Tigers-Cyclones Play Twenty-Fifth Game

Iowa State's football relations with the University of Missouri Tigers have been more frequent and continuous than with any other school in the Big Six Conference. Teams representing these two schools have struggled against each other 24 times on the gridiron, 12 of the games resulting in victories for Missouri, 10 in wins for Iowa State, and two in tie scores.

Today on State Field these traditional rivals continue their competition before Homecoming fans. Since the beginning of football relations with Missouri in 1895, the rivalry has been of the fiercest sort. Records show that the Cyclones proved superior to the Tigers in a majority of the earlier games, but in recent years the Iowa State eleven has failed to register a win since 1923 when a 2 to 0 score was chalked up.

Since 1908 Missouri and Iowa State have played every year except 1918 when the war intervened to curtail gridiron activities. Last year at Columbia the Missourians passed their way to a 14 to 0 victory over the Cyclones. The Bomb of 1931, says of the game:

"Facing only a mediocre Missouri team at Columbia, the Cyclones launched their attack with effectiveness only once during the game, and allowed the Tiger team to win 14 to 0 in the latter's first conference victory. Early in the fourth quarter Iowa State made its only threat when Tegland carried the ball 26 yards and 14 yards successively, placing the ball on Missouri's 12 yard line. Here a pass, Wilcox to Farrell, dropped over the goal line, automatically ending a chance to score. The Missouri touchdown came in the closing minutes of the first half, when a Tiger back intercepted an Iowa State pass on their own 45 yard line. Van Dyne straightaway passed to Collings, who sprinted 25 yards to the Iowa State goal. Again in the middle of the third period Heitz passed to Van Dyne for the second Tiger score."

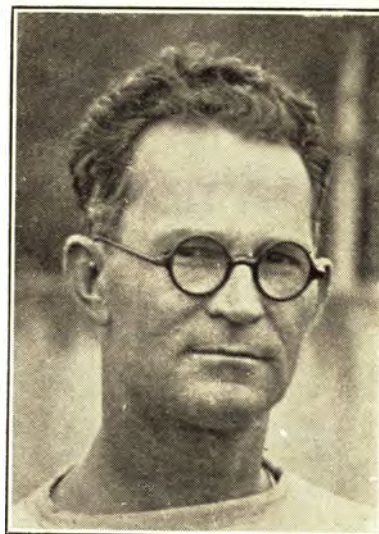

New Coach Gets First Taste of Big Six Competition Today

Serving his first year as head football coach at Iowa State, George F. Veenker in his second home game matches wits with Gwinn Henry, Missouri mentor and one of the nation's most resourceful coaches. In his nine years as coach of the Tigers he has made an outstanding record. Since taking over the reins in 1923 his teams have 37 conference wins, 16 defeats and 8 ties which brought three conference championships to his school.

A yearning to take over the duties of a head football coach lured Coach Veenker away from his Big Ten job as head basketball and assistant football coach at the University of Michigan to assume complete charge of gridiron activities at Iowa State.

Firmly entrenched at the Big Ten school because of his success in basketball—he had one championship and two third place teams in the three years he directed basketball at Ann Arbor—Veenker was not at first considered among the 175 men who applied for the Cyclone job when Coach Noel Workman resigned last spring. But it developed that his first love was football. Veenker, a native Iowan born at Ashton, had a remarkable record of high school gridiron success in Indiana. Consequently he was chosen as the ideal man for the Cyclones, when it developed that he wanted a head coach's job.

Tracing his gridiron record back a few years, it is not hard to see why he loves his

football. As an undergraduate at St. Lawrence University and Hope College, Holland, Mich., he won major letters in football, baseball and track. Following the war during which he served in the army air service, Veenker coached football for one and one half years at Hammond, Ind. From there he went to Emerson High, Gary, Ind., where he made an impressive record.

During the eight years he coached the two Indiana high schools his teams annexed six state championships. For four consecutive years he coached undefeated teams, and in 1922 and 1923 his teams were not even scored upon.

In 1926 Michigan enlisted his services for football and basketball. He coached the backfield in 1926, the ends in 1927, and 1928, and tackles and ends in 1929 and 1930, in addition to his work on the basketball floor.

Veenker also found time to write while at Michigan. His book entitled "Basketball for Coaches and Players" is considered by many as the best book ever published in that field.

With his assumption of the football directorship at Iowa State, Cyclone followers hope for a change in football fortunes. To date he has won two games and lost one, victories being registered over Simpson and Morningside and a defeat taken at the hands of the powerful University of Detroit team.

