Twenty-First Game

SINCE 1917 CYCLONES AND WILDCATS HAVE MET ANNUALLY

Today's football battle will be the twenty-first in the series between the Wildcats and Cyclones. For Iowa State's head mentor, Jim Yeager, it will be a battle royal against his alma mater. For the students it will mark the observance of Parent's Day. For the Cyclone players it will be the concluding game in a hard-fought campaign.

Iowa State has always been the proverbial thorn in the flesh of the Kansas State Wildcats so far as the Big Six Conference is concerned.

On several occasions the Cyclones have derailed the Wildcats in their bid for Big Six grid titles. Back in 1926 when the Kansas Staters had perhaps the strongest team in their history the Cyclones closed the Wildcat schedule on Thanksgiving Day by defeating the Cats 3 to 2, kicking a field goal and later donating a safety to hold the lead.

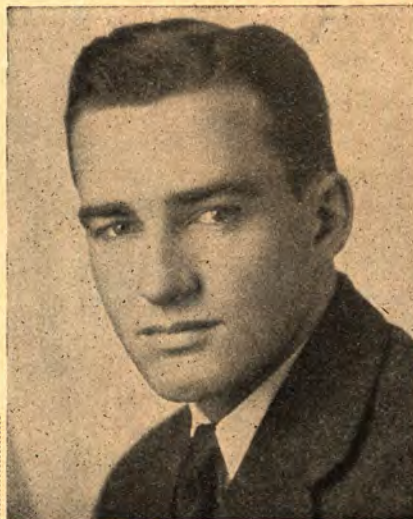
The two conference rivals did not start football relations until 1917, but have met every year since. Kansas State holds a 10 to 9 margin in the matter of victories with one game, the 1923 clash, ending in a 7-7 deadlock.

Even during the two years—1929 and 1930—when Iowa State was losing them all the Wildcats had narrow escapes, winning in 1929, 3-2, but boosting the victory margin to 13-0 in 1930..

Perhaps the most unusual game of the entire series was played in a steady rain in 1922 which made Ahearn Field at Manhattan, then unsodded, a lake of mud and water. Kansas State won 12 to 2 largely on an aerial barrage which

An Iowan and a Kansan have transferred allegiance. Wesley L. (Plow-boy) Fry, a graduate of the University of Iowa, is bringing his Kansas State College football eleven to State Field to battle the Iowa State College team coached by James J. (Smiling Jim) Yeager, a Kansas State graduate.

Fry played 3 years on the Hawkeye varsity and two seasons with Red Grange's New York Yankee pro team. His first coaching job was at Classen High School in Oklahoma City. He then worked a year at Oklahoma City University and transferred to Kansas State as Lynn Waldorf's assistant four years ago. This is Fry's third year as head coach.

Yeager played on the Wildcat teams in 1928, '29 and '30. He coached at Fort Hays, Kansas State Teachers College until 1936 when he moved to Iowa State as line coach.

found 9 of 17 attempts completed despite the downpour.

These battles only build up to the 1931 conflict, George Veenker's first year as Cyclone mentor. This year the Iowa Staters smothered any hopes the Wildcats might have had for a conference crown by administering a 7 to 6 defeat on State Field.

That November day the Wildcats ran the ball back and forth across the field to their heart's content—between the 20-yard lines. Whenever they pierced scoring territory the

Cyclone defense would stiffen and stop the charge. Kansas State's only score came when Eldon Auker, now a Detroit Tiger pitcher, ran 80 yards from a fake punt formation for a touchdown. The Cyclones scored on a spectacular pass from Dick Grefe to Kenny Wells with Grefe kicking the extra point.

Two years ago on State Field the Cyclones completed 22 of 33 attempted short passes but still lost 6 to 0 when the Wildcats completed a sleeper-pass to End Bill Hemphill. And speaking of past games, the Cyclones have a score to settle with these Kansas State footballers. It seems that the Wildcats handed the Iowa State boys a 47 to 7 setback down in Manhattan a year ago. The Cyclones are still irked about that drubbing and are determined to do something about it today.

