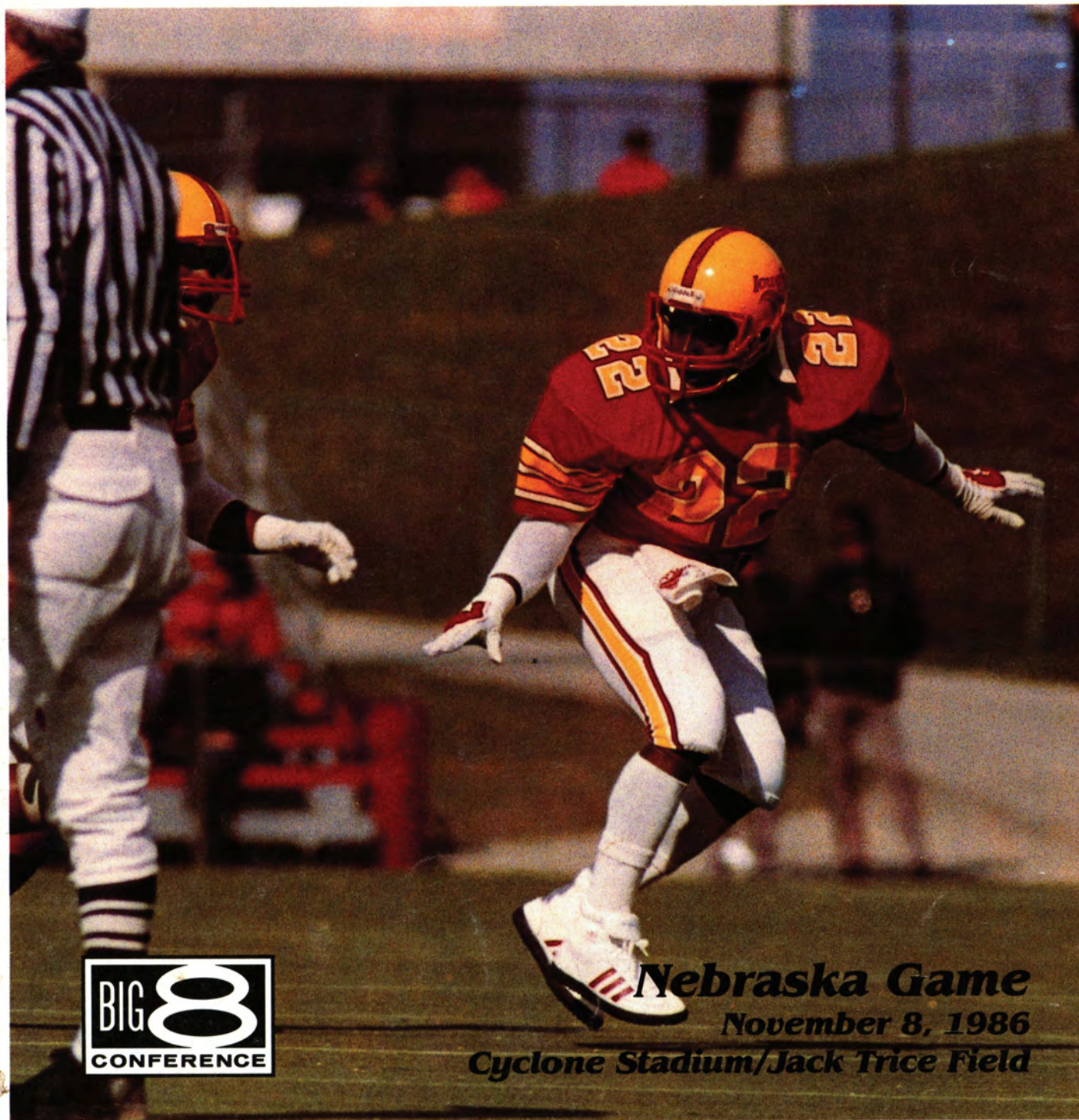

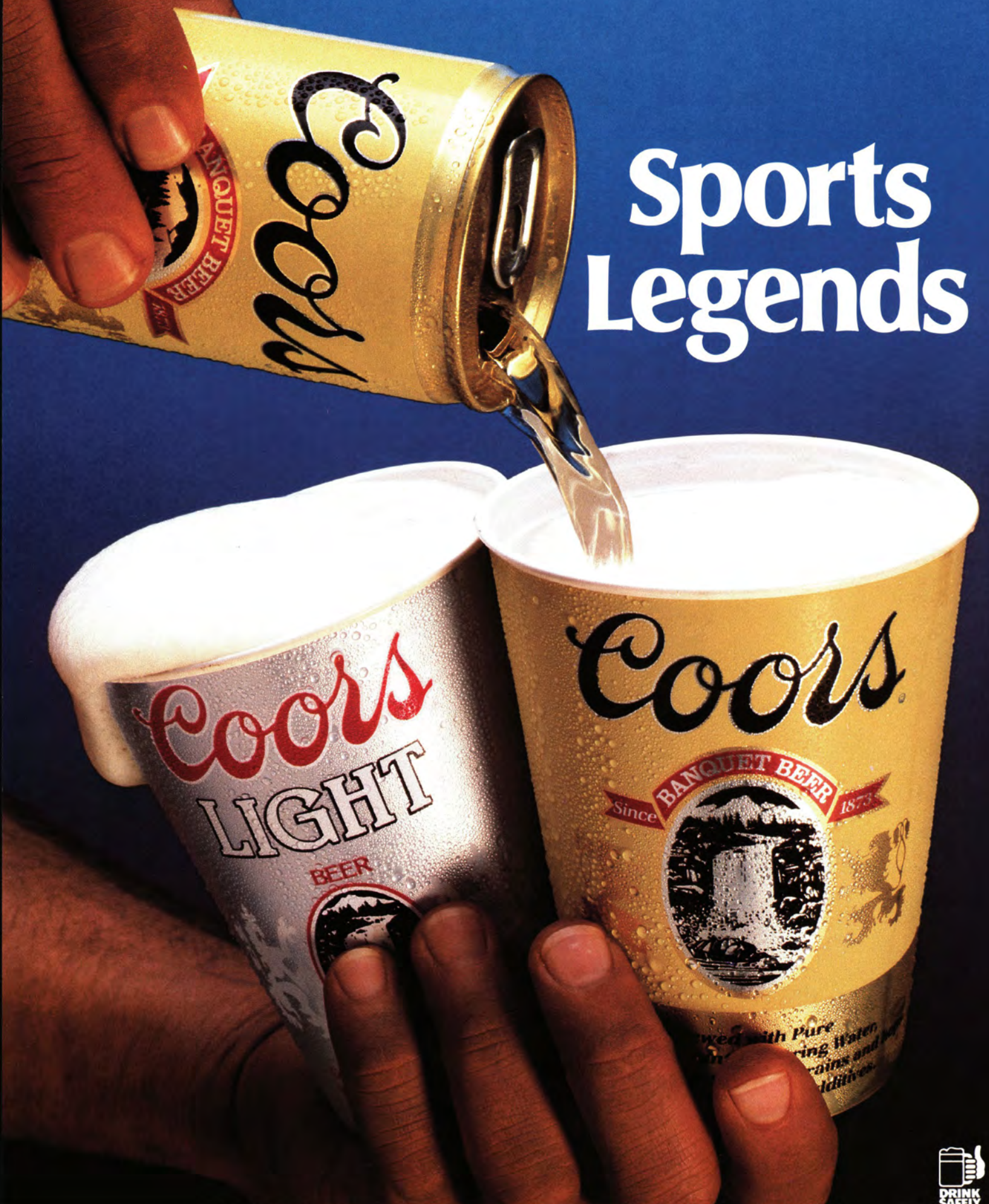

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Iowa State University

Iowa State University enters a new era this fall under the direction of President Gordon Eaton. The former vice president for academic affairs at Texas A&M, Eaton took office July 1, 1986 as Iowa State's 12th president.

Eaton received his bachelor of arts from Wesleyan University at Middletown, Conn., in 1951. He graduated "With High Honors and High Distinction" with degrees in geology and mathematics. He earned his masters of science degree in geology (1953) and his Ph.D. in geophysics and geology (1957) from the California Institute of Technology.

He served on the faculty of Wesleyan University (1955-59) and the faculty of the University of California-Riverside (1959-63) before a two-year stint as the project chief for the U.S. Geological Survey in Denver, Colorado. Eaton then returned to California-Riverside where he was the chairperson of the department of geological sciences.

From 1967-81 Eaton was with the U.S. Geological Survey, serving in a number of capacities. He was the project chief for the Southwestern Project, scientist-in-charge of the Hawaiian Volcano Observatory, and associate chief geologist at the national headquarters in Reston, Va.