Cross country runners have collaborated to give their event the best athletic record Iowa State possesses. Stars of the calibre of Ray Conger, Ray Putnam, Rathbun, McIntyre and Bierbaum account for this.

Captain Earl Labertew, Art Eichelkraut and Lyle Chapman, all members of last year's winning team, will again be seen this afternoon.

The race will be run between halves.

An Appreciation

Missing today from the Homecoming crowd, for the first time in many years, is a national figure in physical education and intercollegiate athletic circles, our esteemed alumnus and friend, the late Dean Samuel W. Beyer. His tragic and untimely death of a few months ago removed one of the pioneers in the organization and development of intercollegiate athletic affairs in this country.

For many years, as chairman of the local athletic council, he was largely responsible for the athletic policies and the intercollegiate athletic relationships of this college. He was active in the formation of the old Missouri Valley Conference from which ultimately was evolved the organization of six state institutions now known as the Missouri Valley Intercollegiate Athletic Association. As faculty representative to our athletic conferences for many years, he often represented these organizations in the National Collegiate Athletic Association, in which he held office with distinction. In the broader field of physical education, he was equally influential and was one of the early advocates of a system of physical education for all students in colleges.

Iowa State College feels keenly the loss of Dean Beyer, eminent scholar and educator, capable executive, trusted friend and colleague, and true sportsman. His fine personality, rare wisdom and mature judgment are greatly missed in many circles.



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Introducing . . .

KENNETH WELLS (25), a three sport athlete, having won letters in football, baseball and track, is probably the fastest man on the squad. For the past two years he competed as a half back but this year Coach Veenker converted him into an end. His play against Simpson and Morningside was outstanding. He was captain in the latter game.

FRANKLIN NOLTE (46) tips the scales at 201 pounds and towers well over the six foot mark. Nolte broke his leg in the Missouri game two years ago. His height, weight and aggressiveness make him a mighty valuable man at tackle. He captained the team at Detroit.

GORDON NAGEL (41) was probably the best center in the Big Six conference last year. This is his third year of competition. "Buzz" served as captain in the Simpson game, and has been a mainstay in the Cyclone line in the first three games.

ROBERT SMITH (45) has had some trouble this fall getting over an attack of flu. However, "Fighting Bob" is back in there making a name for himself in his third year of competition at tackle.

WARREN DUESENBERG (28) is one of the best defensive backs the Cyclones have had in some time. He likes to hit them hard. He broke a bone in his hand against Detroit and it has not fully healed.

IVAN IMPSON broke a leg bone in Morningside game and will be out for most of season. He tore Drake's line to pieces last year. His loss is a serious blow.

RICHARD GREFE (26) earned his spurs as a ball carrier last year as a sophomore. A clever ball totter and an excellent passer.

FRANZ SWOBODA (22) was an end last year and started there this year but is now a halfback. Speed is one of his big assets.

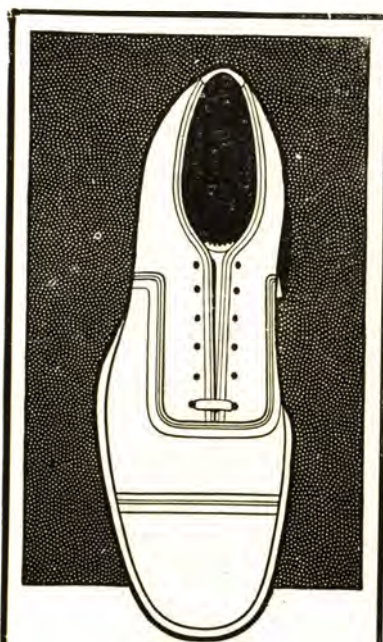

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Kansas State Leads in Big Six with Two Victories

With conference victories chalked up over Missouri and Kansas, the Kansas Aggies sit entrenched at the top of the Big Six football scorings with a football team that is putting up a determined fight for the 1931 championship.

Last Saturday Coach "Bo" McMillan's K-Aggies traveled to Lawrence to conquer the champion Jayhawkers 13 to 0, after drubbing Missouri the week before to the tune of 20 to 7. Today the K-Aggies engage Oklahoma at Manhattan in their third loop contest.

Nebraska demonstrated some power against Northwestern although they were defeated and in the one conference game the Huskers have played to date, they were victorious against the Sooners. Today the Huskers and

Jayhawks meet at Lincoln in the second conference game for both schools. This contest should be one of the feature games of the season.

