. 36

198-lb. sophomore tackle. Home, Des Moines, Iowa. Has held down the left tackle position throughout the season. He is big and rugged, and likes the game when the going is the roughest. He is a swell defensive man, and gets down the field under punts almost as fast as the ends.

DONALD GREFE, No. 39

190-lb. junior end. Home, Ames, Iowa. Has understudied Hood most of the season, but he is a good end in his own right. Don is an excellent defensive man, and is a good pass defender. He is a brother of Dick Grefe, 1932 captain.

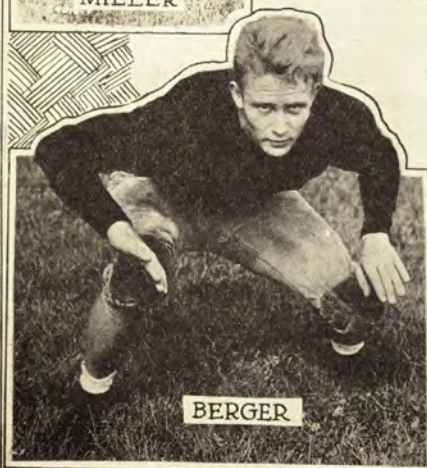

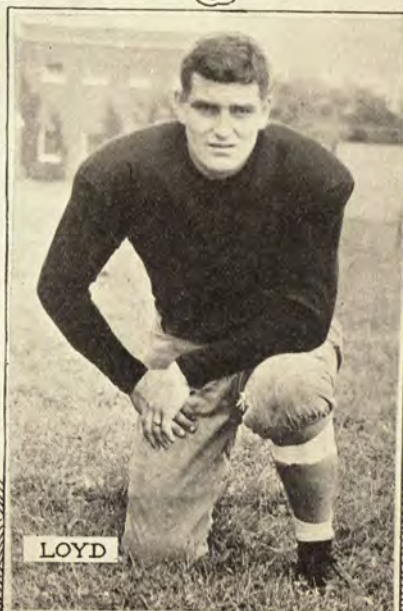

More "Soup" Eaters . . .

DONALD THEOPHILUS, No. 61 (Captain)

182-lb. senior halfback. Home, Smithland, Iowa. In high school, in Nebraska, "Theo" won all-state honors at a guard position. In college he is used offensively as a blocking halfback. He is one of the hardest tacklers that ever stepped on State Field, and is an able ball carrier as we shall see today. This is his last home game.

TOM NEAL, No. 25

158-lb. sophomore quarterback. Home, Sioux City, Iowa. Prepped at Central High in Sioux City, where he was an all-state football man and a state track champion. He is one of the country's leading ball carriers, and is a good blocker as well as a triple-threat back. Tommy is one of the Midwest's most "talked of" sophomores.

IKE HAYES, No. 56

158-lb. junior guard. Home, Newcomertown, Ohio. Was the regular quarterback on the freshman team, but shifted to a guard position when he reported for varsity. He is the typical "watch-charm" guard. He is fast and a swell blocker, a good defensive man despite his size, and a morale builder de luxe.

HAROLD MILLER, No. 23

150-lb. senior quarterback. Home, Harris, Iowa. This is Jake's second year on the squad. He went to the State Teachers College before entering Iowa State. Alternating with Neal at quarterback, and starting most of the games, Miller's ball carrying has been phenomenal. Many praises were bestowed upon him after the Nebraska game.

MARLOWE WILLIAMS, No. 71

170-pound senior halfback. Home, Des Moines, Iowa. "Willy" is playing his third year as a regular back. Due to his blocking role, he doesn't get much publicity, but it is through this same role that the other backs' long runs are made possible. His specialty is coming up fast to make sensational tackles. This is Williams' last home game.

WILLIAM ALLENDER, No. 21

180-lb. junior fullback. Home, Atlantic Iowa.

Allie was the leading Cyclone ground gainer of 1933. His ability won him a great deal of mention on all-conference selections. He is a triple-threat back. His kicks in the Sooner fray averaged more than 50 yards. Do you remember Allender's great ball toting against Drake last year?