In 1981, he was appointed the dean of the College of Geosciences at Texas A&M, which includes the departments of geology, geophysics, oceanography, meteorology and geography. Eaton was named provost and vice president for academic affairs in 1983, a post he held

until coming to Iowa State.

An established scholar and scientist, Eaton is the author and co-author of more than 40 publications covering such subjects as mineral resources throughout the United States, volcanic ash deposits, and mining geophysics in the Soviet Union. He has worked on the "Journal of Volcanology and Geothermal Resources" as an associate editor, and was the co-editor of the Geological Society of America's "Memoir 152".

Since the first students enrolled at Iowa State, the institution has been committed to academic excellence. Iowa State's reputation for scholarship is internationally known and Iowa State's students are respected as serious scholars.

One of the largest institutions governed by the State Board of Regents, Iowa State is a major midwestern center of learning for over 26,000 students, from all 50 states and 99 other nations. Iowa State attracts such a diverse student body because of the diversity of undergraduate and graduate programs it offers. Over 120 undergraduate programs of study are available from Iowa State's eight colleges: Agriculture, Business Administration, Design, Education, Engineering, Home Economics, Sciences and Humanities, and Veterinary Medicine.

The picturesque campus is comfortably situated in a central campus "park", a splendid combination of conventional and contemporary

architectures, wooded and open landscaping, and an ultra-modern south campus dominated by the Iowa State Center, and the College of Veterinary Medicine.

The Iowa State Center, which boasts one of the nation's finest facilities of its kind, consists of Cyclone Stadium-Jack Trice Field, the C.Y. Stephens Auditorium, the J.W. Fisher Theater, the Scheman Continuing Education Center, and the James H. Hilton Coliseum.

Sports are a vital part of the life at Iowa State, as the Department of Intercollegiate Athletics offers 21 men's and women's sports. Quite a number of teams have been nationally ranked in recent years and several have won national championships. Iowa State has also produced 17 Olympians, three of whom captured gold medals. While athletics remain in the spotlight, the classroom shares equal time. A recent five-year study revealed that Iowa State has the highest graduation rate of all student-athletes in the Big Eight Conference.

The opportunities that Iowa State offers stretch beyond the lengths of academics and athletics. There are ample opportunities for students to participate in theater, music, dance and intramural sports, as well as numerous academic and campus organizations.

Iowa State University is an institution founded on a commitment to academic challenge, achievement, and excellence. Iowa State reaches beyond this by offering its students some of the most advanced athletic, cultural and social opportunities in the midwest.

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Coach Jim Criner

Since being named Iowa State's 26th head football coach on January 29, 1983, Jim Criner has enjoyed three productive seasons at the helm. In his first season, the Cyclones tied with Bluebonnet Bowl participant Oklahoma State for fourth place in the Big Eight Conference, marking the first time that ISU has finished in the league's upper division since 1978 when the Cyclones played in the Hall of Fame Bowl. His 1984 team, although riddled by injuries, ranked as one of the nation's best in total offense most of the season, as well as ranking 17th nationally in defense.

Last season, a young Iowa State unit closed out the season with a victory at Kansas State before stopping seventh-rated Oklahoma State, 20-15 in the season finale at Cyclone Stadium. The victory over the Gator Bowl-bound Cowboys put football observers on notice that ISU's program was on track to challenge the upper echelon of the Big Eight Conference.

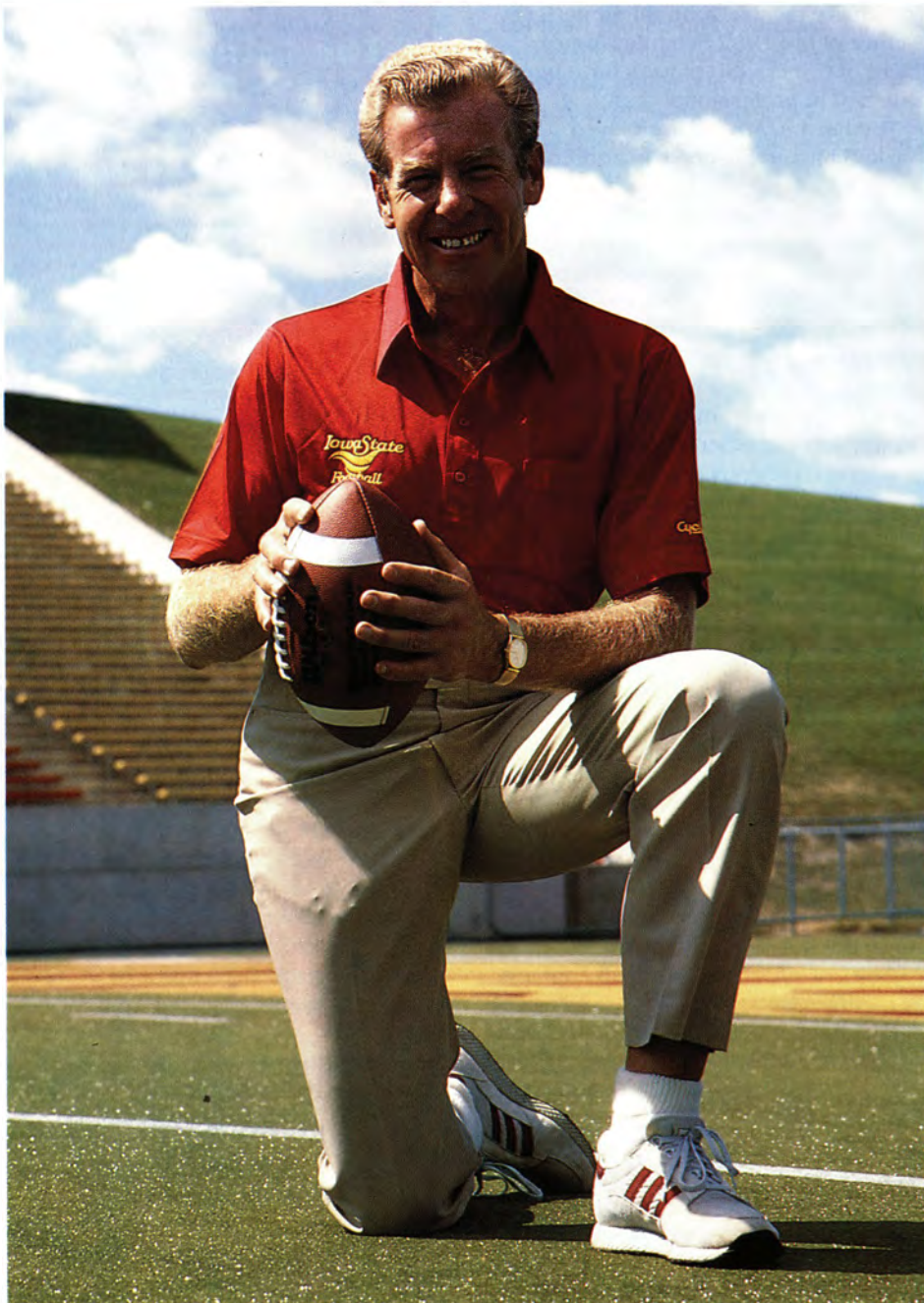
Criner, 45, replaced Donnie Duncan who resigned on January 13, 1983 to enter private business. Duncan compiled a 19-23-2 mark in four seasons at Iowa State.

When Iowa State Director of Athletics Max Urick began the search for the new coach, he had special qualities in mind.

"When we began a search to find the right man to head the football program at Iowa State, among our criteria was a head coach who had proven himself a successful coach," Urick said. "At the same time, we looked for a person with a blend of human qualities and professional credentials. It became apparent that Jim Criner matched our criteria."

Iowa State fans were treated to another exciting grid campaign last fall. The Cyclone defense, that ranked consistently among the nation's top units last season, sparked the key victories that gave Criner and his staff a reason to be proud of that unit's development.

Criner has a solid and extensive coaching background, including most recently, a seven-year stint as head coach of perennial NCAA Division 1-AA power Boise State. While guiding the Broncos to a 59-21-1 record, Criner directed the club to four Big Sky Conference titles, two berths in the final



round of the NCAA playoffs, and the NCAA Division 1-AA Championship in 1980.

Prior to his post at Boise State, Criner served on the staffs at Utah, California, Brigham Young, and UCLA. He coached under such widely recognized coaches as LaVell Edwards, Pepper Rogers and Dick Vermeil.

Criner began his coaching career in 1963 as an assistant at Charter Oaks (Calif.) High School under current St. Louis Cardinals' Head Coach Jim

Hanifan. He remained in the prep ranks the next four seasons, leading Claremont (Calif.) High School to the state playoffs twice.