But these past games are water under the bridge. The thought uppermost in the minds of football fans in this territory is what will

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Eight Cyclones—Dee, Rushmore, Waite, Anderson, Dailey, Bauman, Stoecker, Dishinger—Playing Their Last Games Today

In sophomores there is strength, but in seniors there is stability. That's been true at Iowa State this fall. Newcomers to the squad this season have filled a couple of first team berths and have bolstered considerably the Cyclone reserve strength. The veterans, however, have formed the foundation upon which the team has been built.

Eight Cyclones are playing their last football game for Iowa State today. Four of them are first team bulwarks. The other four are front line reserves. When another football season rolls around one complete line and a star backfield man will be missing. From left to right this forward wall is: Rowland Rushmore, Al Stoecker, Capt. Clarence Dee, John Anderson, Bill Dailey, Al Bauman and Jim Dishinger. The lone backfield graduate is stocky Al Waite, left halfback.

Don't for a minute think that the Cyclone backfield won't be weakened just because only one man graduates. You can't take this Al Waite that lightly. He's been an important cog in the backfield the last 3 years. He's the workhorse of the bunch, a coach's player, an iron man who has played through nearly every game this season without substitution, equally adept at carrying the ball or clearing the way for his mates. He's as durable as the steel that he works with during the summer months near his home in Gary, Ind.

Rushmore came to Iowa State with a football reputation. He won all-state high school honors at Jefferson. For 3 years now, Rolly has been a regular end-on the Cyclone teams. The high point of his career came at Milwaukee last weekend when he booted a perfect, 29-yard

place kick to give Iowa State its first victory over Marquette, 3 to 0. He'll be cavorting on the hardwoods this winter for he is a minor letter winner in basketball.

His teammates call Al Bauman "the grand old man" of the squad. He's practically as old as his coaches. Bo, whose home is in Plainview, Neb., entered Iowa State College in 1930, played regularly on the 1931 team, was out of school until the spring of 1936, was a regular tackle last season and has been alternating on the right side of the line this fall with Clyde Shugart.

Dishinger, the other end, started his varsity career as a center. In fact he was the first team snapper-back in his sophomore year. The pivot post was well fortified last year, so Coach Veenker shifted him out to end. He played a lot there last fall and has been alternating with Martin Boswell at the right wing this season.

Capt. Clarence Dee will have completed 10 years of football when he checks in his uniform after the Wildcat game. A regular guard at the University of Iowa in 1934, Dee transferred to Iowa State to take veterinary medicine in 1935. He's been a regular the past two seasons, hitting his peak this fall. Though he's lighter than most linemen he's a match for anyone. An inspiring leader, an honor student and a hard worker, Dee exemplifies the ideal college athlete.

John Anderson has been a regular center for 3 years but this season he has been a great pivot man. Iowa State will put him up against Brock of Nebraska, Betty of Missouri and Nordstrom of Kansas State. Andy has a fine football background, for he played his high school football at Ankeny High which hasn't lost a game for years and years.

Reserves are indispensable and here is where Al Stoecker and Bill Dailey have made their contribution to Iowa State football. They have been faithful for the last three seasons, seldom ever starters, but they get into nearly every game before the 60 minutes have elapsed.

Stoecker, a tackle, is the defending Big Six heavyweight wrestling champion. Dailey, who runs a farm just outside Ames, has won one major and one minor letter as a tackle and guard.