DWIGHT GARNER, No. 24

188-lb. senior center. Home, Ida Grove, Iowa. One of the third-year men on the squad. Red spent his sophomore year alternating between guard and center, his junior year at guard, and this year he is back at center again. He has won a letter both years, and is headed for his third award this fall.

PAUL BERGER, No. 73

190-lb. senior guard. Home, Manchester, Mo. In high school, he was an all-St. Louis football man, and holder of the Missouri shotput championship. This year Berger is a guard, although he played regularly at tackle in '32 and '33. He was fast, a good blocker, and a great tackler. A knee injury may keep him out of what otherwise would be his last home game.

VERNON LOYD, No. 43

208-lb. senior tackle. Home, Ames, Iowa. Loyd is ending his football career this year, just as he started it—as a valuable tackle. Loyd, the biggest boy on the squad, has been a dependable tackle replacement for the past 3 years.

HOWARD HARLAN, No. 22

175-lb. senior halfback. Home, Stuart, Iowa. Another Cyclone man playing his last game at home. Harlan was a prep star in 1930, but an automobile accident made it impossible for him to compete in the fall of '31. He is one of the dependable backfield replacements.

JOHN CATRON, No. 31

200-lb. junior tackle. Home, Camp Crook, S. Dak. Has started a number of games this fall at the right tackle position. Catron is a greatly improved player over last year. His unorthodox type of play as a prep caused the varsity to have gray hair and to lose sleep. "Cat" has another year—and we are glad of it!

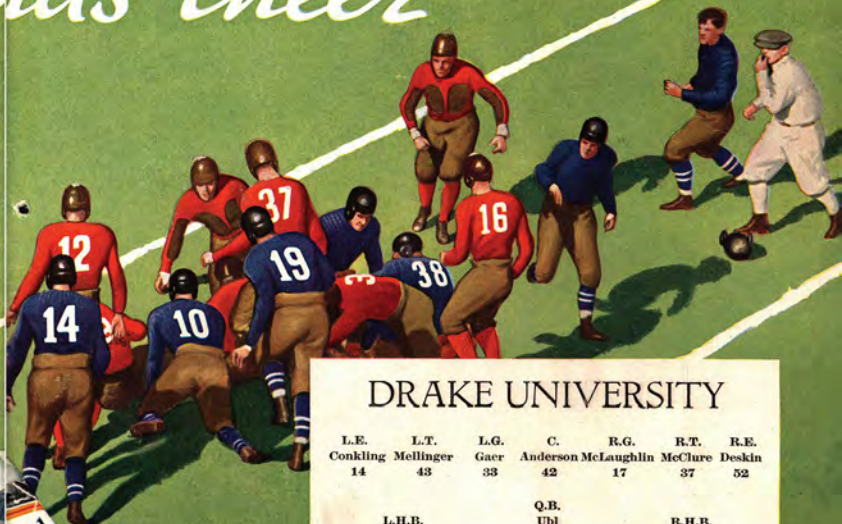

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Statement

Some time ago the Federal Congress passed an act providing for a tax on admissions to athletic events, the tax being ten per cent (10%).

Attorney General Edward L. O'Connor has ruled that this tax does not apply to athletic contests and exhibitions of Iowa State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts. However, a test suit has been instituted by the govern-

ment in West Virginia and pending the outcome of this suit, ten per cent (10%) will be held in trust. In case the Court rules in favor of the government, this ten per cent (10%) will be paid to the government. If the Court sustains Attorney General Edward L. O'Connor's position, then this ten per cent (10%) will be returned to the purchaser.

Their Last Huddle . . .

ELEVEN men—an entire football squad—are playing their last home game today. It is the last huddle on State Field for 9 Cyclone lettermen and 2 regulars from the 1934 squad. And they will be sorely missed when the 1935 season rolls around; yes, every one of them: an end, 2 tackles, 2 guards, 2 centers and 4 halfbacks.