Although his achievements at Boise State elevated Criner to the limelight, only two teams during his previous 21 years of coaching had a losing record. After his initial Boise State team went 5-5-1, his successive Bronco squads earned marks of 9-2, 7-4, 10-1, 10-3, and 8-3. While at Boise State, Criner tutored future National Football League

standouts Rick Woods (free safety, Pittsburgh Steelers), and David Hughes (fullback, Seattle Seahawks). Among his future Canadian Football League prospects were Cedric Minter (running back, Toronto Argonauts), the league's leading rusher in 1981, and Doug Scott (defensive tackle, Montreal Alouettes), winner of the 1982 Schenley Award. Eight of Criner's ISU players have been selected in professional draft.

The Lurton, Ark., native played basketball and baseball, in addition to being an all-league tailback and linebacker at Coachella Valley High School in Thermal, Calif. He attended Cal Poly-San Luis Obispo before playing junior college ball under former Seattle Seahawks' coach Dick Manspurger, and then graduated from Cal Poly-Pomona in 1961.

Criner comes from a coaching family. He has three brothers who are also pursuing coaching careers. Walt, former offensive coordinator at Cal Poly-

Pomona, is the head football coach at Snow College in Ephraim, Utah. Herb is the head football coach at Coeur D'Alene High School in Idaho. Bob is the head basketball coach at Coachella Valley High School in Thermal, Calif.

In the off-season, Criner enjoys fishing and pheasant hunting. He is married to the former Ann Marie Shmorhun of Coachella, Calif., and is the father of Mark, 19 -a football player at Iowa State -and a daughter, Kelli, 16.

Chuck Banker brings five years of NFL experience to the Cyclone football staff, where he will work with Cyclone head coach Jim Criner for the third time. The two have coached together at Utah and Boise State. Banker, an assistant coach with the St. Louis Cardinals for the last five seasons, will lend his talents to Iowa State's grid fortunes by serving as Jim Criner's assistant head coach. The Monrovia, Calif., native will also tutor the Cyclone defensive ends.

Banker, who joined the Cyclone staff in March of 1986, began his coaching career at Glendale (Calif.) College, working there from 1962-65. He later was an assistant coach at Utah (1966-67), the head coach at Westminster (Utah) College (1969-71), an assistant again at Utah (1971-73) and a prep coach and athletic director in Bountiful, Utah. Banker was Criner's defensive coordinator at Boise State from 1976-79.

Gene Dahlquist

Offensive
Coordinator and
Quarterbacks



Dahlquist joined the Cyclone staff in 1983 after serving as Jim Criner's offensive coordinator at Boise State from 1977-82. Under Dahlquist's guidance, the 1983 Cyclones established 18 records and were among the nation's leaders in several offensive categories. His 1984 offensive unit ranked among the nation's leaders in total offense. Cyclone quarterback Alex Espinoza is set to challenge several Cyclone passing marks in his

third season under Dahlquist.

The Melrose, Ill., native began his coaching career as an assistant at Boise State in 1968. He joined the University of Utah staff in 1971, and then spent from 1974-76 as offensive coordinator at the University of Oregon. Dahlquist lettered twice as a quarterback and punter at the University of Arizona, earning all-Western Athletic Conference honors. After earning his bachelor's degree from Arizona in 1965, he played two seasons with the Norfolk Neptunes of the Continental Football League.

Mike Barry

Centers and
Guards



Mike Barry, brings 16 years of coaching on the prep, collegiate and professional levels to Iowa State where he starts his first season on the ISU staff tutoring the the Cyclone centers and guards.

Barry comes to Iowa State from the Portland Breakers of the USFL after a year as the offensive coordinator of the San Antonio Gunslingers. His collegiate experience includes a stint as the offensive line coach at Arizona (1980-83). The 1969 Southern Illinois graduate also coached at his alma mater from 1976-79. Barry's coaching career started in the Chicago prep ranks.

The Chicago, Ill., native was an all-conference center at Southern Illinois under Iowa State assistant athletic director Dick Towers.

Ed Lambert

Runningbacks



Lambert, who played for head coach Jim Criner as a collegiate competitor, now returns to work under the Iowa State head coach for the second time. In his first season at Iowa State, Lambert coaches the ISU running-backs.

Lambert joins the Cyclones after two

seasons as the runningback coach for the Los Angeles Express of the USFL. He was a team captain at Cal-State Hayward in 1968. Lambert was a prep coach at Oakland, Calif., Fremont High from 1970-78 before joining Criner's staff at Boise State in 1978. In 1980 Lambert moved on to Howard University before two seasons at California, starting in 1982. He joined the L.A. Express staff in 1984.

The Beaumont, Texas native earned a bachelor's degree in Physical Education from Cal-State Hayward in 1970.

Doug Smith

Tackles
and Tight Ends



Doug Smith brings 32 years of coaching experience into his first season at Iowa State. Smith will coach the Cyclone offensive tackles and tight ends. He comes to Ames from San Diego State where he was the offensive line coach for six seasons.

The 1952 Pacific graduate was offensive line coach at California from 1977 to 1980. He has also coached at Utah State (1971, 1973-77), Cal Poly-Pomona (1972-73), and Pacific (1966-71). He also coached at Contra Costa College (Calif.), from 1963-66.

The San Francisco native received a master's degree from Pacific in 1956 after a three-year tour of duty in the U.S. Army Medical Service Corps. He began his coaching career at Mt. Diablo High School in 1955 before taking a coaching position at Diablo Valley Junior College in 1963.

Bill Vincent

Wide Receivers



Vincent joined the Cyclone staff in the spring of 1983 after serving as the receiver coach at Cerritos (Calif.) Junior College where he once starred as a juco All-American.

Under his direction, the Cyclone receiving corps has developed into one of the best in the nation, with several

players ranking as leaders in the Big Eight and nationally.

In fact, Vincent still ranks second on the school's all-time career receiving chart with 72 receptions for 886 yards and five touchdowns. He completed his career at Oregon, where he started at tight end and was once selected the Pacific Eight Conference's Player of the Week.

Vincent was awarded a bachelor's degree from Oregon in 1978 and briefly coached at Cerritos High School before entering the collegiate ranks. The Detroit, Mich., native earned his master's degree at Long Beach State.

Phil Bennett

Defensive Coordinator and Linebackers



The former Texas A&M standout begins his third year on the staff, and his second season as ISU's defensive coordinator. Bennett previously served as defensive coordinator at MacArthur High School in Irving, Texas. He helped guide MacArthur to its first state playoff in 10 years.

Bennett also worked as a defensive assistant at Texas Christian University in 1982-83. Prior to that, he served as a linebacker and defensive end coach at Texas A&M from 1978-81. The Aggies made two bowl appearances during his four-year stint, including a 28-12 win over Iowa State in the 1978 Hall of

Fame Bowl.

He played defensive end for Texas A&M from 1974-77 and was an all-Southwest Conference selection. Bennett played in the 1975 Liberty Bowl, 1976 Sun Bowl, and the 1977 Bluebonnet Bowl during his career. He received his B.S. degree from Texas A&M in 1977.

Jim Elam

Defensive Backs



Elam joined Iowa State's coaching staff in January of 1985 and his teaching techniques made an immediate impact on ISU's pass defenders. The Cyclones ranked 14th nationally against the pass in 1985. Elam, a Kangsville, Texas native, served on the University of Missouri defensive staff during the 1984 campaign. He began his coaching career at Rice University in 1972 where he spent three years. From there, he moved on to one-year posts at West Texas State in 1977, and Baylor in 1978. Prior to coaching at Missouri, he served as a defensive assistant at the University of Houston from 1979 to 1983. He coached the Cougar defensive ends four seasons, and directed the defensive secondary one season.

Elam was a four-year starter at defensive back at New Mexico

Highlands where he twice won NAIA All-America accolades. He also coached high school football in Artesia, N.M., from 1969-72.

Cole Proctor

Defensive Tackles



Cole Proctor started his first season as ISU's defensive line coach in January 1986. He came to Iowa State from San Diego State, where he was defensive line coach from 1981 to 1985. Two of his former linemen are playing professional football, and seven of his SDSU defensive linemen earned all-conference honors. He also worked as the defensive line coach at East Tennessee State from 1979-81, and served as head football coach and athletic director at Lees-McRae (N. Car.) College.

Proctor graduated from Morehead State University in 1967, and earned his master's degree the following year from Morehead State. He played offensive tackle on the 1966 Morehead State team that captured the Ohio Valley Conference title. He also played football for one year at Northern Iowa prior to transferring to Morehead State.

