Iowa State's Head Coach

This is the second season for A. M. (Mike) Michalske as head football coach at Iowa State College. Mike had a brief appearance as head coach last fall when he took over the reins of the Cyclone team in mid-season, starting with the Oklahoma game. Prior to that he served during the 1942 season as line coach.

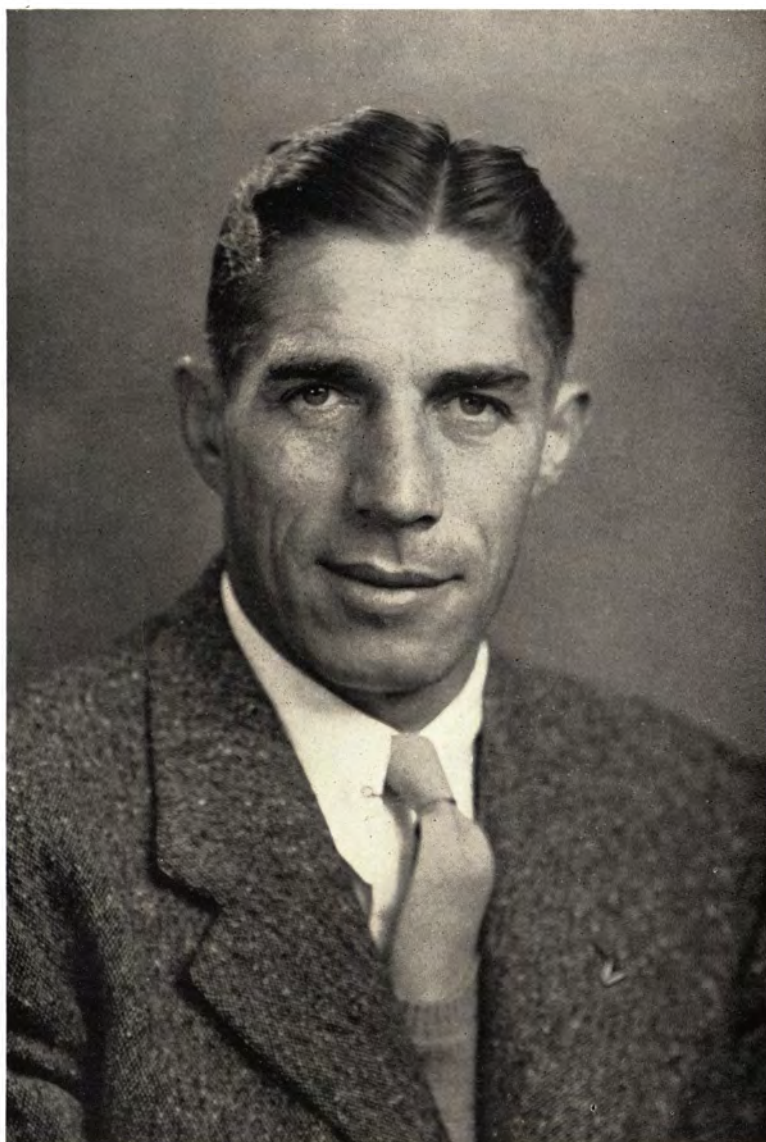
The man in the stands is going to like Mike. He knows his football, and he loves the game. That means that his boys had better love it, too.

Fighting football will be the order of the day as Mike sends the Cyclones against the Seahawks of the Iowa Naval Pre-Flight School. The game will be one of the best of many season openers at Iowa State, and that's regardless of the outcome.

Mike played three years as guard and full-back at Penn State College, graduating in 1926. After three years with the New York Yankee, professional football team, Michalske played for 10 years with the Green Bay Packers. He has coached at Ashland College, Central Wisconsin Teachers, Lafayette College, and St. Norbert's—handling football, basketball, and track during that time.

Benny Friedman, one-time Michigan and professional star rates Michalske as the greatest guard that he has ever seen.

As was mentioned earlier, today is the start of Mike's second season at Iowa State. He's not promising a victory—he's simply promising that he and his players and coaches will do all in their power to win.

About the Cyclones

There are several things that are unique about football in wartime at Iowa State. The Cyclone school now has twin war aims of specialized education and physical education. Educational work comes first. Every Cyclone on the field this afternoon gets no special consideration because he's a member of the football squad. He takes one hour of physical education daily, regardless of his status on the football team.

Iowa State College football players come from the ranks of civilian students and from the Naval Training School contingent on the campus, about 2,300 of the latter. To each one of these boys, football is part of a training interlude until he can actively take his place on the battle lines of the United Nations.

The Navy Pre-Flight School

The U.S. Navy Pre-Flight School at Iowa City is a unit of the Naval Air Primary Training Command which has headquarters at Kansas City, Kan. The school was commissioned in April, 1942, as the first of five Naval Pre-Flight activities.

The pre-flight phase of naval aviation training constitutes a three-month period of all-around development for the aviation cadet through military science and drill, basic academics, and physical conditioning, with considerable emphasis on the latter.

Athletics at Navy Pre-Flight Schools have a single fundamental purpose of conditioning embryo fliers to prepare them for the demands that will be made upon them, both in flight training and in combat. In establishing these schools, the Navy turned to a purely American institution—competitive sports—as the cornerstone for developing the fighting fliers that are in demand. In sports the Navy saw inherent all the elements of physical skills and agility, physical and mental stamina, and combative spirit that are the prime requisites of the combat pilot.

Thus football at the Navy Pre-Flight School is no luxury, or extra-curricular recreational activity. It is an essential part of the physical training program.

Seahawk football is marked by the preponderance of cadets on the squad. While the roster contains the names of officers—men who have had considerable football experience—only cadets will play in the game with Iowa State this afternoon. The same will be true in the games of the Seahawks with the State University of Iowa and the University of Missouri.

Seahawk football is marked by coaching strength. Athletic Director is Lt. Comdr. Harvey Harman, former head football coach at Rutgers University and at the University of Pennsylvania. Head football coach is Lt. Don Faurot, former football coach at the University of Missouri, and familiar to Cyclone football fans.

Seven other officers assist Lt. Faurot, Larry (Moon) Mullins, backfield coach, is a Rockne back who has coached at five leading colleges. Elmer Holm, a Big Six guard, was line coach at Nebraska. Jim Tatum was head coach for the Tar Heels; Lloyd Peterson heads instructional football at Iowa Pre-Flight; Tom Hearndon is a former Notre Dame and Green Bay Packer back; Doug Kerr was line coach at Iowa State; Bud Wilkinson was a Minnesota star and coach.