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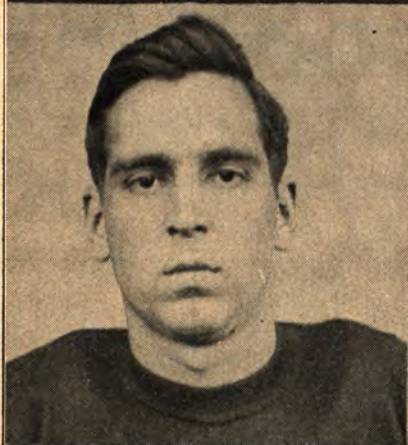

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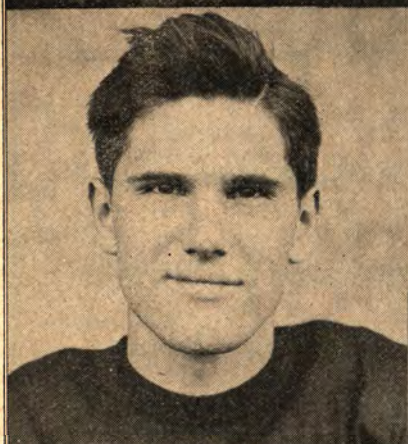

Twenty Years Ago a Scrappy, Little Cyclone Team Lost Only Two Games; Today These Players Are Back at Their Alma Mater

Twenty years ago a light but scrappy Cyclone football eleven met and conquered the Kansas State Wildcats, 10 to 7, on State Field. That 1917 game was the first in an uninterrupted grid series between Cyclones and Wildcats. Today the members of this 1917 Cyclone eleven which waded through a tough season with the loss of only two games are the guests of honor of the 1937 Iowa State squad.

Last night the Athletic Council feted these Cyclone gridders of 20 years ago at a banquet. This noon they were given a banquet by the alumni association. At the game this afternoon these 1917 Cyclones are sitting in a special reserved section in the stadium.

The captain of this clever 1917 Cyclone eleven is not back with his mates at his alma mater today. This star athlete, Howard W. (Rabbit) Aldrich, passed away a few years ago. Aldrich, a 150-pound halfback, was one of the four eight-lettermen which Iowa State has produced. The others are H. C. Hubbard, '10; Kenneth Wells, '32, and Fred Poole, '37. Jack Currie, '22, is the lone nine-award winner.

Aldrich, whose likeness hangs in the Iowa State athletic "Hall of Fame," won All-Missouri Valley and All-State acclaim for his football ability.

Five victories these scrappy, little 1917 Cyclones won under the coaching of Charles W. Mayer, now athletic director at Franklin and Marshall University in Lancaster, Pa. The victims were Simpson, 47-0; Coe, 7-0; Kansas State, 10-7; Missouri, 15-0, and Drake, 47-0. Only Iowa and Kansas took the measure of the Cyclones, the former by a 6-3 edge and the Jayhawks by a margin of 7-0.

The Cyclones piled up a margin of 129 points while holding the opposition to 20. Clyde S. Williams, a graduate of the University of Iowa and now located at Sheldon, Iowa, was the athletic director at this time; while Merl J. Ross, present Cyclone business manager of athletics, took over this position in this year, 1917.

The reserves were: Ends, W. H. Hadley, New Providence; O. O. Higgins, Oakland, Cal., and R. S. Paul, Waterloo. Guards, L. V. Foell, Storm Lake, and H. K. Helsetti, Thief River Falls, Minn. Tackles, M. A. Piper, Ida Grove,

and C. C. Smith, Olewein. Backs, L. E. Johnson, LeGrand; H. C. Fitch, Missouri Valley; R. E. Gaylord, New York, N. Y., and R. M. McFarland, Minneapolis, Minn.

In the light of the tonnage carried by football teams of the present era, it is interesting to note that the average weight of the regular 1917 Cyclone lineup was 160 pounds to the man. The linemen averaged 166, while the "pony" backfield boasted a combined weight of only 580 pounds. "They were great scrappers, though," commented B. J. (Bugs) Firkins, who completed his playing career a year earlier. Mr. Firkins, now a professor in the Agronomy Department here at Iowa State, has furnished us with some interesting sidelight glances at the members of this 1917 Cyclone football squad.

The eleven men who were consistent starters that season were:

Left end: A. T. (Jud) Neal, Sac City, 147 pounds. "A great blocker, a sure tackler, Irish, hit like a ton of bricks."