The Meriden, Conn., native also coached in the prep ranks at Chatham Township (N.J.) high school from 1972-73 and Keene (N.H.) High school from 1973-76.

Winning Season Next Cyclone Goal

Today's Iowa State confrontation with Nebraska represents more than a chance to enhance the Cyclones' post-season opportunities. A victory against the 7-1, nationally-rated Cornhuskers would give Iowa State fans their first winning season since the 1980 squad posted a 7-4 mark. In addition, a good showing by the Cyclones would give Jim Criner's team a lift that could push his squad to new heights heading into this season's final two contests against Kansas State and Oklahoma State.

The Cyclones are fresh off a second-half outburst last week at Missouri that propelled them to a 37-14 win over the Tigers. Iowa State trailed 7-3 at halftime before exploding for 34 points in the second stanza en route to their first victory in Columbia since 1976. That 1976 ISU unit later captured a 37-28 victory over the Cornhuskers, the last Cyclone win over Nebraska in Ames.

Iowa State rolled up a season-high 488 yards in total offense against Missouri, including 199 yards on the ground and 289 yards in the air. The Cyclones' 37-point output marked ISU's best Big Eight total since racking up 49 points in a 49-27 victory over Kansas State in 1983. Iowa State's 488 yards in total offense was the third best offensive output by a Jim Criner coached ISU team. The Cyclones totaled 520 yards in the 1983 Kansas State game and 504 yards in the 1983 Nebraska contest. The Iowa State defense was also outstanding, limiting Missouri to 227 yards in total offense, with the defense holding Missouri to 31 yards in total offense in the first half.

"I was very pleased with the way our football team came back in the second half," Criner said. "I was very happy with our offensive play and also feel that our defense really played well."

Alex Espinoza's star shown bright last weekend at Missouri. The senior quarterback hit on 20 of 30 passes for 275 yards and a pair of touchdowns against the Tigers. He also rushed for a career high 59 yards, including a scramble for 29 yards -- the longest ISU scamper from scrimmage this season.



Senior strong safety Aaron Manning has been in on 33 tackles this season. He has also broken up four passes.

The East Los Angeles, Calif., native accounted for 336 yards in total offense, the fifth-best single-game performance in Cyclone history. Espinoza has now thrown for 4,727 yards in his ISU career, tops on the school chart and the seventh-best figure in Big Eight history. He needs just 249 yards to pass former Nebraska quarterback David Humm for sixth place and 273 yards to become the sixth-signal caller in conference history to top the 5,000 yard mark. His 1,443 yards this season is already ninth on ISU's single-season passing chart. If you add to Alex's total, the 1,080 yards he threw for at Cal State-Fullerton as a freshman, his career mark stands at 5,087 passing yards.

Sophomore fullback Joe Henderson asserted himself in the Missouri victory. He caught five passes for 34 yards and a pair of touchdowns. Other Cyclone offensive stars against Missouri included senior Robbie Minor, who snared a career-high seven passes for 137 yards. He leads the Cyclones with 25 catches for an average of 15.8 yards per reception.

Iowa State's defense, which has forced 16 turnovers this season, will face a stiff test this afternoon. Among those ready for the challenge are junior middle linebacker Chris Moore, who made nine tackles against Missouri. Moore made a school-record 27 tackles against Oklahoma eclipsing the school linebacker mark of 21 set by Tom

Boskey against Missouri in 1978. Senior strong-side linebacker Dennis Gibson was credited with a team-high 14 tackles against Missouri. Freshman outside linebacker Darren Trieb is making his mark, coming up with 12 stops at Missouri and causing a Tiger fumble. He also made four tackles for losses of 27 yards last week.

The Cyclone defense will get stiff opposition from a Cornhusker offense that is averaging nearly 37 points a game. Nebraska is ranked second nationally in rushing offense, averaging over 307 yards per contest on the ground. The Cornhuskers rolled up 385 yards in total offense in Lincoln last weekend while rolling to a 38-0 victory over Kansas State in a contest that was played in a heavy snowstorm for much of the game. Quarterback Steve Taylor rushed for two touchdowns and passed for another to lead the UN attack. He finished the game with 68 yards rushing and completed three of four passes for 60 yards. Junior I-back Keith Jones rushed for a game-high 109 yards on 18 carries and scored a pair of touchdowns. Jones leads the Nebraska rushing attack, averaging 84 yards per game. The Cornhuskers are averaging 413.5 yards per game in total offense. Senior place-kicker Dale Klein has scored 61 points this season and is 34 of 35 on extra point attempts.

Nebraska is second nationally in total defense, behind Oklahoma. The Cornhuskers have allowed only 240 yards per game in total offense this season. Kansas State gained only 106 yards total offense last week in Lincoln.

Last season, Doug DuBose rushed for 114 yards and one touchdown to lead the Huskers to a 49-0 victory over Iowa State in Lincoln.

Cyclone Head Coach Jim Criner knows that nothing but the highest caliber of effort from his team will be needed to offset a Nebraska team that must win to keep its Orange Bowl hopes alive.

"Nebraska is an excellent football team and will present a tremendous challenge to our football team," Criner said. "They are a great offensive team and, as usual, they have a great defense. We'll have to play our best game of the season if we are to have a chance to be successful. Our football team has several goals to reach this season and this is an important game for us, as are the remaining two games on our schedule."

The Cyclone roster features four players from Omaha, Neb., three of them starters. Starting tight end Tom

Cyclone Strength Program



Each year, strength and conditioning programs are being emphasized more and more as major contributors to the success of athletic teams. As recent as ten years ago, many head coaches would not allow their athletes to lift weights because they thought any kind of strenuous lifting would hinder the athletes' performance. Today, it has been proven that any athlete who is not involved in a structured strength and conditioning program will never reach his or her full potential. It has also been documented that the stronger athlete is less susceptible to injury. At Iowa State, a great deal of emphasis is placed on preparing our athletes for the rigorous demands of the Big Eight Conference.

Under the direction of full-time strength and conditioning coach, Tom Wilson, Iowa State's athletic teams have made great strides toward becoming the most physical squads in the conference. The goal of the strength and conditioning program is not to make avid weightlifters out of athletes, but to increase athletic performance through scientific techniques and procedures.

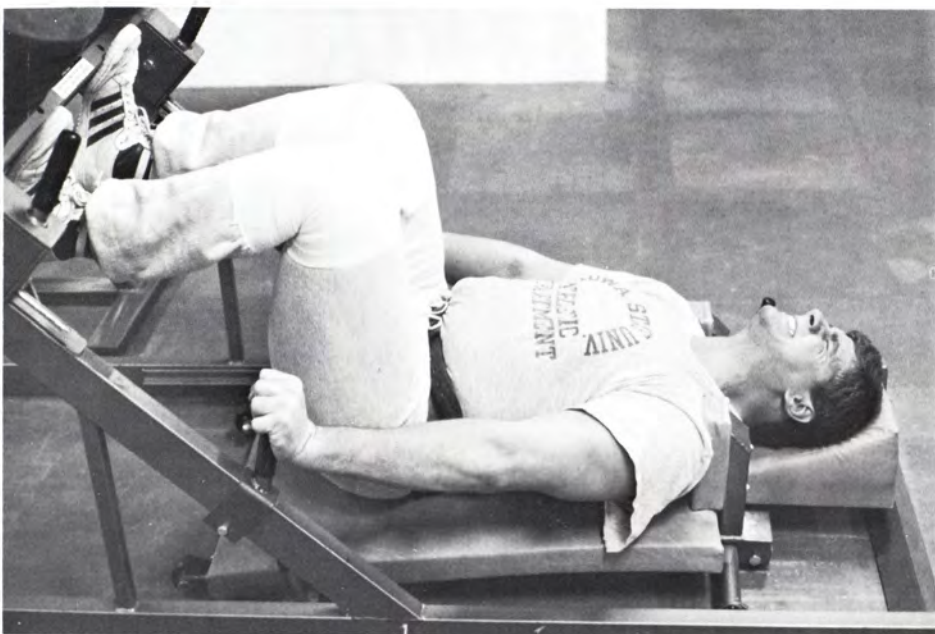
"Iowa State offers all athletes proven strength and conditioning programs," said Wilson, "plus excellent facilities