Captain Don Theophilus and Marlowe Williams have performed regularly in the Cyclone backfield for the past 3 years. The line is going to be especially hard hit by graduation. Paul Berger, who may not see action today as a result of a knee injury in the Oklahoma game Saturday, has been a regular guard all year and played excellently as a

tackle in his sophomore and junior years. Frank Hood, who we will see more of on the basketball floor this winter, has been a capable end for the past 2 years. Both of these men are lettermen.

Two other members of the first string, Hunter Brown, center, and Marvin Oberg, tackle, although playing their first year on the varsity at Iowa State, will be finishing up their home season Saturday. They both participated 2 years at other schools before transferring to Iowa State. Oberg was praised by sports writers for his creditable showing in the Oklahoma game last Saturday, while Brown has been a godsend to the line all season.

Other valuable reserves who are in their last huddle on the home field today are Dwight Garner, center; Russell Gute, guard; Vernon Loyd, tackle. They have been very dependable replacements in the 1934 line.

CAPTAIN DONALD THEOPHILUS is a football player of whom any coach would be justly proud—and Coach Veenker has not been hesitant in praising this fine athlete. Don, or rather “Theo”—as the grid fans know him—is not only one of the hardest tacklers that ever trod State Field but he is also one of Iowa State’s best students, scholastically.

Don came to us from Randolph, Neb., where he won all-state honors as a guard on the high school eleven. Theoretically a fullback at Iowa State, he has been used offensively as a blocking halfback. This is his third year of competition, and his last game on State Field.

Like Tommy Neal, the flashy sophomore quarterback, Don came to Iowa State for an education. Of course he likes football, but he came here to learn to be a “Vet”; this was evidenced when he promptly refused any spe-