Left tackle: C. F. (Cy) Breeden, Fulton, 183 pounds. "An iron man on defense, the heaviest man on the team."

Left guard: R. W. (Dick) Barker, Mt. Vernon, 160 pounds. "All-state, an inspiring leader, now athletic director at Cornell."

Center: L. A. (Polly) Wallace, Dallas Center, 165 pounds. "All-state, great defensive man, later an all-American."

Right guard: H. J. (Shoe) Shoemaker, Harwarden, 165 pounds. "A fighter all the way."

Right tackle: L. W. (Louie) Schalk, Alden, 181 pounds. "Strong on defense, all-state."

Right end: H. F. (Jerry) Yeager, Davenport, 165 pounds. "Good kicker, fast down under punt."

Quarterback: A. M. (Shorty) Boyd, Burlington, 127 pounds. "All-state, heady, fine drop kicker and punter."

Left halfback: Chick Heater, deceased, 144 pounds. "Splendid runner, All-State."

Right halfback: Capt. H. W. (Rabbit) Aldrich, deceased, 150 pounds. "All-State, All-Valley, an eight letterman, spark plug."

Fullback: W. B. (Van) Vanderloo, Dubuque, 159 pounds. "Next to Chuck Laun of Iowa as a kicker."

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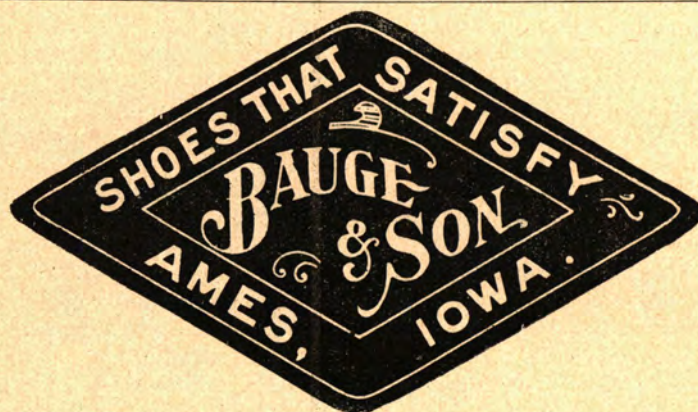