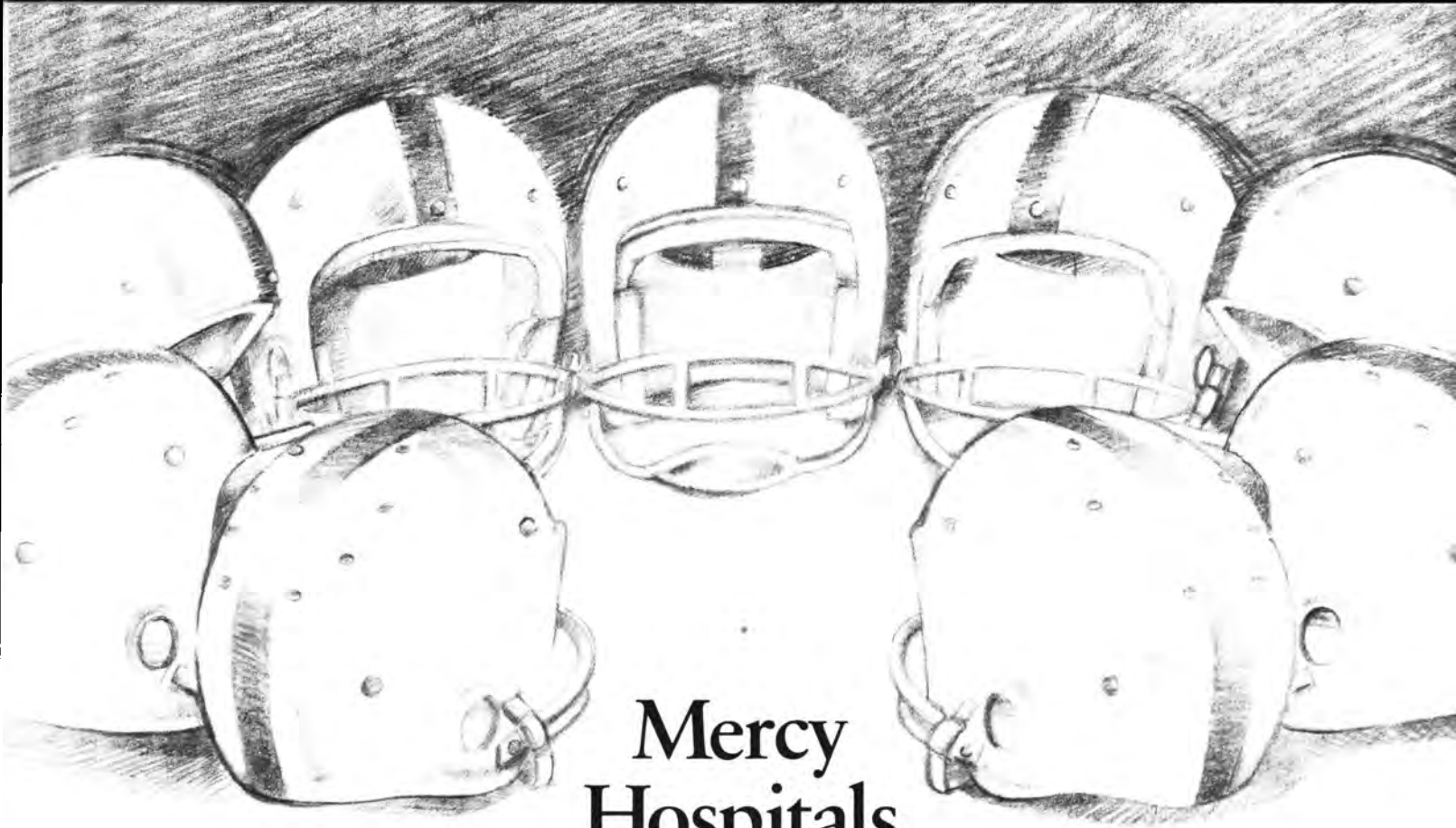
designed to enhance athletic careers from the 'blue chip' scholarship athlete to the unknown walk-on. Utilizing such a strictly supervised strength and conditioning program will not only produce great physical results, but will also increase the athlete's confidence when he or she is bigger, faster, stronger and more powerful than the opponent."

For Iowa State's football team, as well as many other Cyclone squads, the strength and conditioning program continues on a year-round basis. During the in-season, the Cyclones cut back on weight room activity, yet do not

eliminate it entirely. The emphasis at this time is placed on maintaining the strength that was gained during the summer months. By maintaining this strength advantage, the players are just as strong going into the final game as they were in the season-opener.

Once the season is over, time is not wasted. Iowa State's football players start the winter strength and conditioning program at the beginning of January, preparing the athletes for spring ball. Special drills have been designed to increase the athletes' speed, agility, power, strength, flexibility and overall level of conditioning.

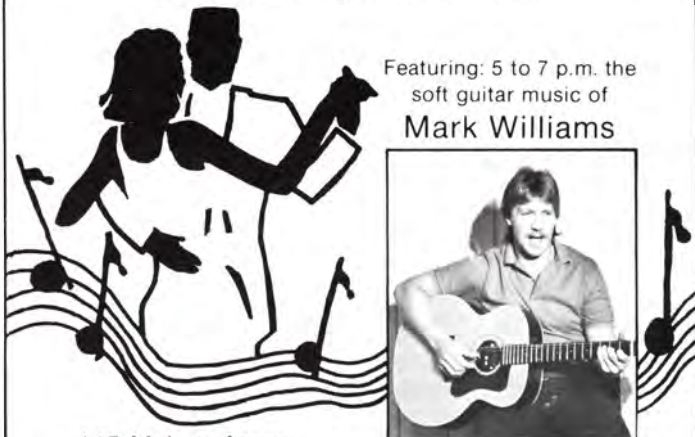
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Cyclone Profile

Chris Moore

For Chris Moore, it's been a rapid maturation period since he appeared on the Iowa State campus in 1984. His hard work and efforts are finally paying off, as he is the starting middle linebacker and the Cyclones' leading tackler this season.

The Salt Lake City, Utah native, sat out 1984 after transferring from the University of Utah. He was listed second on the depth chart at middle linebacker in 1985, but started two games late in the season. Moore saw action in every game and made 48 tackles, 31 solos and 17 assists. He had six tackles for losses totaling 30 yards, which led the team.

Going into 1986 spring drills, Moore and Jeff Braswell were locked in a tight battle for the top spot at middle linebacker. Iowa State coach Jim Criner said that Moore was "too good to keep out of the starting lineup," and moved him from backup middle linebacker to the outside linebacker spot at the beginning of fall practice.

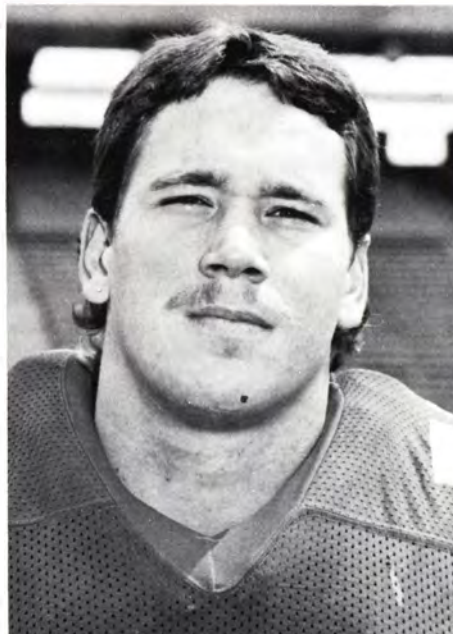
"I've played middle linebacker ever since little leagues," Moore said. "When they asked me to move to the outside spot, I was glad, though, since it meant I'd get to start."

Moore was shifted back to starting middle linebacker before the Iowa game. He says that he is happy with the change, since the middle is a "more natural" position for him. His performance bears him out.

On the year, Moore has 55 solo stops and 35 assists for a team-high 90 total tackles. In the Oklahoma game, he recorded a whopping 27 tackles, breaking Chris Boskey's 1978 school record for most tackles by a linebacker.

"The coaches told the two defensive tackles and I that we needed to key on the fullback against them (Oklahoma)," Moore said. "The three of us did a good job, and I just ended up where the ball was."

Moore has also moved into a leadership position for the Cyclone defense this season as the starting middle linebacker. He says that he has



been around as long as anybody, which has helped him to see the necessity of a good leader.

"I'm not really a talk-type of leader, I'd rather let my performance talk for me," Moore said. "I'm starting to talk more, though, and it has helped me develop as well as getting things across to others."

With going to a bowl game as the 1986 team's goal, the players could be putting extra pressure on themselves. However, Moore says that the team goes into the games with a different attitude this season, which has helped the players keep each contest in perspective.

"Right now, we've got a three game season, and we take each week as a bowl game," Moore said. "Looking at it from that view really helps us concentrate on that week's game."

As a team, Iowa State's defense is ranked 33rd in the nation, and is fourth in the Big Eight. Despite some big yardage totals by Iowa and Oklahoma, he said that the defense has performed well on the whole in 1986.