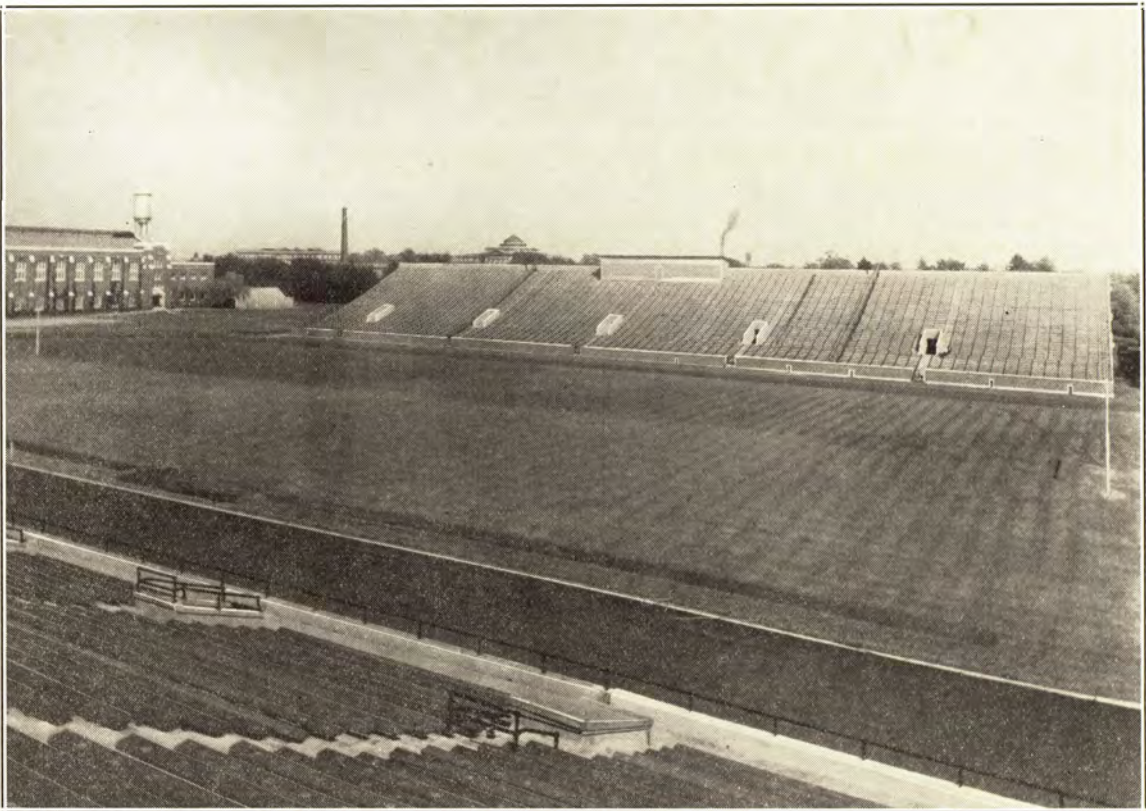

The prep gridsters are coached by Louis Menze, who is also head basketball coach, capably assisted by Joe Truskowski, head baseball coach.

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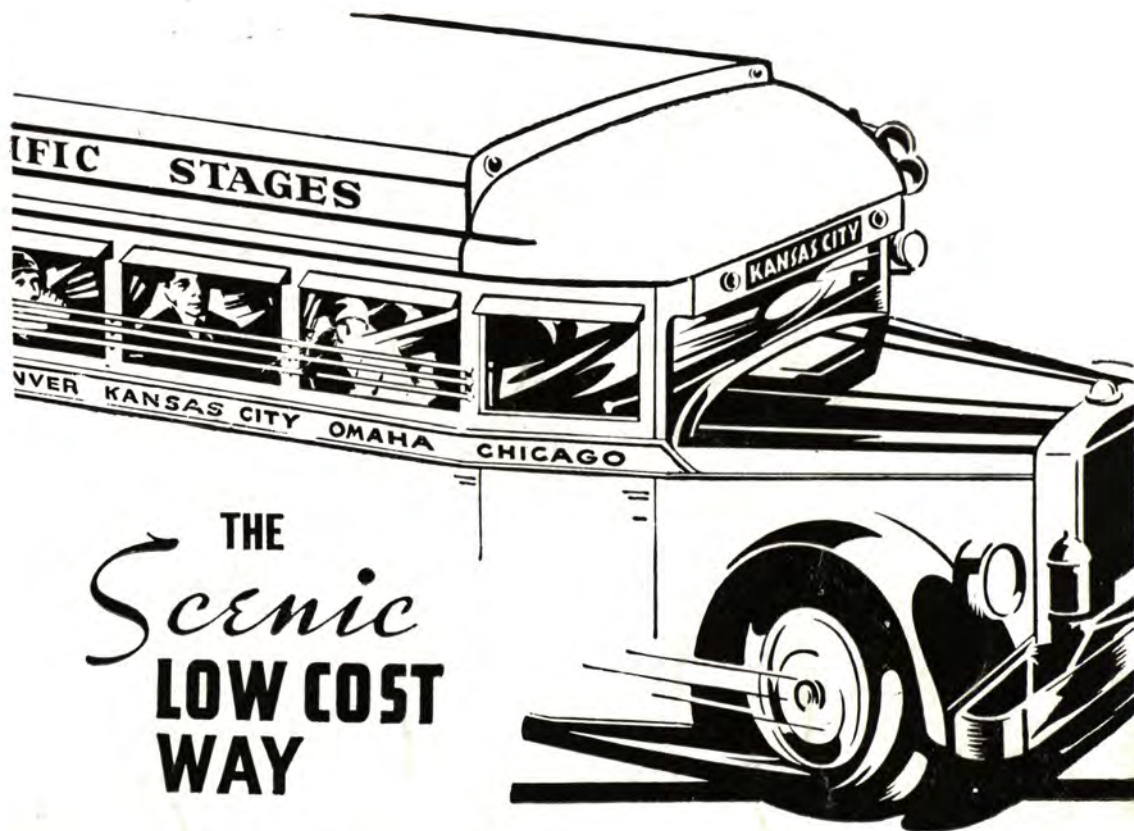
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