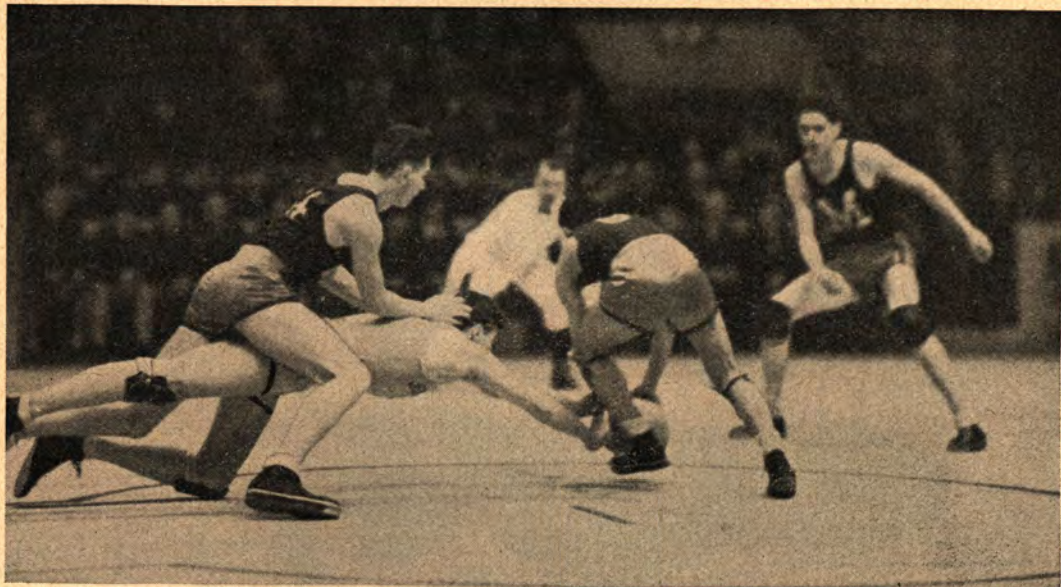
HOWARD CLEVELAND, Quarterback

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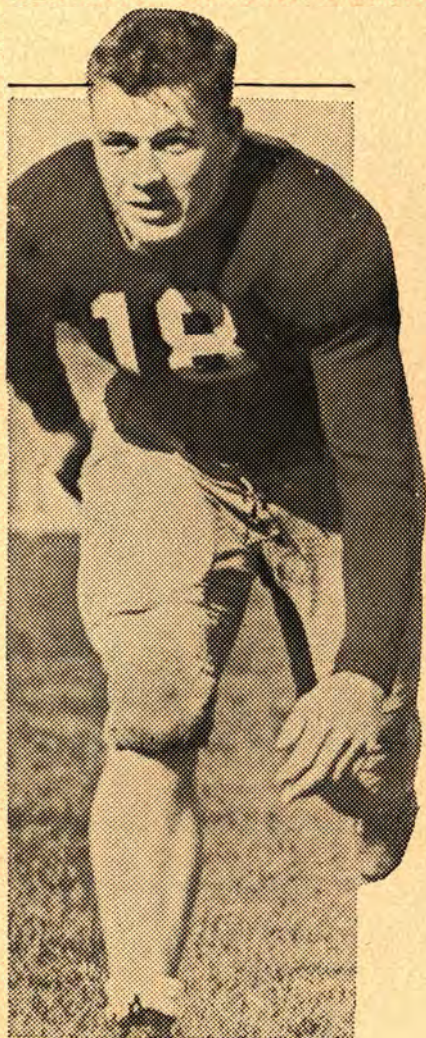

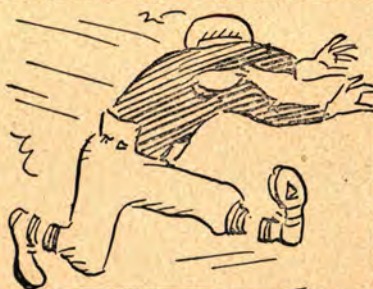

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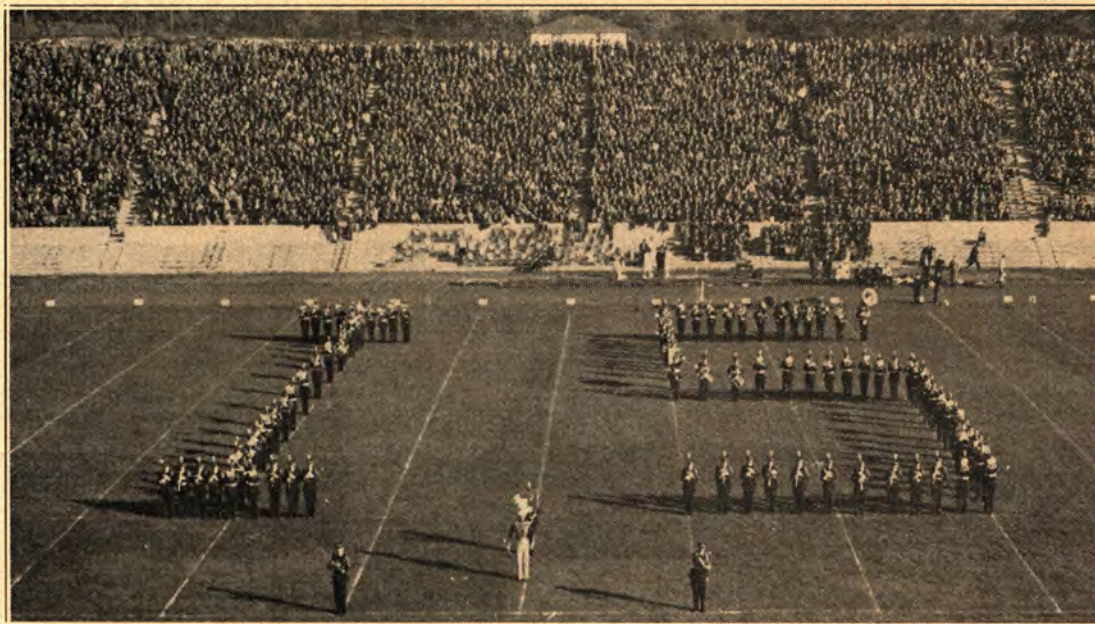
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Our Band