"Our defense has played hard with good overall intensity, but we've just made some mistakes at the wrong time," Moore said. "You have to concentrate 100 percent of the time, or they'll make the big yardage plays on you."

"Concentration is the key for us, and if we can do that on each play, we'll finish out strong," Moore said. "That might put us in a bowl game, which we've all been working for."

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Stadium Information

First Aid Station

Emergency medical treatment is available for spectators in special first aid quarters located under both the east and west stands. Contact the nearest usher to request medical assistance.

Ambulance Service

An ambulance is parked at the first aid quarters on the west side of the stadium.

Pass Out Checks

Persons leaving the stadium will be stamped for re-admission to the stadium. In addition, they must have a ticket stub for re-admission. No pass outs will be allowed between 12:30 and 1:00 p.m.

Service for Physicians

Doctors anticipating calls during the game are urged to register at the first aid quarters under the west stands, leaving their exact seat location. The management will see that all calls are delivered without delay.

Lost and Found

A lost and found service is maintained in the Athletic Ticket Office in the Olsen Building at the north end of the stadium. Articles found should be turned over to an usher or left at the Athletic Ticket Office.

Public Telephone

Pay telephones are located behind the east and west stands.

Refreshments

Refreshments are served in the stands and at convenient locations around the stadium.

Iowa State Souvenirs

An attractive array of Iowa State souvenirs is available at conveniently located novelty sales booths throughout the stadium and from vendors in the parking areas. Souvenir sales are owned and operated by the ISU Athletic Department.

Radios, Stadium Chairs, Umbrellas

As a courtesy to neighboring ticket holders, spectators are asked not to bring radios, stadium chairs and umbrellas into the stands.

Rest Rooms

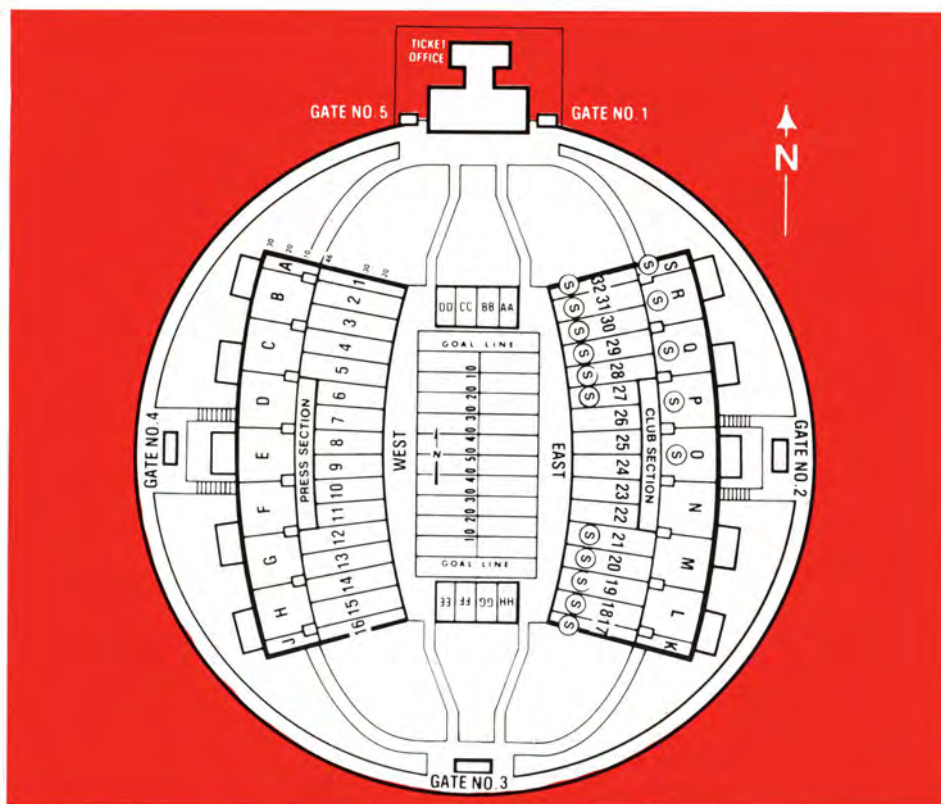
Rest rooms are conveniently located throughout the stadium behind each concession stand.

Public Address System

No appeals will be made over the public address system except under exceptional circumstances. The public is asked not to request this service.

Wheelchairs

Special areas in sections 18 and 19



are available for spectators in wheelchairs. In addition, wheelchair seating is available on the field level behind the goalposts.

Carry-in Packages & Articles

Parcels carried in cannot exceed 14" x 14" by 8" deep. Please do not bring into the stadium bottles, cans, apples, oranges, toilet tissue, etc. Items thrown on the field can result in a penalty for the home team.

The State of Iowa code prohibits the use of alcohol in the Stadium. The Athletic Department asks our patrons to behave responsibly and in compliance with the State code.

Parking Lot Facilities

The ISU Athletic Department is proud to be one of the very few athletic facilities to provide portable toilets for their patrons in the parking lots. These are located in strategic spots throughout the stadium parking area.

Stadium Sign Policy

Iowa State promotes and encourages the display of signs. All signs must be in good taste and supportive of Iowa State University. Signs are to be displayed on the south end of the Olsen Building and on the walls of the stands, both upper and lower decks. In no case may the sign obstruct vision or endanger fans. Signs must be stationary. All signs must be approved by Iowa State's athletic department. For sign approval, see Jim Overturf, Room 137 Olsen Building, before noon on Friday prior to home games. The athletic department

reserves the right to move or remove any signs not meeting these specifications.

Emergency Road Service

Iowa State University and Iowa AAA Motor Club will provide an Emergency Road Service for persons attending home football games. This service will be in effect during and within two hours after the game throughout the season. The phone number for the service is 292-2303. Proof of game attendance (i.e.; ticket stub) may be requested.

Distractions

We want to make football Saturday a totally enjoyable experience and want to encourage you to be respectful of those around you in the stadium. This attitude of cooperation can help to insure a pleasant, enthusiastic game atmosphere. In the event you feel there is unreasonable distraction in your seating area, we ask you to take the following steps to help us control undesirable behavior:

- Note the seating section, row and seat number(s), and inform the usher in your section of the disturbance. The usher will observe the conduct and request it to stop, if appropriate.

- If the conduct continues, the usher will get assistance from a uniformed policeman to request improvement of behavior or to remove the fan(s) from the stadium.

- An additional occurrence is cause for removal from the stadium and could be grounds for relocation in next season's ticket assignment.

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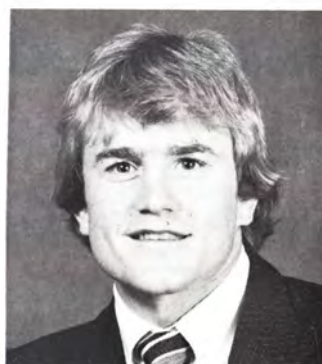
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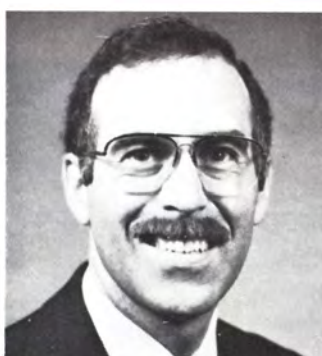

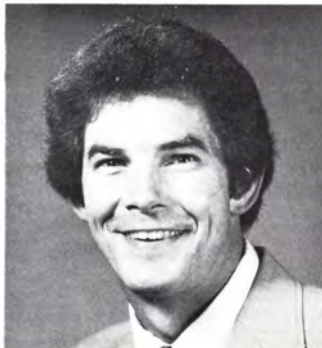

First Division Finish Is Cyclone Baseball Goal

Iowa State Head Baseball Coach Bobby Randall will be looking to mix a seasoned group of veterans with 16 new recruits in 1987, as the Cyclones look toward a first-division finish in the rugged Big Eight Conference.

Heading the returnees is senior outfielder Bill Argo, who hit .287 last year, with 32 RBI's and six home runs. Argo spent the summer playing with the Nevada (Mo.) Griffins and helped that team to a fifth-place finish in the National Baseball Congress Tournament.

Senior infielder Jeff Breeling returns after leading the Cyclones in stolen bases last year. Breeling swiped 26 bases last year and hit .279. He'll see action at either second or third base this season.