Today's battle on State Field will find Iowa State, untried in conference competition, and Missouri, with one defeat, striving for their first Big Six victory. The Cyclones had no scheduled game last Saturday and had two weeks in which to prepare for the Homecoming engagement, while the Missourians went west last weekend where they received a 9 to 7 reversal from Colorado at Boulder. George Stuber's bullet-like passes resulted in Missouri's only marker late in the game after Colorado had scored a touchdown and placekick.

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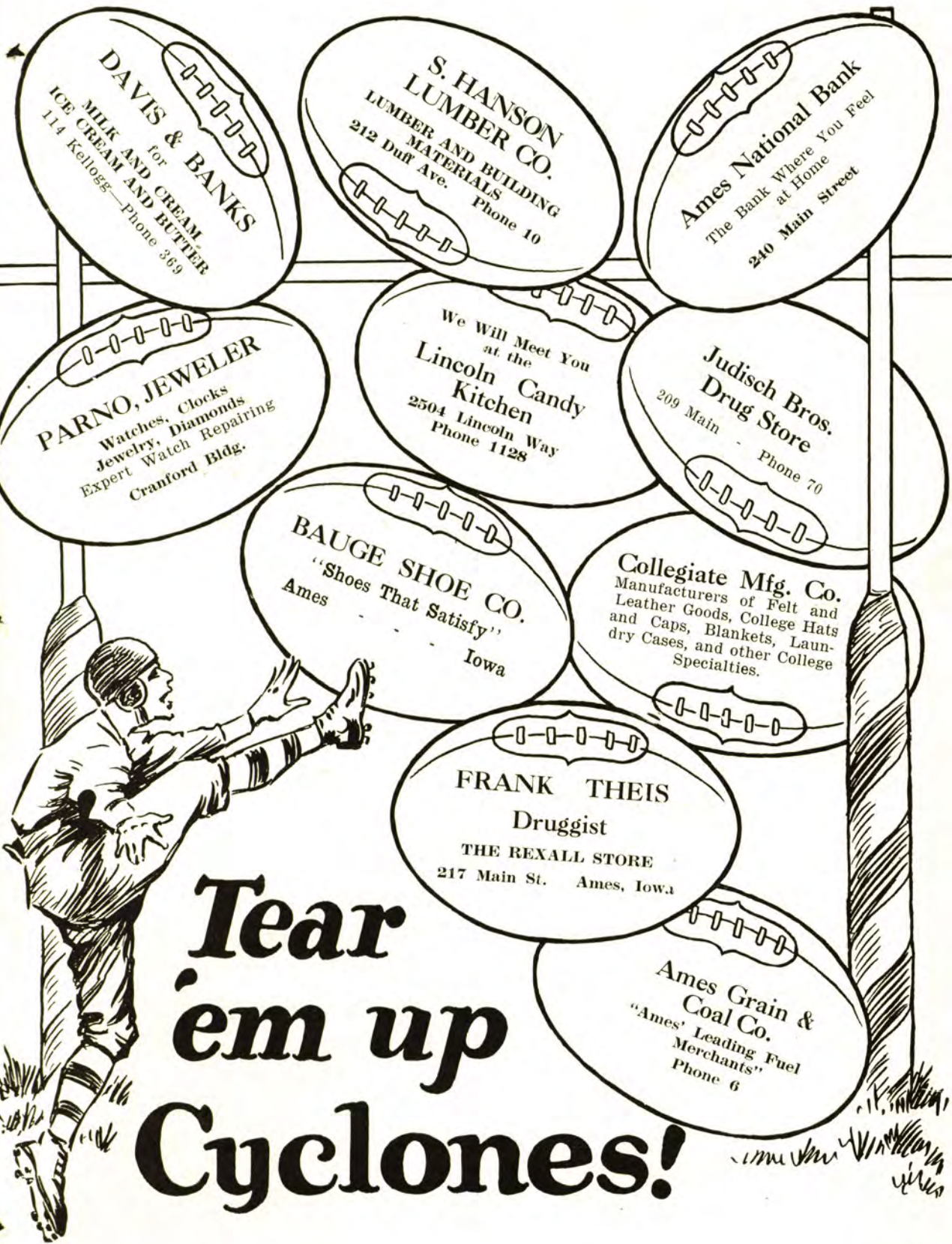
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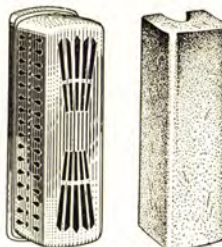


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