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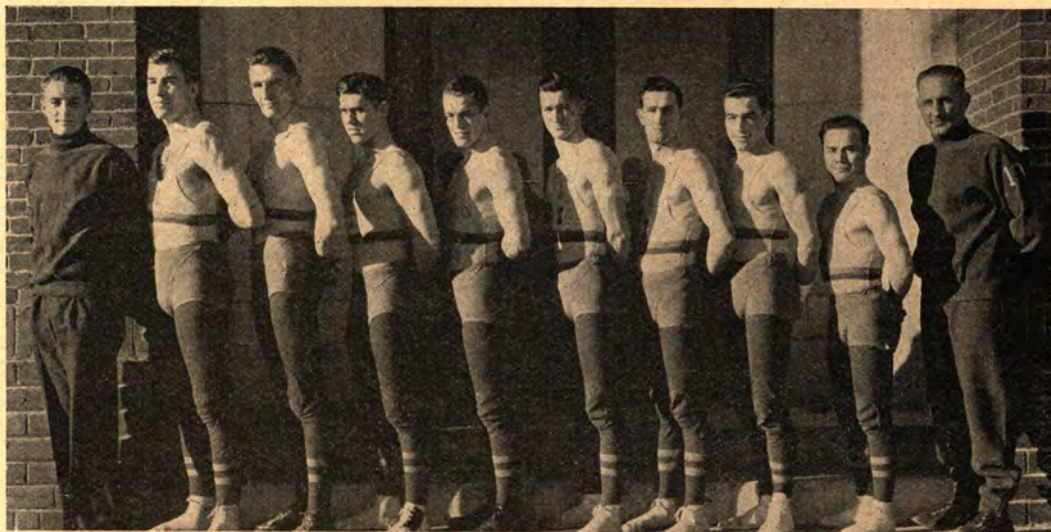
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Farewell Football

The paean of the pigskin is subsiding. In a few weeks now the fickle athletic spotlight will shift from football to basketball, indoor track, wrestling and swimming.

The transition, sudden in the minds of sports fans, is gradual with the athletes at Iowa State. For over a month now Cyclone track men, basketball players, wrestlers and swimmers have been preparing for tough winter campaigns not far out of the hearing of the pigskin's thud.

The Cyclone wrestlers, pride of Coach Hugo Otopalik, will be defending their Big Six championship. Charles McCaffree, new swimming head man, is faced with the task of placing his team in the runnerup position to equal last year's record.

On the other hand, top division indoor track and basketball teams at Iowa State this season would be a big improvement over last season. The new track coach, George Bretnall, is laying plans for doing just that, while Coach Louis Menze is still very much in doubt as to the potency of his little, streamlined cagers.

Otopalik has seven lettermen back in the fold—six of them members of the Big Six champion 1937 team. Capt. Eugene Hamilton graduated and Gene Farrell won't be back in school this winter. The rest of the champs are back. Big Six individual champions—George Haynes, 118-pounder, and Al Stoecker, heavyweight—and John Kirstein, 135; Capt. Frank Linn, 145; Royce Cox, 155, and Guy Henderson, 175, all

regulars in 1937, and Kenneth Stewart, first team 118-pounder in 1936, form the nucleus for the 1938 team.