A strong group of pitchers also return for 1987, led by three players who hail from Indiana. Heading the group is senior Jerry Meyers, who teams with Argo as a co-captain. Meyers has been a three-year starter for Iowa State and appeared in 18 games last year and posted a 2-6 record. Sophomores Brian Lonergan and Dan O'Reilly will also be in Randall's starting rotation. Lonergan was 6-4 last year, including a victory over Big Eight Conference regular-season champion Oklahoma, and posted a 4.66 ERA. O'Reilly was 3-6, with a 5.35 ERA and tied a school record for single-season starts, with 13.

Senior Ed Grobelny, junior Craig Harman, and sophomore Shawn Stolte are all battling for the fourth spot in Randall's starting rotation.

A pair of juniors, Pat Heiderscheit and Chris Zima will serve as Randall's relief specialists. Heiderscheit will also be the Cyclones starting catcher, so he might not pitch as much as he did last year, when he appeared in nine games. Zima was 1-3 last year, with a team-high eight saves and a 5.40 ERA.

"I'm pleased with the group of pitchers that we have coming back and feel that they'll be very important in our development as a team. We've got a good staff and they need to continue the improvement that they made last year," Randall said.

Other returnees who will see action in 1987 include sophomore Greg Brecht, who will start the season as ISU's top shortstop; sophomore Dave Herbeck, who will play either second or third base; and senior Walt Delp, who will anchor ISU's infield at first base. Junior Craig Prather will see action for the Cyclones in a utility role.

Randall added 16 new faces to the Cyclone program over the summer and feels that several players will step in and help right away.

"I was very pleased with the recruits that we signed and feel that several of them will be able to step in and help us right away. We were able to sign players at all of the positions where we need help and you've got to feel good about that."

Heading the list of signees is Reggie Stalzer, an infielder from Marshalltown. Stalzer was named to *Collegiate Baseball's* High School All-America Team last summer after hitting .510 and helping the Bobcats to consecutive state titles in class 4-A.

Infielder Virgil Fulk, catcher Ed Riley, and outfielders Dave Shinn and Rhay Street are also in the hunt for playing time as rookies.

Once again the Cyclones will face a demanding schedule, something that has become a trademark of Randall's teams. The Cyclones will travel to Orlando, Fla., during spring break, and will play in the annual Rollins Baseball Tournament. Home and home series games with Iowa, Northern Iowa, Minnesota, and Creighton also appear on the Cyclone schedule, in addition to the 24-game Big Eight Conference schedule.

"Our schedule is a good one. My team is excited about the season and we're ready to get going. If some of the new players that we brought in can play right away, then we've got a chance to be in the thick of the conference race. Everybody in the league lost some good players, so this could be the most wide-open race in awhile, but as usual, Oklahoma and Oklahoma State will probably battle it out for the top two spots," Randall said.

Softball Squad Takes Field With High Goals

After assessing her team's talent this fall, coach Deb Kuhn feels the 1987 Iowa State softball team has the makings to win the Big Eight Conference.

"I'm excited about the year," Kuhn said. "After seeing the competition this fall, I feel we have the potential to take the conference this year." The Cyclones posted a 7-4 record this fall, including wins over conference foes Nebraska and Kansas.

A key for the Cyclones will be their pitching staff, which is led by senior Kelli Alberts. Alberts, who posted a 15-10 record last spring, had a successful fall outing.

"Kelli Alberts is a definite plus for our team," Kuhn said. "She's throwing the ball well. She's going to be an important factor for our team and has the ability to be one of the top pitchers in the conference."

In addition to Alberts, the Cyclones will rely on seniors Breana Reedy, Denise Pate and sophomore Leslie Greer to provide needed pitching strength.

"Breana Reedy gives 110 percent every time she goes out," Kuhn said. "However, she needs to have all of her pitches working in order to be successful. Denise and Leslie need to work on fundamentals in the off-season. If this develops, we can have a good staff."

Sophomore Bobbi Jo Gorsuch and junior Mary Laufer are battling for the starting catcher position. Laufer, a Big Eight all-tournament selection last spring, led the fall stats with a .344 batting average.

"They are both fighting it out," Kuhn said. "I think in the end it will depend on consistency and their offensive contributions."

Senior Lee Smick, who led the team with a .315 batting clip last year, returns to play first base for the Cyclones. Smick, a Big Eight all-tournament selection last year, has the potential to be an all-conference player, according to Kuhn.

Senior Sue Reese looks to be the starter at second base, Kuhn said, after improving 100 percent offensively. "She's been hitting the ball hard lately

and looks to be the starter." Reese will be backed up by sophomore Beth Lin and Jill Best, a freshman walk-on from West Des Moines, Iowa.

Another key member of the Cyclone team, according to Kuhn, will be sophomore Karen Brenner. Brenner will probably see action at shortstop. "Karen had a good summer and developed some confidence in herself," Kuhn said. "Developing consistency in her offensive and defensive game will be a key to her having a successful year."

Junior Monica Campana and freshman Carrie Bargman both saw action at third base this fall. Campana, the returner, really improved this fall and came into her own, according to Kuhn. Bargman, a walk-on from Spencer, Iowa really impressed Kuhn with her ability to hit the ball hard. "I'm really impressed with Carrie and feel she has done a good job," Kuhn said.

Kuhn has four returners in the outfield in addition to three talented recruits. Amber Masteller, Robin Kenowith and Beth Gritsch, all returners, have important roles in the Cyclone game plan. Returning to the Cyclone squad after a year layoff, Becky Harkema will provide the team with some diversity in the field. Freshman Jenny Condon, a freshman from Edina, Minn., possesses great speed and will be a "sparkplug for the team," Kuhn

said. Marcie Smith, a freshman from a strong Ankeny, Iowa, program, will also be available for the Cyclones in the outfield.

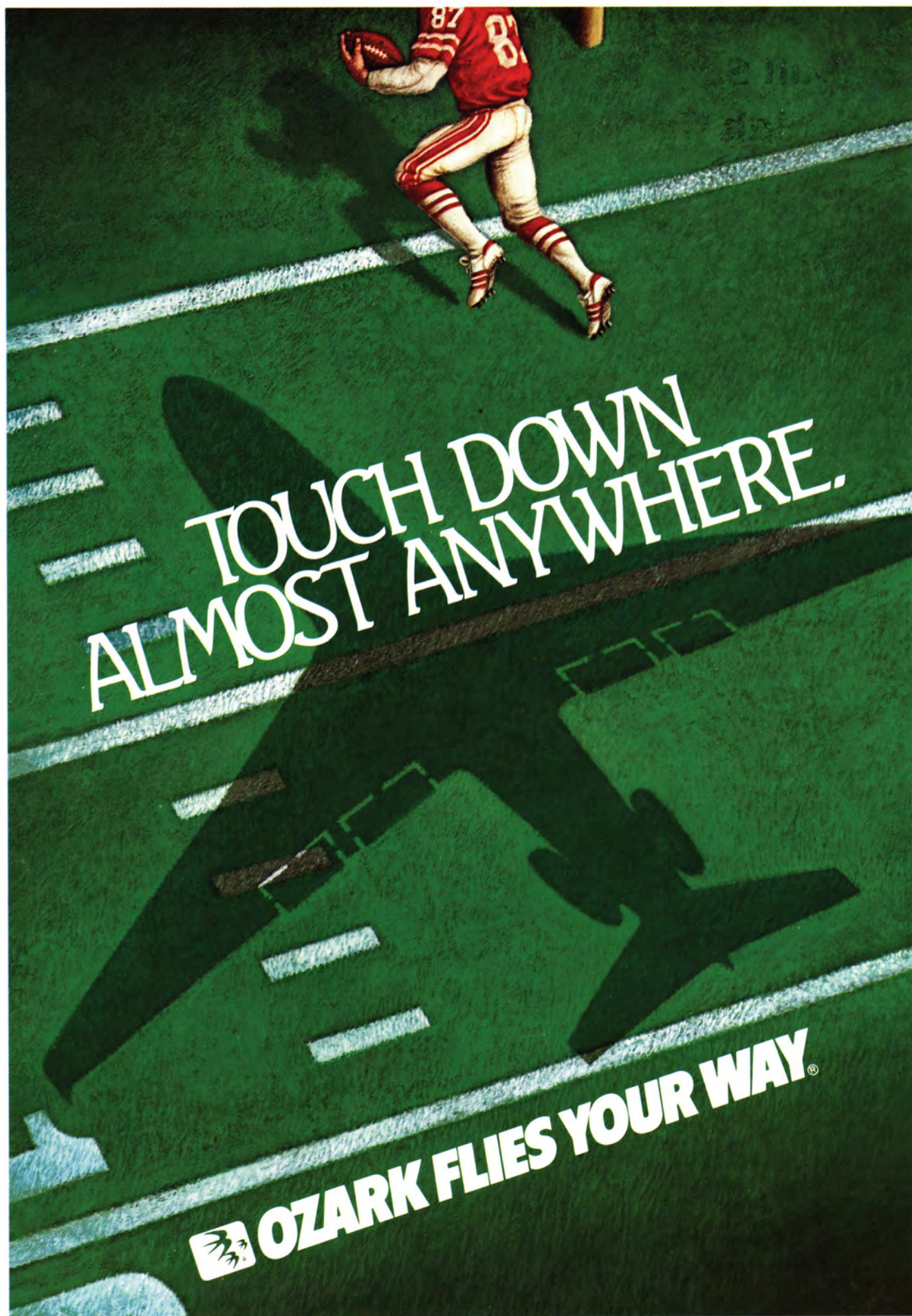
Overall, Kuhn sees this team as having the potential to be a strong contender for the conference title and post season play. "I feel really good after our fall season," Kuhn said. "Our offensive line up is incredible. To look at the potential of the starting nine, overall the team is the strongest I've ever had in my five years here at Iowa State."

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Cyclone Stadium-Jack Trice Field



Without a doubt, the most beautiful and convenient football facility in the Big Eight Conference is the 50,000-seat Cyclone Stadium-Jack Trice Field. Located on a 30-acre tract, the stadium is part of the ISU Center on the southeast corner of the Ames campus.

In December of 1983, the Iowa State University football facility was officially named. The name of the stadium itself is Cyclone Stadium, with the field now named for and dedicated to Jack Trice, Iowa State's first Black athlete, who died from injuries he received in his first major college football game in October 1923.

The stadium offers an unobstructed view of the playing field as well as remarkably easy access from all parts of the state. The ISU Center includes the stadium, James H. Hilton Coliseum, C. Y. Stephens Auditorium, J. W. Fisher Theater, the Carl Scheman Continuing Education Building, with lighted parking for 4,000 vehicles.

The stadium was completed in less than two years from the ground

breaking, on October 26, 1973, to the first game, a victory over Air Force, on September 20, 1975.

In late 1973 and early '74, heavy earth-moving equipment shaped the embankments. A huge, moveable form shaped the lower decks with thousands of cubic yards of concrete.

Originally, the stadium had a capacity of 42,500, all on the sidelines. In 1976, end-zone bleachers were constructed to bring the capacity to more than 48,000. Standing room tickets, sold for each game, bring the capacity to more than 50,000.

The record crowd was 54,066 for the 1983 Iowa State-Iowa game.

The press box is located between the upper and lower decks. There is seating for 123 sports reporters and eight broadcast teams as well as a cafeteria serving area and two photographic dark rooms. The press box is structured so that the media representatives can enter using ramps from either end of the stadium, eliminating the need for an elevator. There is an enclosed

camera deck atop the west stands.

Opposite the press box on the east side is a modern club section, seating in theater seats. Included in the club section is a lounge as well as rest room facilities.

The stadium contains 16,000 tons of reinforced concrete, 1,000 tons of structural steel and has a four-inch-thick asphalt base under a new All-Pro Turf playing field. The All-Pro Turf, replaced in the summer of 1985, stretches from the edge of the stands on each side and 20 yards beyond each end zone. This allows for maximum practice space.

There are fully electronic scoreboards at each end of the stadium, while the north end area features the ISU Victory Bell, and a statue of Cy the Cardinal.

The Ralph A. Olsen Building is adjacent to the north end of the stadium. The Olsen Building, named in honor of the prominent Ellsworth farmer and alumnus, houses the athletic administration facilities.

Included in the Olsen Building are locker rooms, team meeting rooms, football coaching offices and staff rooms, the sports medicine clinic, Cyclone Club offices, athletic ticket offices and maintenance facilities.

The total cost of the stadium was \$7.6 million. It was paid for through contributions of alumni, friends and businesses to the Iowa State Foundation, as well as athletic receipts. More than 15,000 contributors have participated in ISU Foundation projects.



Scouting Report

Cyclone Scouting Report

The Series: This is the 81st meeting between the two schools. Nebraska leads 64-14-2 in the series that began in 1896 with a 12-4 Nebraska victory. The Cornhuskers won last year's contest 49-0 in Lincoln - the second consecutive year Nebraska has held the Cyclones scoreless. The last time the teams met in Ames (1984), Nebraska posted a 44-0 win. The Huskers lead the series in Ames, 26-7-2, and are 4-1 at Cyclone Stadium-Jack Trice Field. Iowa State's last victory in the series was a 24-21 victory in 1977 at Lincoln.

For the Record: Nebraska rolled up 385 yards in total offense at home last weekend, while posting a 38-0 win over Kansas State in a contest played in a heavy snowstorm for much of the game. The win boosted UN to 7-1 overall and 3-1 in conference play. Quarterback Steve Taylor rushed for two touchdowns and passed for another to lead the UN attack. He finished the game with 68 yards rushing and completed four passes for 60 yards. Junior I-back Keith Jones rushed for a game-high 109 yards on 18 carries and scored two touchdowns.

Offensively: The Huskers are averaging 307.4 yards per game rushing and 413.5 yards per game in total offense. Junior I-back Keith Jones leads the Nebraska rushing attack with 672 yards on 134 carries for an 84 yards-per-game average. Quarterback Steve Taylor is averaging 56.3 yards rushing a game, gaining 450 yards on 95 carries. He has completed 42 of 95 passes for 680 yards. Dana Brinson has caught 11 passes for 135 yards to lead the Husker receivers.

Defensively: The Huskers are ranked second nationally in total defense, behind Oklahoma. Nebraska has allowed only 240 yards per game this season. In last week's contest, they held Kansas State to 106 yards in total offense.

Kicking: Place-kicker Dale Klein has scored 61 points this season and is 34 of 35 on extra points attempts. He has connected on 9 of 12 field goals in eight games. Punter John Kroeker is averaging 40 yards a kick.

The Coach: Tom Osborne is in his 14th year at Nebraska as head coach and his overall record is 134-31-2. His winning percentage of .807 ranks third among the nation's NCAA Division I coaches. Osborne is in his 25th year at Nebraska, where he received a Ph.D. in educational psychology. His teams have won or shared the Big Eight title in six of the past ten years.

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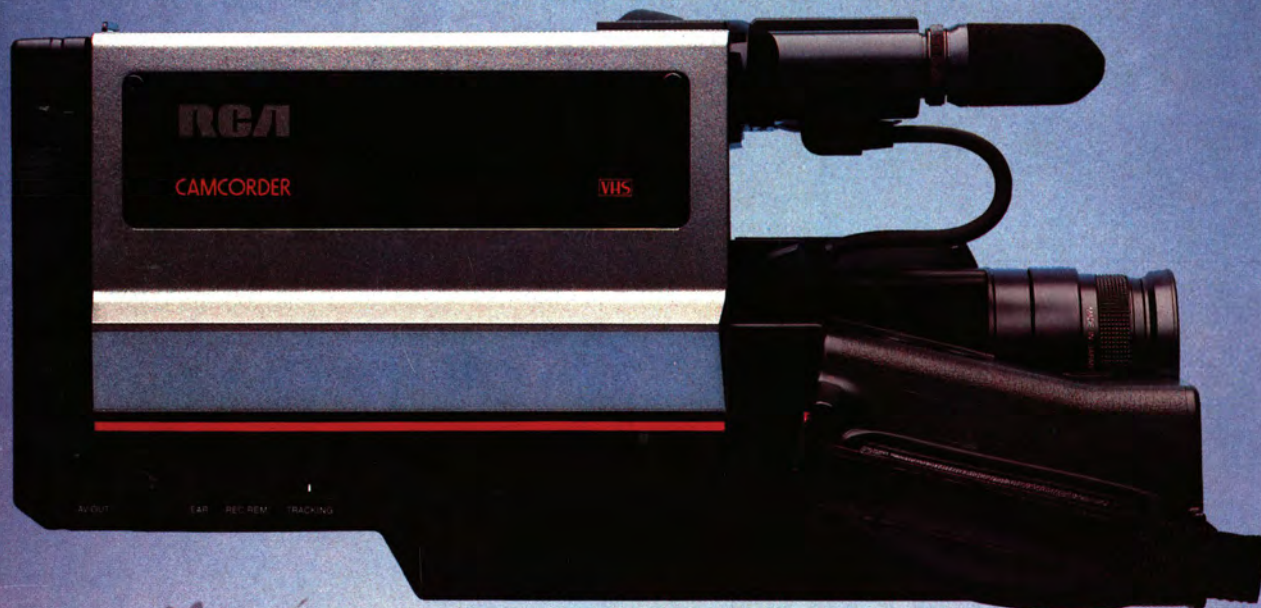
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