Ah, an all-veteran team, you are thinking. Not on your life. There's a quartet of sophomores who will have lots to say about the allotment of those starting berths. Jack Larson, 126-pounder from Fort Dodge; Joe Loucks, 155-pound Cherokee boy; Sam Linn, 165-pound brother of the captain from Shelby, and Howard Buck, football playing heavyweight from Mount Ayr, represent one of the best sophomore crops in years.

All but one of the 1937 swimming lettermen will splash for the Cyclone tank men this winter. Capt. Robert Burkett, ace free style swimmer, is the lone graduate. His place will be taken by a bunch of sophomores, foremost of which are Allen, Armstrong, Hargesheimer, Simon and Meisenheimer.

Iowa State is headed for better days in track. Only two of the 1937 regulars were lost through graduation. In their stead Coach Bretnall will have a bevy of eye-filling sophomores. Keep these names in mind: Jim Bleakley, Chuck Briley, John Tellier, sprinters; Jake Stimson and Bob Grange, distance men; Al Munsell, Jack

1937 Squad Largest in History of Iowa State

The Iowa State freshman football squad is probably above but certainly not any below the average in the opinion of Coach Louis Menze. "There are probably more men of approximately the same ability than we have ever had, but I doubt if the general class of the squad is as good as last year," Coach Menze explained. "You may recall that 15 of the traveling Cyclone varsity squad of 29 this year were members of the prep squad last year."

The original squad of 140 men is by far the largest prep squad in the state and is the biggest in Iowa State history. Among the linemen the centers are the most outstanding, while there are a trio of backs who have more than the usual amount of speed coupled with size.

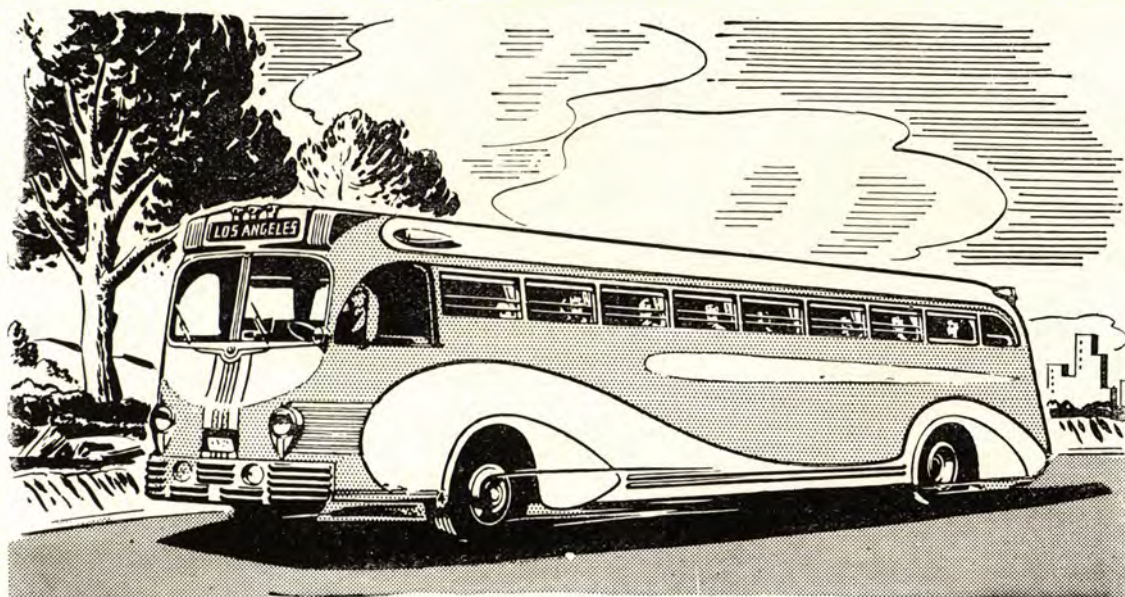
happen when the Wildcats and Cyclones of 1937 tangle on State Field today.
